9. Jeremy Guenther-ADVICE TO UNDERCLASSMEN: "When you want to complain about something, find someone who cares."

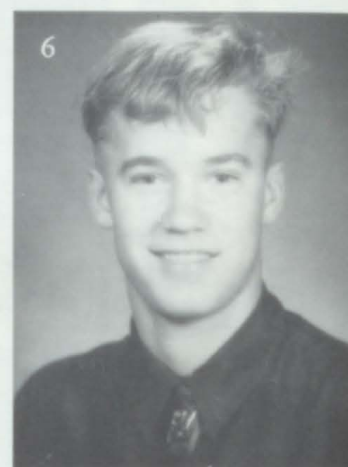

11. Heather Harkin-In ten years I see myself somewhere in Europe working in an embassy or somewhere in the U.S. working for the government. Married. No children.

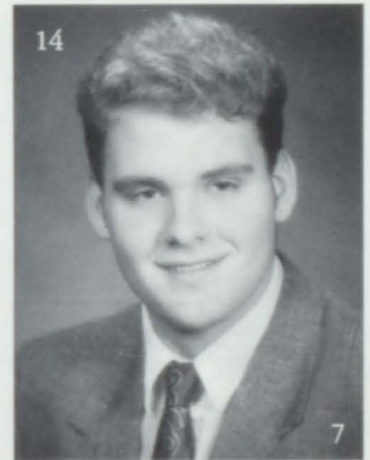
12. Robby Harkness-The thing I will remember about the class of 1993 is the trouble we didn't get into.

-Who was the "Big Hairy Caveman" that scared Beth Kavanaugh and Christine Menzenberg while driving around in Sioux City?

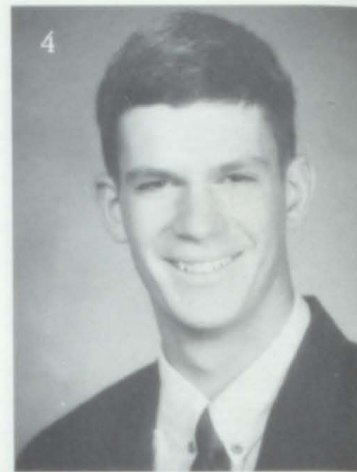
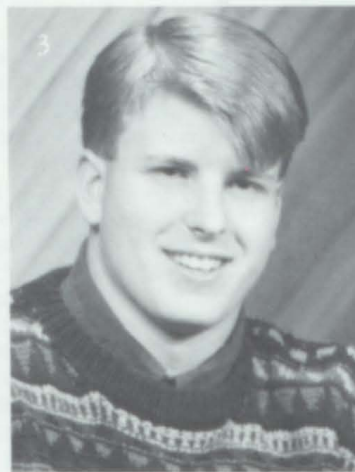
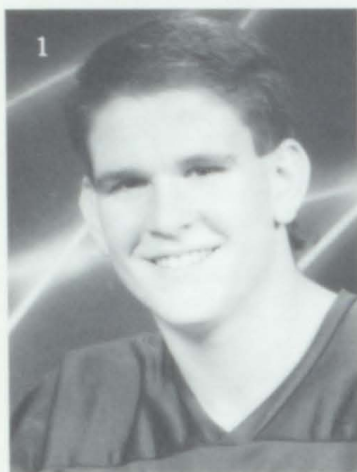

C. Schurdevin "hit an electric pole, and hit a post in front of the cop's house, I have also earned two speeding tickets."

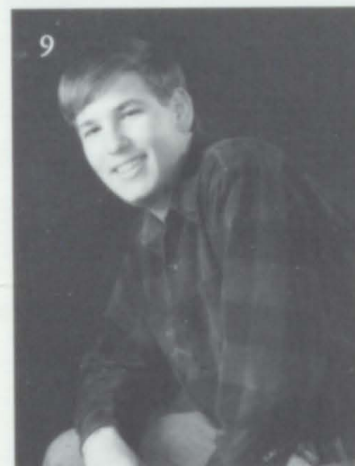

Being a freshman is not exactly FUN, but everyone has to start somewhere. Sooner or later they will realize how well off they have it when they become sophomores.

