





Unexpected Changes. . .

General School Rules

Since 1916, this high school has been known as EPHS, but as the 1993-94 school year comes to an end so does the proud legacy that has been known for over seventy years as Elk Point High School. With the upcoming consolidation between Elk Point and Jefferson, we, the senior class of 1994, decided to dedicate these two pages to the past and the present memories that have occurred within the walls of our school.

Things were much different in 1916. The architecture of the school building that we have now has changed drastically. The west wing of the old building is now gone and the elementary building has taken its place. The old gymnasium has been retired and the middle school holds the gymnasium. As well as the building changes, much of the curriculum offered to the students has changed with the times. In 1919, classes such as German, botany, and ag-

riculture were popular among students. While today's popular classes of computer applications and industrial tech were yet to be created. There were no sports offered for girls in 1916. Boys were allowed to participate in basketball, football, and track. The girls participated in more sedate and matronly activities such as socials, girls glee, and home economics. In our search for "EPHS Memorabilia," we found the very first graduation announcement and a copy of the grades of one of the first students to graduate from Elk Point. Classes were not held in the building that is being used today, but we do have a picture of the very first class to graduate from EPHS in 1916. We would like to dedicate these two pages to them, the very first class to graduate from EPHS from the very last class to graduate from EPHS.

1. *Beginners* — Children who have never attended school shall not enter after the second week of the fall term.
2. *Tardiness* — A pupil is considered tardy if he is not in the room when the tardy bell rings unless he has previously been excused by the teacher or superintendent.
3. *Teacher's Tardy* — Teachers shall be on the school premises before the first bell ceases to ring. Teachers are considered tardy if they enter later.
4. *Arrival* — Pupils who live near enough to the school shall take their dinners at home, and all excepting those who eat their dinners on the school premises shall not enter the premises until after the first bell ceases to ring. Under certain regulations the high school students may be excused from the above rule.
5. *At all dismissals* all grade pupils shall depart in orderly lines.
6. *Loitering* — Pupils shall not loiter on the way to or from school. No pupil shall remain on the school premises in the evening except by permission of the teacher or superintendent.
7. *Pupils must not trespass* upon neighboring property during play, nor upon any person's property on the way to or from school.
8. *Conduct Towards Teachers* — All pupils must be polite and respectful to all teachers at all times.
9. *Books* — Pupils should always promptly supply themselves with books, papers, pencils, and other supplies advised by the teacher.









Everyday life isn't just "everyday life" in the halls of EPHS. You see something different every time you walk through the doors---AND you never know what to expect.






















Take a moment to look at our organizations and the people who make them successful, we think you'll be surprised.







Many lifelong memories have been made at EPHS. As we prepare to leave EPHS for the last time, we take with us those **expected** and **unexpected** memories.


