### Inside Our Classrooms This Year

The Hive In The Hive over the last two weeks we have been learning about volcanoes, linked to our book, My Mouth is a Volcano by Julia Cook. We have learned why they erupt, what they are and we have conducted an experiment to see what are the best materials to make our own volcanoes. We have discussed what a metaphor is and thought about when mouths can be like volcanoes. We have played an interrupting game and thought about how it feels when people interrupt us. In maths we have continued to learn about the four operations, looking particularly at multiplying and dividing. We were very excited when we had an email to say we had won a prize for our winning dreamcatcher, which Ms Hawtin collected and it was a birdbox! Now we are thinking about where to put it and what birds might need.

**Thinkers** had a super busy few weeks in the sunshine! We started off with our Rainbow Fish text, where we learnt all about how to share and be a good friend, as well as decorating our own Rainbow Fish using coloured finger prints. We moved onto our Lighthouse theme and designed our own lighthouses/lunchboxes, thinking how to keep naughty seagulls out! This week, pirates have been in our minds. We've made telescopes, pirate hats and eye patches (all recyclable) and learnt all about a pirate life ready for our Pirate Day!

Inventors The Summer term is such an important and influential time in the school year and Inventors have taken it in their stride. From building friendships and growing together, to achieving the most amazing outcomes in their Phonics Screening Check. The children of Inventors have achieved a great deal they should be proud of. In the Summer term, we focused on 'stories in secret places' and thoroughly enjoyed learning all about The Secret Garden, The Wind in The Willows and all the topics in between. They have progressed so much. From learning how to write simple sentences to creating imaginative, descriptive stories which wowed me throughout the year. From learning place value within 10, addition and subtraction within 20 to recognising place value within 100, identifying money and telling the time. It is incredible what we have all learned together. It has been an absolute pleasure teaching Inventors and I wish them all the best in Year 2!

**Explorers** have continued to be 'Planet Protectors'. We read the story 'Greta and the Giants' and were inspired to create 'Save the Forest' posters. In Maths we have been learning about properties of 2D and 3D shapes and have been building 3D shapes using nets. We had a Spanish feast with Mrs Robinson, tasting a variety of Spanish foods, which was DELICIOSO! This week we had a fantastic 'Jolf' session and demonstrated some super golfing skills. We have also spent time in our Year 3 classroom during our transition sessions with Mr Luckhurst, and are

really looking forward to becoming Warriors in September!

Warriors have persevered their way through some stifling temperatures to enjoy lots of curriculum focused days! We have had a history day where we looked at the first underground stations as well as how the train station impacted Haywards Heath; a Maths day where we estimated the weight of items and used scales to check as well as making new drinks by measuring out juices; a science day where we looked at friction and which surface caused most friction as well as becoming human scrapyard magnets by separating magnetic and non-magnetic materials. We also enjoyed getting to know our new teacher, Miss Wilding, in our transition sessions.

**Ground-breakers** We have loved our Mayan style sewing, producing some amazing and colourful outcomes. Continuing our Mayan theme, it has been time to create like an ancient Mayan, making and decorating Mayan pots with glyphs and patterns. This week, we have enjoyed something different, with an independent free write on an edible theme!

Innovators have had a very busy couple of weeks both being visited and visiting! PC Kemp came to talk to our class about the police force and the many different roles and responsibilities within it, and we had our final Year 5 trip to London. Travelling up on the train, we enjoyed some of the sights on the river Thames before taking part in a crime and punishment workshop at the Tower of London, where we learned about how innovative some of the prisoners were in making their escapes! We also went to see the Superbloom exhibition and enjoyed the speed of the slide down into the moat. Thank you once again to the parents who helped us to make that day a safe and successful one.



**Trailblazers** have been working their socks off to deliver a knockout performance to end the year and their time at Blackthorns. The acting was of a superb standard and they showed their abundance of talent in their round up of their final primary school year. They have been


### Mrs Neller

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### **Time Flies**