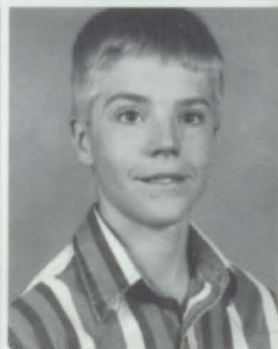

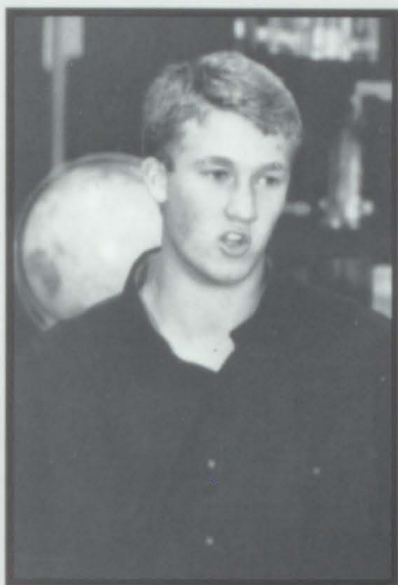


►Rhonda Van Roekel "hammers" the ball past the Alcester-Hudson defense at the district tournament.

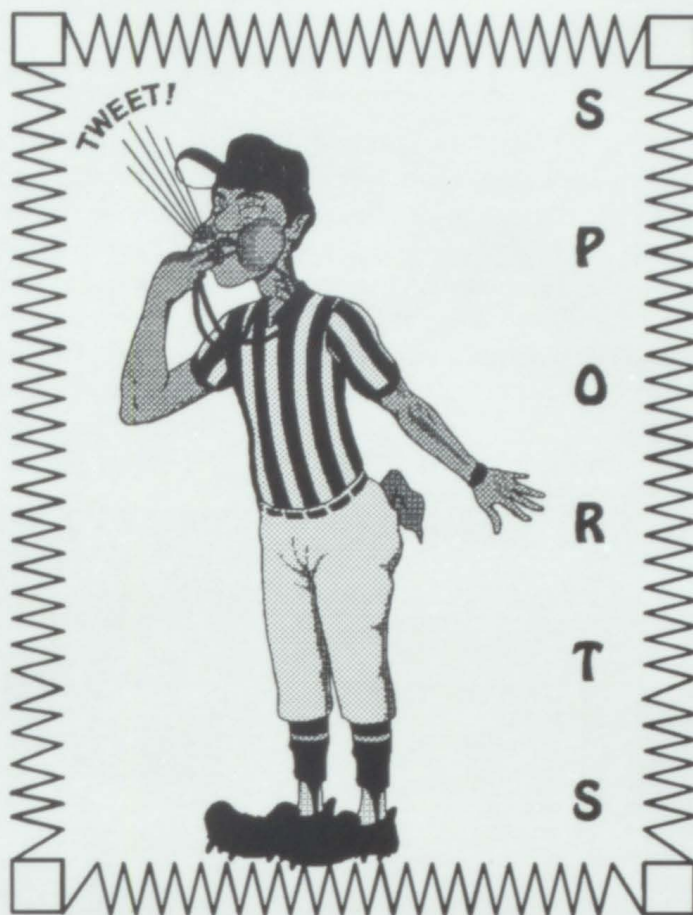




Jimmy Slattery feels that togetherness makes a team better. "Togetherness will cause people to play as a team, not like individuals. It makes all the difference in the world."

