Junior English and the remaining half of freshmen English was under Mrs. Guthmiller's leadership, along with the French I class. She is the sponsor of the Pep Club and directed both the junior and senior class plays. Mrs. Guthmiller graduated from the University of Northern Iowa. 




(ABOVE) Mr. Chicoine is interrupted while helping Brad with a geometry problem, while Mrs. Watson and Micky (BELOW) work together on English.



They Kept Us Clean and Well Fed





"We've Only Just Begun," was the class motto chosen by the class of 1971. Their other class identifications were the pink rose as their flower, with their colors being pink and lavender.


The main project undertaken by the seniors was to raise money to finance their annual trip to Pierre. The objective of this




Chicoine were selected to go to the National FFA Convention in Kansas City, Missouri, which was held last October.








GAA Expands and Improves

Pep Club Shows Renewed Interest







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
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
