The Journal is published by the University of Chicago Press, and it is distributed to all the libraries of the University. It is also available for sale to the general public, and it is a very popular and useful publication.

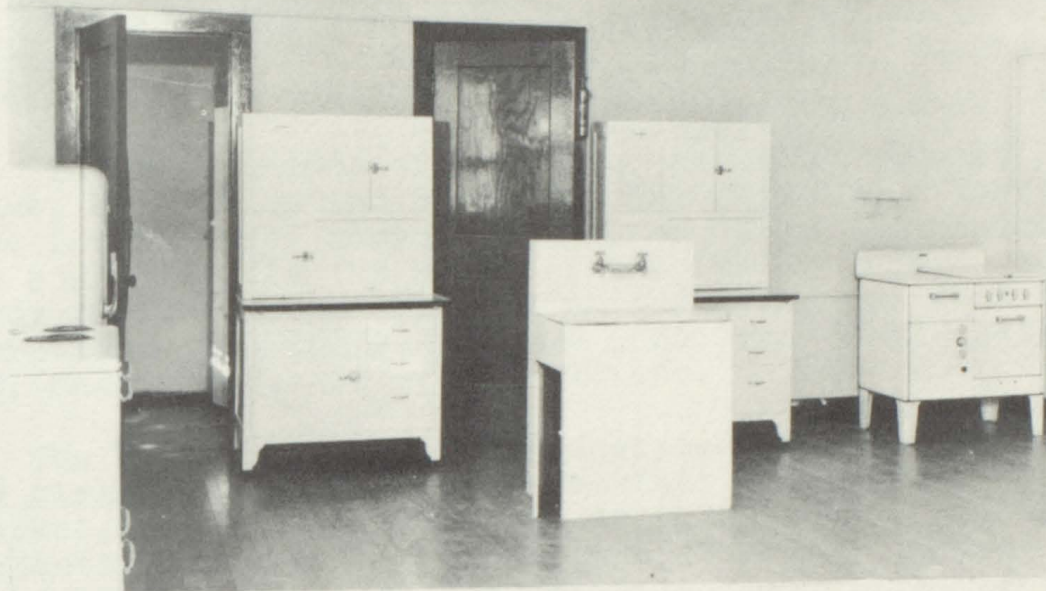

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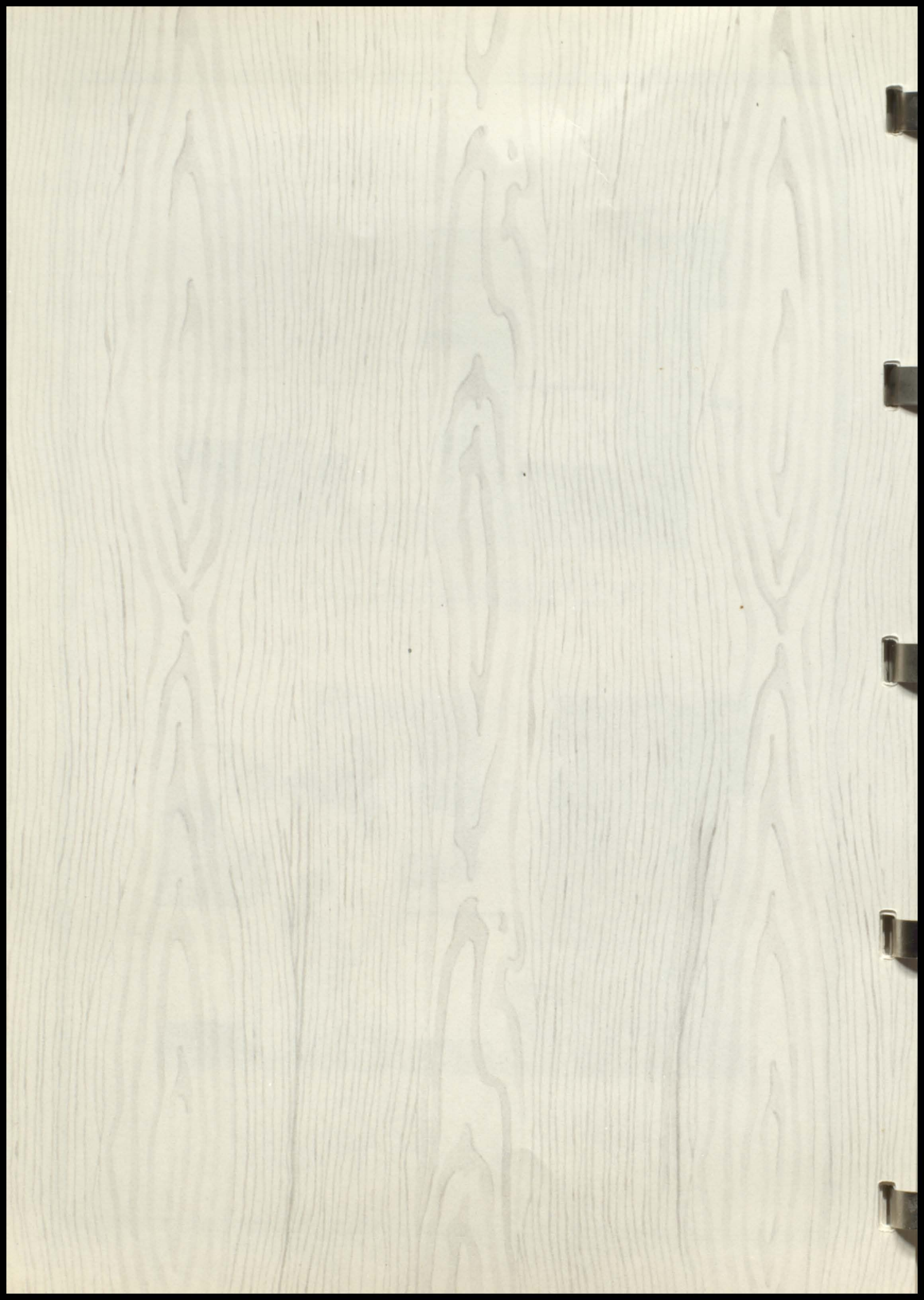