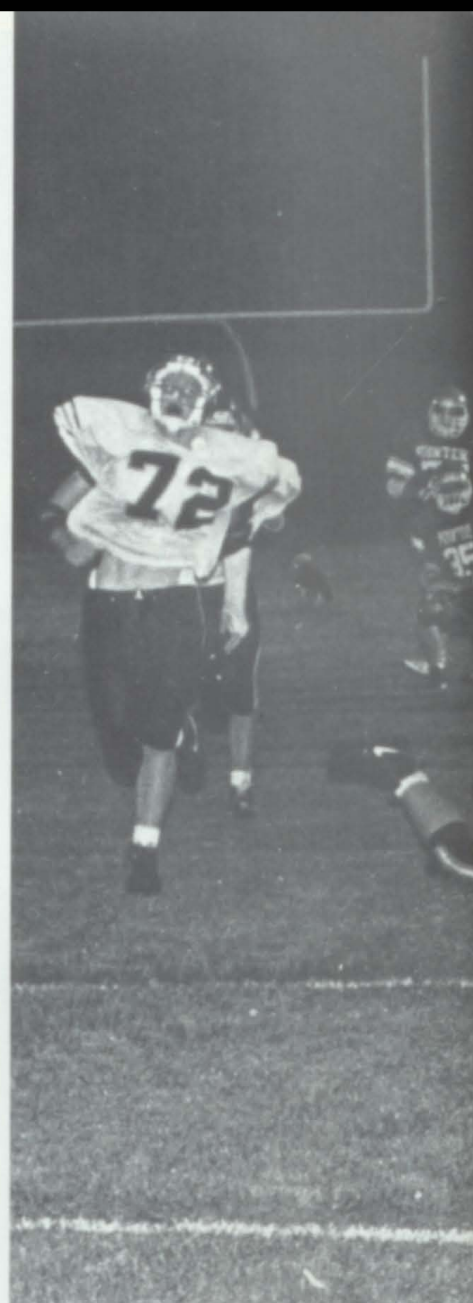

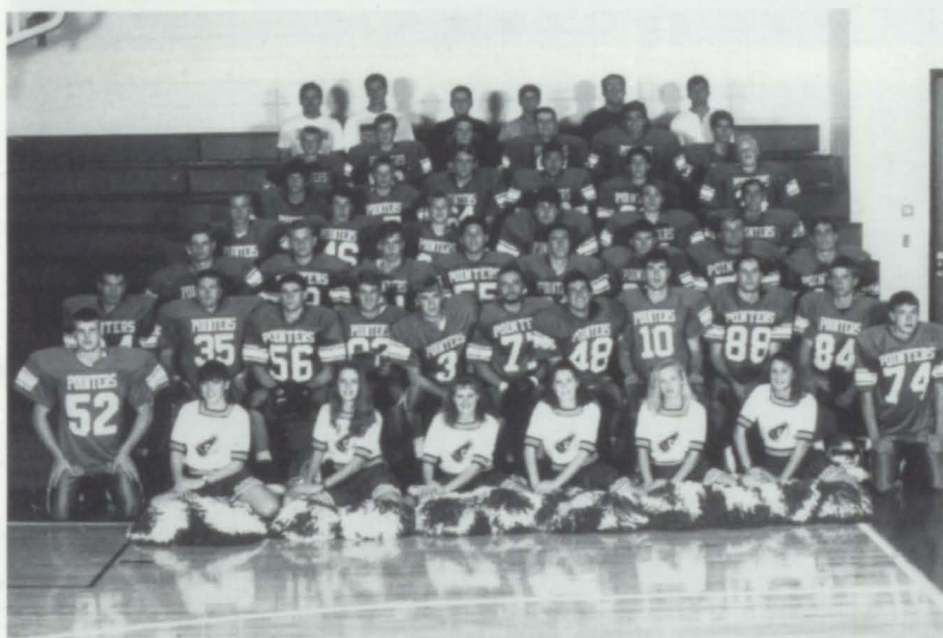

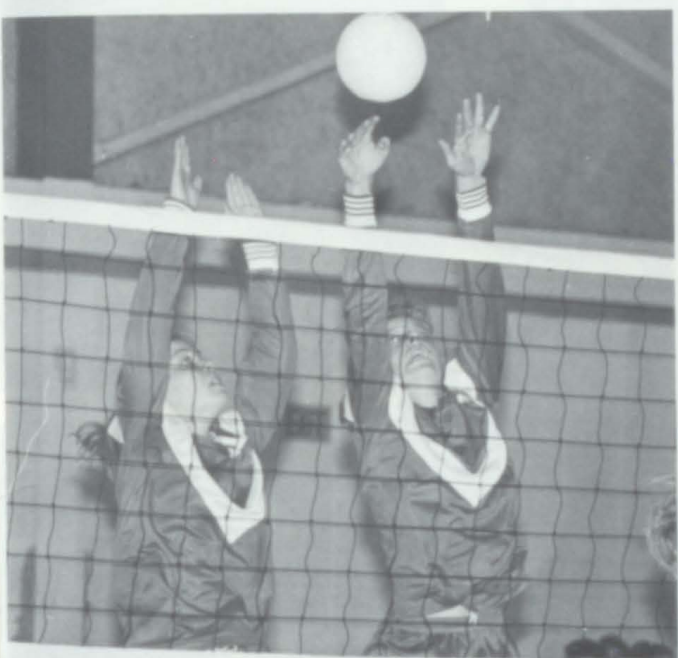

