





The 1984 Football team consisted of six seniors, eleven juniors, eight sophomores and seven freshmen. The six letter winning seniors were John Cody, Tim Irwin, Troy Kastrup, Todd McAreavey, Troy Norby and Eric Swanson.

Much new talent was realized in the football squad this year and less of the talent of last year's squad returned. The obstacles posed by a small squad was one of the factors which made this year less productive than it might have been. "In spite of this, improvement and growth occurred during the season, and spirit remained high as evidenced by a good showing against a play-off team, Bon Homme, in the season's final game," said Coach Nelson.


1. Sean looks in the pink of condition as he takes down his man. 2. Temperatures rise as Todd begins to wrestle.










The Elk Point High School Wrestling team started out the season on a high point with a first place win in the Early-Bird Tournament. The "Pointers" were 4-8 in dual action for the year, and finished last in the Big "8" Conference, but managed to place 5th in the Big "8" Conference Tournament.


Elk Point staged an B-team Holiday Wrestling Tournament which seemed to be quite popular and managed a third place showing.

Seniors Tim Irwin (20-12), Troy Norby (22-10), and Daryl Laferriere (22-9-1), along with junior Jason Quam (16-16) qualified for the State Wrestling Tournament. Daryl Laferriere won the only match at the state meet for the "Pointers." Troy Norby and Tim Irwin were selected as Co-Captains by their teammates, while Daryl LaFerriere was the most valuable with a .586 record of scoring. Sophomore Larry Schmitz with a record of 18-9-1 and David McNeil with a 8-19 record were region qualifiers. Juniors Sean George and Todd McInerney each won 10 matches for the year.










The 1985 Volleyball Team had its ups and downs this year, but still ended its season with 9 wins and 12 losses.

Everyone did well in their serving, bumping, and spiking which led the team to all of its victories.


