
#### **DESTINATION:**




Senior A. Eckert looks for the pass opening while keeping the ball from her opponent's reach. ▲




#### Destination: Gridiron








#### **Destination: STATE**


Many of the team members felt that






T. Gale focuses to gain the advantage over his opponent. ▲






#### **Destination: Success**

Sherry Klunder, Angie Eckert, Sue Walsh and Jeanene McKelvey were named All-Conference. Walsh and Eckert were also named All-State.




J. McKelvey makes an offensive attack as K. Trometer and S. Klunder prepare for the defensive play.

S. Walsh dinks as T. Mathieu covers the floor.













#### Lucky Seven




▲ M. Skinner shoots a jumper for two while T. Thiele, D. Wagner and C. Stroschein get in rebounding position.










#### ON THE RIGHT TRACK

The boys' team finished 4th in the Region III-A Meet. Kevin Schmidt was 1st in the 100 meter hurdles and 2nd in the 300 meter hurdles. Mark Skinner placed 1st in the 800 meter run. 






## Sidekicks and Spirit

Through all the hard work and practice they managed to keep adding sidekicks and spirit and making their school proud!


























One sophomore is selected from the class to represent his or her school at the state seminar. Students are selected for their leadership ability. This year's lucky sophomore was Larisa Teply.


Here are some of Larisa's thoughts about her weekend at the South Dakota HOBY seminar.


### Fast Fads Fade Away



The 1988-89 Declam team worked hard. Overall the students were DESTINED to do very well, and of course they did.











▶ J. Rosenbaum marches to the processional while M. Skinner awaits his turn.