Home Economics

The Homemaking program is organized to include all phases of home life, which will be covered during the three years given at our high school.

The main phases of studies centered around the house, home, food and clothing. The HOUSE is a study of home furnishings, house keeping, and home management. The HOME study is the study of the family life. FOOD Study included cooking, serving of meals and food preservation. The CLOTHING phase consisted of the selecting, making and care of the clothes.

The Homemaking I, class consisted of eight students. The girls have studied the breakfast unit. They made scarves, cap and mitten sets and also various Christmas presents. They made skirts and blouses. Under the phase of home life they studied social life of the ninth grade girl.

The Homemaking II class, consisted of ten students. The girls have studied canning, luncheons and food preservation which comes under the food section. In clothing they made toys, aprons for Christmas gifts, blouses and skirts. They also did textile painting. At the beginning of the school year they planned and built a department library. They also learned to file and filed pamphlets and other articles. Assisted by members of other classes these girls planned and prepared the athletic banquet.

The Homemaking III class, consisted of eleven students. This class of girls studied home furnishing. Food preservation and canning also took up a good share of their time. At the beginning these girls made and decorated a girls' powder room which is very pretty. The color scheme was cream and light blue. They also made dresses, blouses, and other items.

The Sophomores served the faculty and themselves a delightful luncheon. Mrs. Michaelson was an honored guest. The Juniors served the faculty a most delicious formal dinner. A brunch was served by the Freshmen.

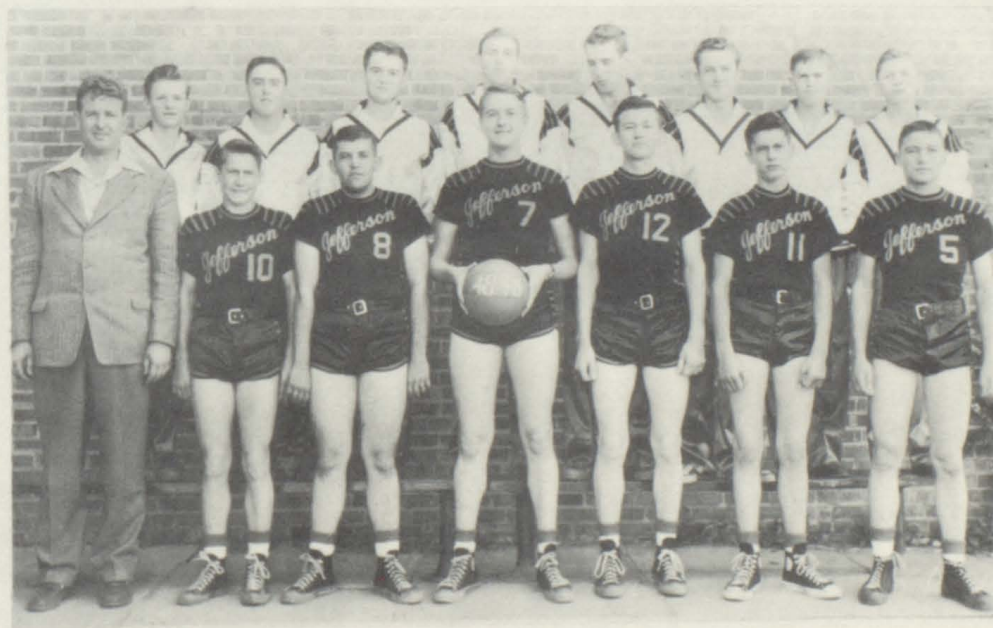