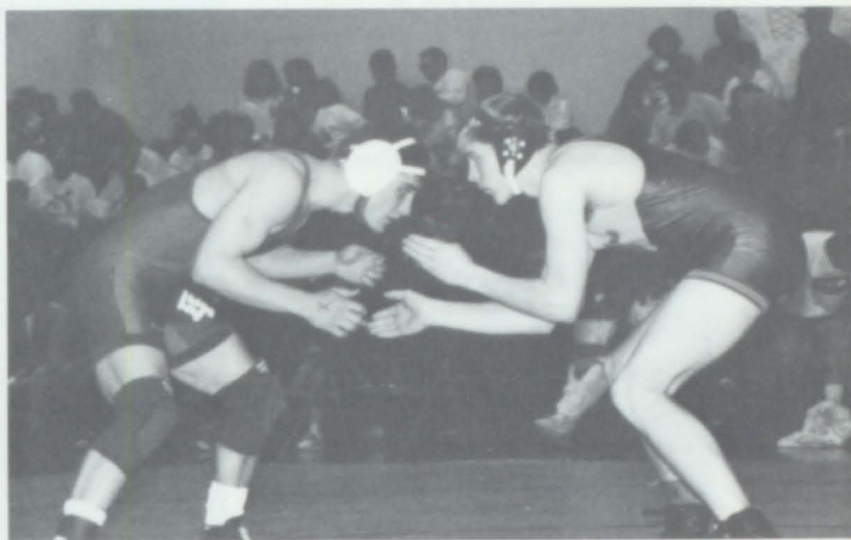

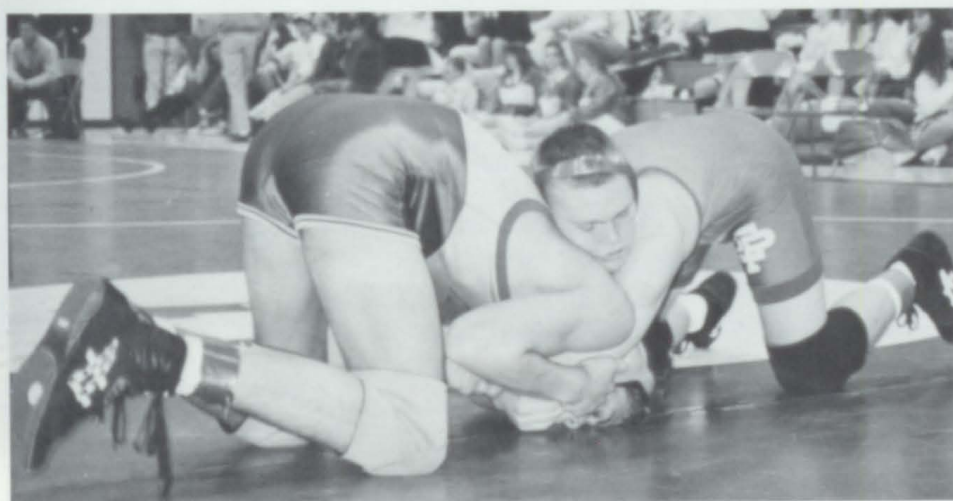

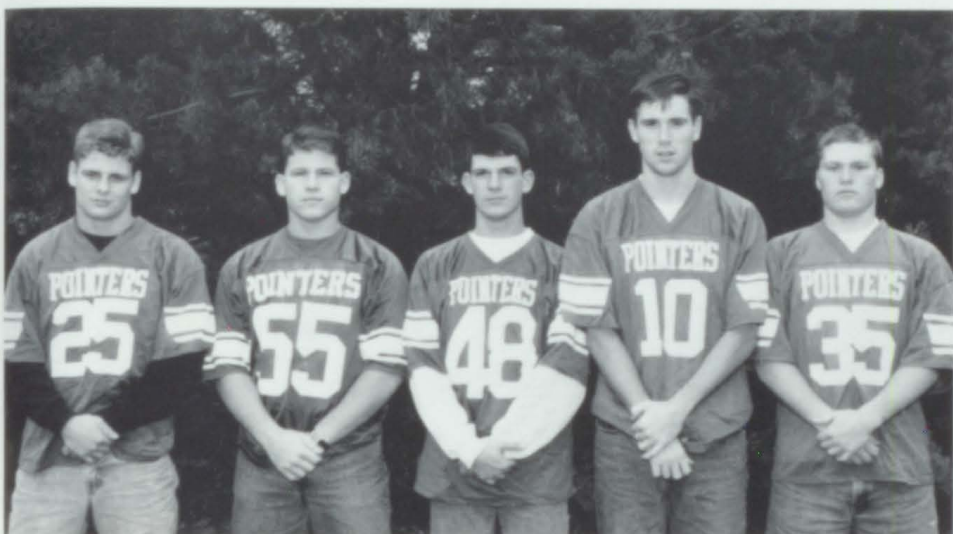

