

Spencer Brende is new on the EPHS administration this year. Mr. Brende acts as grade school principal and as the senior high grudance counselor.




Gary Bell, band and vocal instructor, worked hard in heading the organizations and planning of extra activities for raising funds for new band uniforms.










# ALL-CONFERENCE HONORS




