


This year Mrs. Tryon acted as secretary to Mr. Tiemens and the entire school district.

Mr. Donald Lane is the high school's Guidance Counselor. His duties are to assist and prepare all students for present and future needs. Mr. Lane also acts as principal of the grade school.



Completing the English department this year were Mrs. Leona Gronvold, Mrs. Marilyn Parker, Mrs. Susan Tonner, and Mrs. Anita Zastrow. Sophomore and senior English were under Mrs. Gronvold, along with French I and II. She also led the oratory division in declam. Mrs. Parker was kept busy with debate, of which she was the advisor, when she was not teaching her freshman English class. When Mrs. Tonner could not be found in the classroom with her juniors and seniors, she was working in the library, which was under her management. She also directed the junior and senior class plays, and led the poetry division in declam. This year, Mrs. Zastrow taught English for the first time at EPHS. She had one class of freshmen. Mrs. Gronvold was the junior class sponsor while Mrs. Tonner and Mrs. Zastrow led the sophomore and senior classes, respectively.





The Elk Point Math Department was shared by Mr. Donald Chicoine and Mr. Leon Swier. Mr. Chicoine taught Algebra I. He then went into the sports department, teaching high school physical education. Football was under his management, and he also acted as assistant basketball coach. Mr. Swier carried the greater percentage of math classes. He taught general math, Algebra II, and senior math. Elementary physical education classes were under Mr. Swier, and he sponsored the seventh and eighth grade boys intramural. In the spring, Mr. Swier coached the EPHS track team.



Mrs. Corrine Milburn and Mr. Ray Schnell made up the science department of EPHS this year. Mrs. Milburn's duties included freshmen general science, chemistry, and physics. Sophomore biology was taught by Mr. Schnell. Both Mrs. Milburn and Mr. Schnell were freshmen class sponsors.

Social Sciences were under the leadership of Mr. John McIntosh, Mr. Ray Schnell, and Mrs. Linda Stene. The government, economics—sociology, and psychology classes were guided by Mr. McIntosh. After school, he coached the freshmen basketball team. American History was taught by Mr. Schnell, and Mrs. Stene had World History. She also instructed two divisions of humorous and dramatics in declam this year.





The miscellaneous classes this year were carried out by Mr. Gary Bell, music; Mr. Arthur Tonn, agriculture and shop; Miss Deloris Vondrak, home economics; and Mrs. Anita Zastrow, business. Mr. Bell's music consisted of vocal, A and B band, and small groups. The Future Farmers of America were led by Mr. Tonn. He also directed a summer agriculture program. Miss Vondrak's home economics included the grades of junior high, freshmen, sophomore, and senior. She was also a busy advisor of the junior class. Shorthand, typing and bookkeeping were the classes which fell under Mrs. Zastrow's leadership. She was kept busy as advisor of the Pointer Staff, the Annual Staff, and senior class.

Four teachers, Mrs. Mildred Fennel, Mr. Neil McLane, Mrs. Marilyn Parker, and Mrs. Linda Stene composed the junior high teaching staff. Mrs. Fennel taught seventh and eighth grade math; Mr. McLane, science; Mrs. Parker, English; and Mrs. Stene, social studies. Mrs. Fennel had the added duty of eighth grade home room, and Mrs. Stene guided the seventh grade.

Commencement exercises in the school's new auditorium marked an end to the senior's high school years.



Seniors Recognized for Outstanding Citizenship








The juniors had many things to be kept busy with all year. As class projects, they worked on their float, presented a class play, and worked together to make the Prom a huge success.



The annual style show, sponsored by the home economics department, was held on the Tuesday following the banquet and prom. The decorations from the prom provide a background for the style show each year.




Sophomores Reach Halfway Point

Mr. Bohn practice taught the final year of Physical Education for this class.









Many of the freshmen spent a great amount of time at the freshmen basketball games cheering their team on to victory.














































Sophomores Attend National FFA Convention



Other activities of the librarians were monthly supper meetings which were ended at the close of the year with a supper picnic at Camp Rosenbaum, also, the club held a bake sale.


This year Mrs. Tonner and the librarians started the process of a new classifying and cataloguing method. This method, when completed, will prove more efficient when finding books in the library.