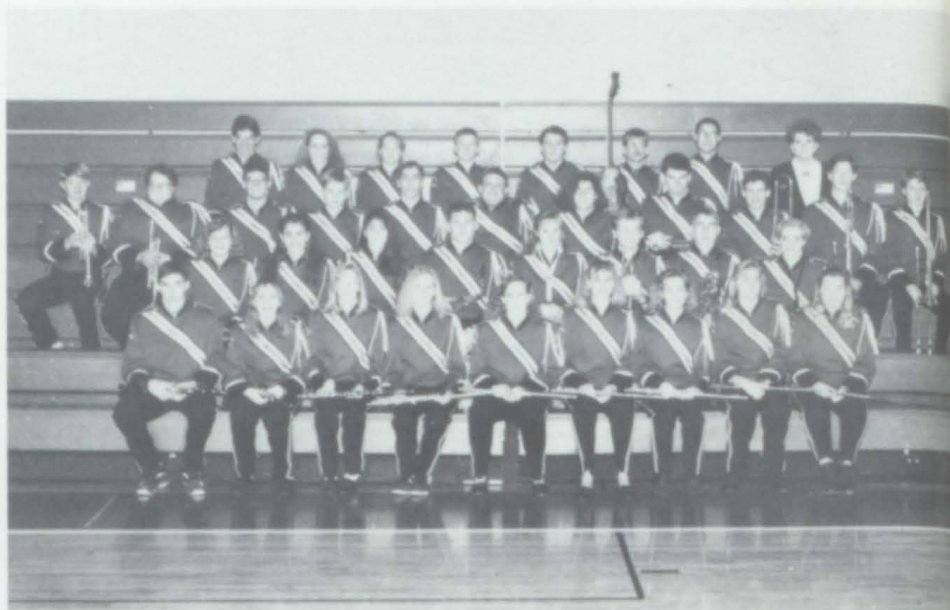

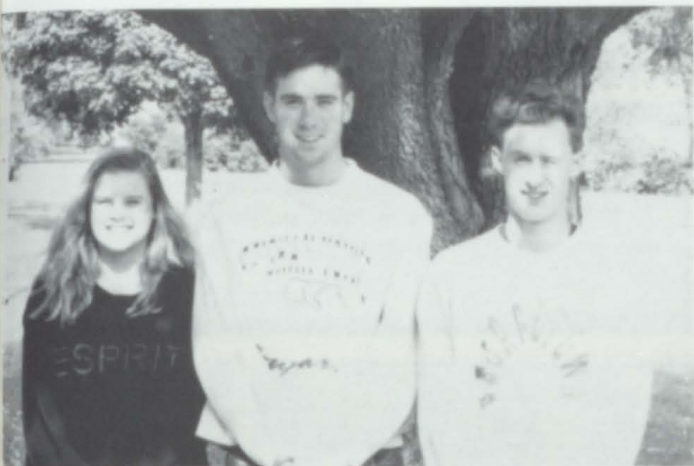

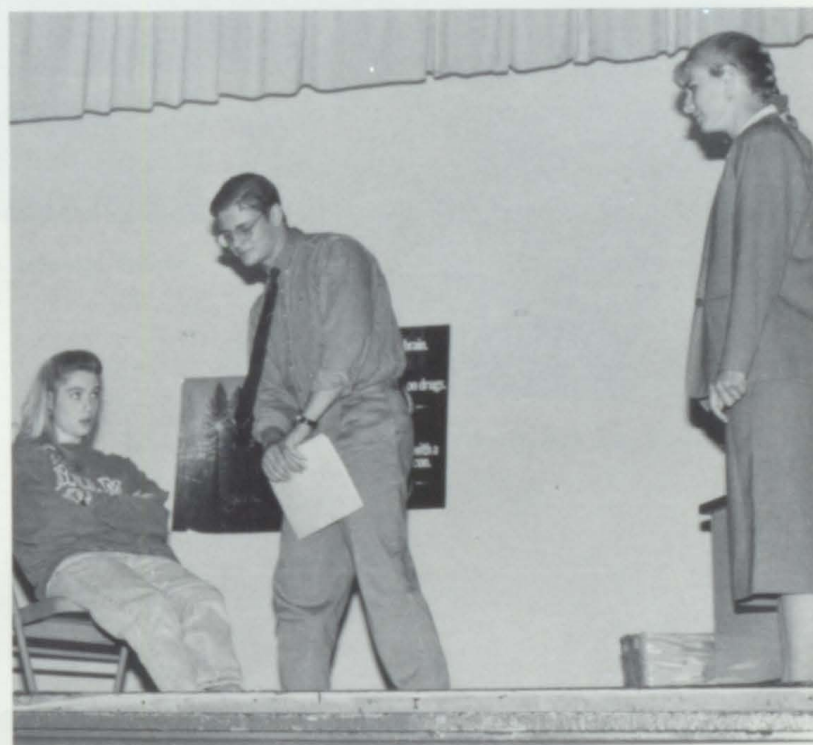

