




yet everyone was able to start kickin' it back and enjoy an



Fime to Unwind



eight gophers. The majority of the people auctioned were students, but a few teachers gave up their identity to become gophers. The student body raised


\$510.00 to donate for the cause. Once the masters paid for their gophers, the gophers had to wear anything they were told to wear. The masters also forced

The 2000 EPJ girls basketball team finished its season with a 14-6 overall record. Coach Fletcher reflected on the season. "....We had a successful season, however, the team knows that it did

not perform the way it was capable of during the district tournament. We won the conference tournament and the regular season conference championship as well. I know these girls are anxiously awaiting the start of the 2001 season." The Huskies won their seventh consecutive Big Sioux Con-

ference regular season title. Honors were earned by several Huskies. E. Kyte was named to the 1st team all-conference, A. Lee to the 2nd team all-conference, and S. Patnaude to the 3rd team all-conference. M. Limoges and Leslie Nebelsick received honorable mention honors. E. Kyte was also named to the all-Region 2nd team.

Even though the Huskies' season

ended sooner then expected, the Huskies put up a strong performance statistically. The Huskies averaged 50.9 ppg while their opponents averaged 46.8. Leading the team with

255 points was E. Kyte followed by A. Lee with a 163. Also scoring in triple digits was L. Nebelsick with 156 points, S. Patnaude with 143 points, and J. Fennel with 130. The Huskies sank 198 out of 340 attempts from the free throw line for a 58.2% average. Once again, the Huskies

out-rebounded their opponents by pulling down 582 offensive and defensive rebounds. Leslie Nebelsick was high rebounder pulling down 93 of the Huskies 582. She was followed by S. Patnaude with 91 and M. Rosenbaum with 90 rebounds. A. Lee and M. Rosenbaum contributed 52 assists each they were followed by Leslie Nebelsick with 44 and E. Kyte with 42.











Not only did the team go to the state tournament, but they


also got to stay an extra night due to weather. The wrestling team shattered many longstanding records at this year's state tournament. The team surpassed the long held record of 32 points


293 digs.














▼ Homecoming Coronation


