Honors Recognition Program:

Graduation with Citizenship Honors (PEACOCK BRAID)

Students who complete grades 9-12 without receiving any unsatisfactory citizenship marks (U's) are eligible to graduate with Citizenship Honors.

Graduation with Academic Honors (SILVER BRAID)

Meet graduation requirements and have a cumulative GPA of 3.60-3.799 through 3rd term of senior year.

Graduation with High Academic Honors (GOLD BRAID)

Meet graduation requirements and have a cumulative GPA of 3.80-3.999 through 3rd term of senior year.

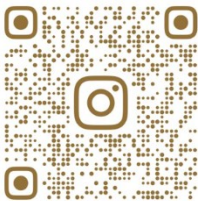
Graduation with Academic Distinction (WHITE BRAID)

Meet Graduation Requirements and have a Cumulative GPA of 4.0 through 3rd Term of senior year.

To graduate with Distinction, High Honors, or Honors, students must have taken at least (5) Honors, AP, or Core CE classes (core CE is Math, English, Science, Social Studies, or World Language).

College and Career Readiness (CCR) is an opportunity for students to discuss college and career plans with their counselor through the following ways:

10th Grade

Counselors give group presentations in class to students during the month of October.

11th Grade

Counselors meet with parents and students in individual appointments during the months of November and December.

12th Grade

Counselors give group presentations in class to students during the month of September.

Advanced Placement (AP) Courses

Students who pass the year-end AP test receive a score that can be converted to college credit. AP credits do not affect the college GPA.

Student Athletes

- In order to be eligible to participate in a collegiate sport at the Division I or Division II level, students must meet the 16 core-course rule by taking at least 16 credits of core courses in high school and maintain a 2.3 G.P.A. in those courses.
- Students must submit an ACT score to the NCAA (registration code 9999)
- Students are encouraged to register with the NCAA Eligibility Center at eligibilitycenter.org after their junior year.