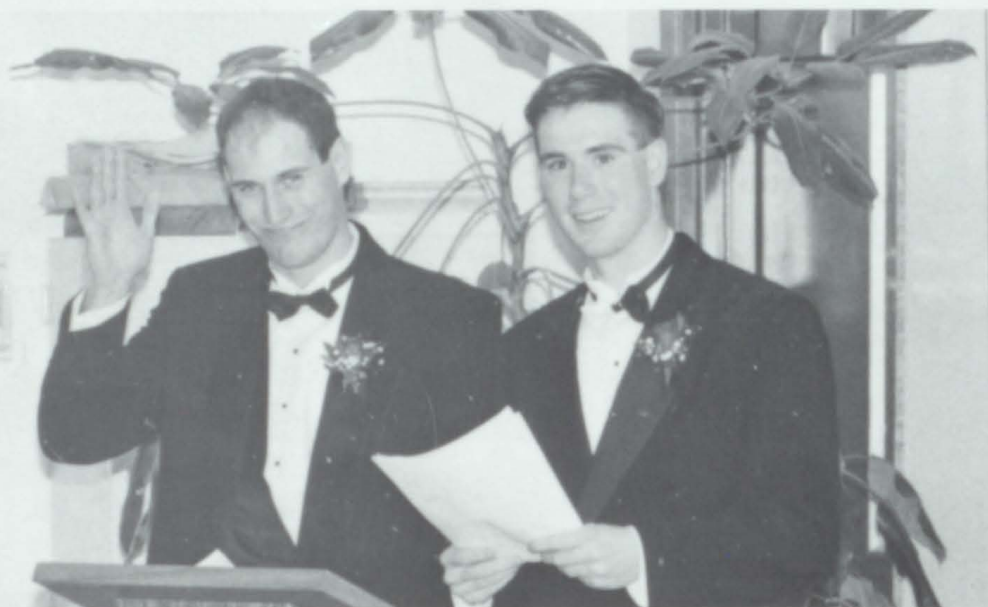
Fantasy Island

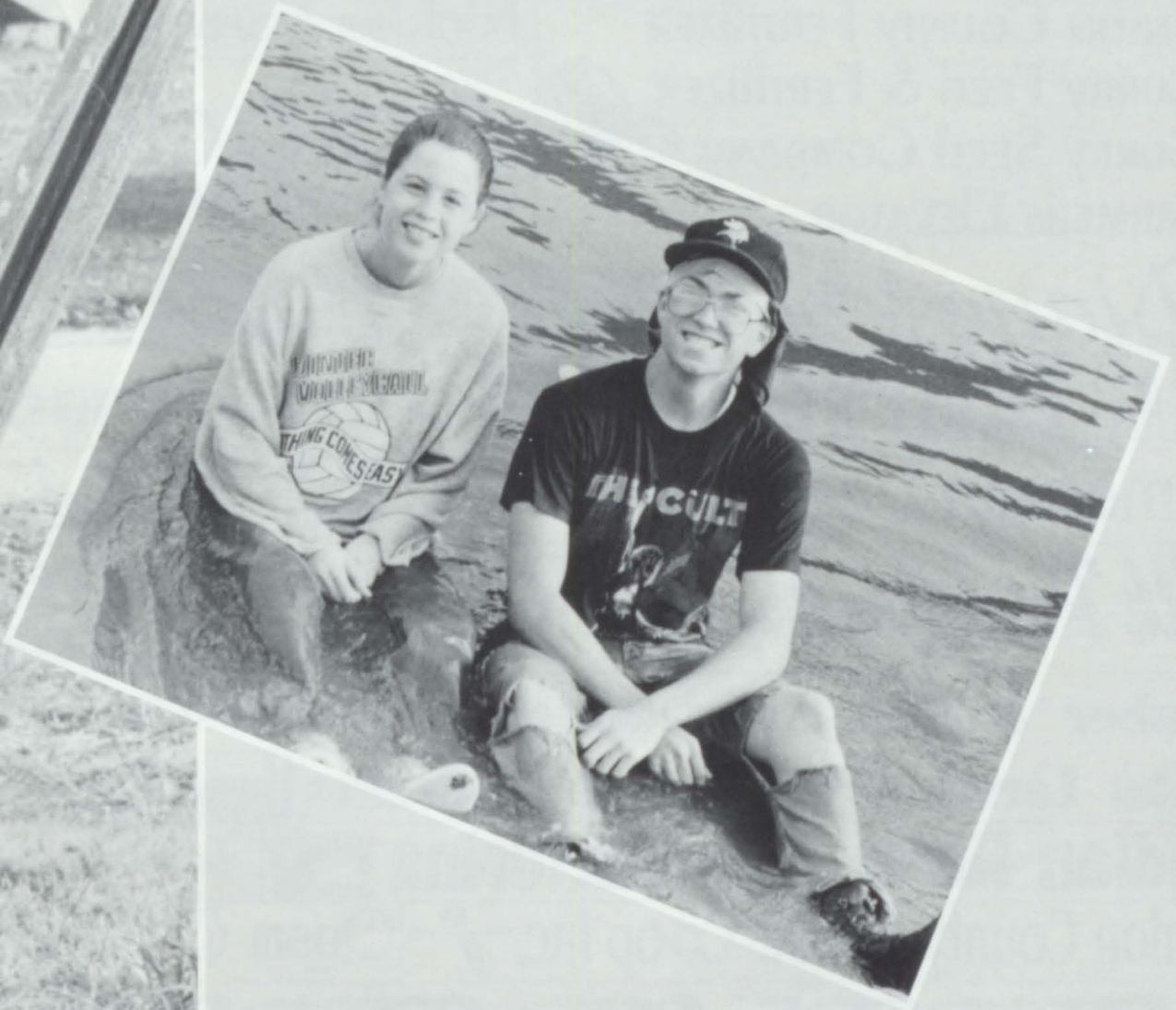
Dear EPHS Students,

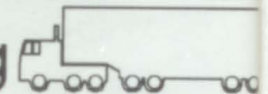

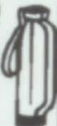

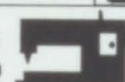
