## Inside Our Classrooms

The Hive This week in The Hive we have continued learning about plants and trees. We have written our own poems about the lifecycle of an oak tree and we have made a variety of graphs and charts to record our favourite fruit and vegetables. We have been caring for plants of our own by watering them every day.
Thinkers In Thinkers class this week, we have been looking at doubles. We used magic mirrors to help us double objects and had a 'picnic' with our friend and shared food equally. Our year 6 buddies helped us to design and build our own circus tent materials.
Inventors This week in Inventors, we thought back to last week where we predicted the ending of the story 'The Secret Garden'. Children drew their predictions and wrote sentences to describe what they thought may happen. We continued the story and found out whether our predictions came true! This week in English, inventors put their imaginative caps on and have started to write a piece of creative writing. Inventors had to imagine that they were the main character and were entering their own version of the secret garden. Next week, they will be moving on to writing what they see, hear, smell and touch as they enter their secret garden. As a challenge, Inventors can think about what they may taste! There have been some brilliant ideas and I can' $\dagger$ wait to see what they write next.
Explorers have taken a journey through the Rainforest and learnt about all the amazing animals and plants that are found there. We have been planning stories based on 'Where the Forest meets the Sea' by Jeannie Baker and used Now>Press>Play to listen to sounds from the Rainforest. We used our senses to imagine what we might see, hear, feel and smell and write descriptive sentences. We have continued our fabulous fraction work in maths and learnt to find halves, quarters and thirds of amounts. In science we have learnt about the functions of different parts of a plant, and begun an investigation to compare the rate of growth between bulbs and seeds in our KS1 garden.
Warriors have had a busy two week period - time certainly flies when you're having fun! We have enjoyed our English sessions based on The Day The Crayons Quit - looking at creating our own punctuation characters and giving advice to Duncan and the crayons on their next steps. They also had to write their own letters of apology as on Wednesday morning, after break, we
came into the classroom to see that all of the chairs had quit as they were annoyed by being dragged, swung on, left out and even suffering windy whizz-poppers! Luckily our letters were so great, Mr Blue Chair (the representative) was happy that we could get them back! We have been busy with our topic work looking at early trains and steam engines as well as coastlines and how arches, stacks and caves are formed. In other areas, we have looked at unit and non-unit fractions in maths; shadows in science; athletics and sprinting techniques in PE; desktop publishing in computing and finally homophones and the prefix dis- in phonics.

## Ground-breakers have

become more confident working with equivalent fractions. We have used the information we learnt from our Mayan workshop and own research to begin drafting Mayan fact files. In science, we have been focusing on what
 happens to our food after we eat. We had a lot of fun recreating the small intestine with a pair of tights!

Innovators have loved the suspense and drama of the The Highwayman, a poem which has prompted many predictions about what was going to happen at each stage, along with lots of debate. We have been finding out about law and order in the middle ages and the general feeling was that it was most unfair! In computing, we have been working hard on understanding the terminology and the 'how' of coding in Scratch, with lots of year 5 realising that they previously made code work through trial and error and moving blocks around, but that now they understand about conditions, outcomes and questions within the code.

Trailblazers have been making all of their families and teachers very proud this week. The children have shown an incredibly mature attitude in their preparations for and execution of the end of key stage 2 assessments this week. SATs breakfasts have been a great way to start each day, which I'm sure some would like to continue! In the assessments, the children impressed all of the adults in the school, displaying incredible fortitude and determination. They have also found time to produce some special science projects in the afternoons. Well done year 6!
