"Don't fall behind," said Ashley Begnoche. Also, many thought that holding the rope was a great way to keep their priorities straight.

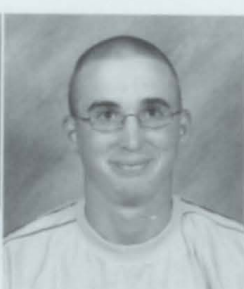

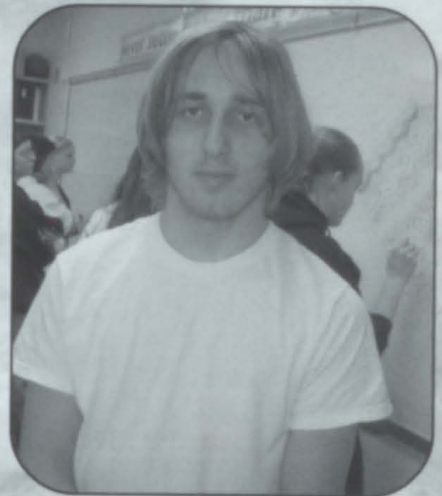
Day Dreaming

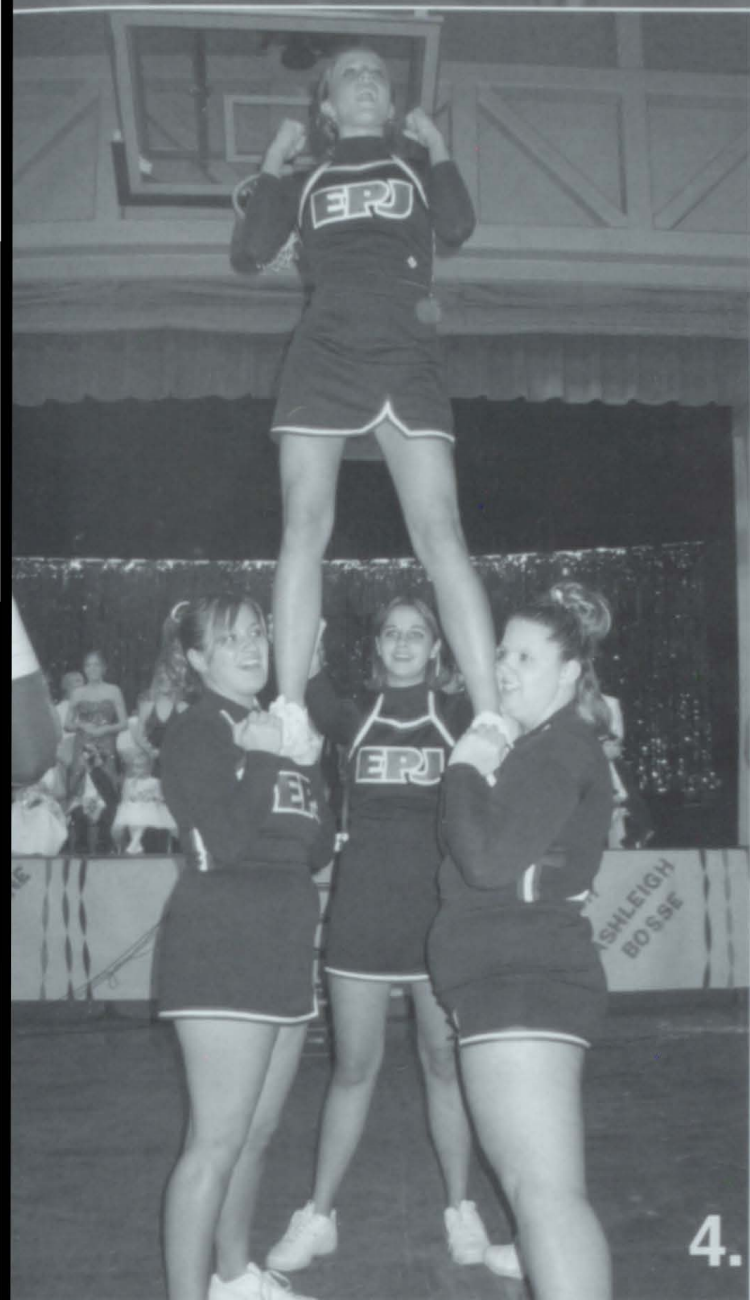

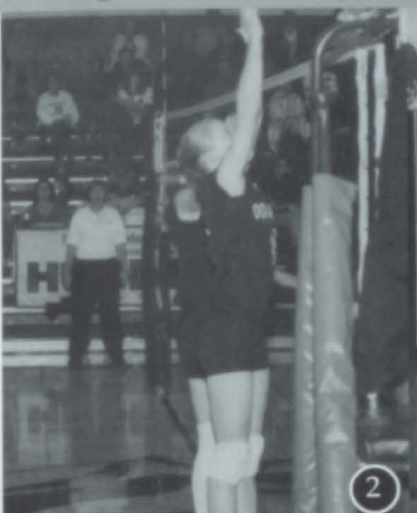
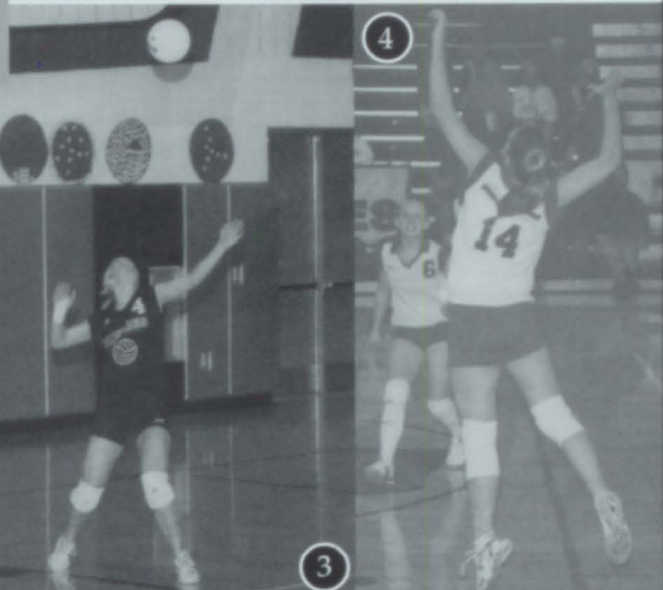

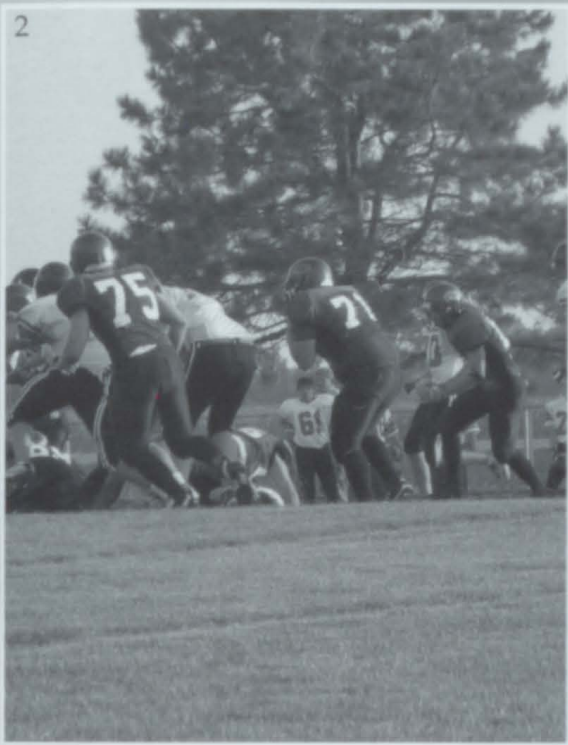

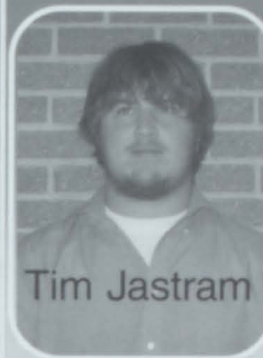

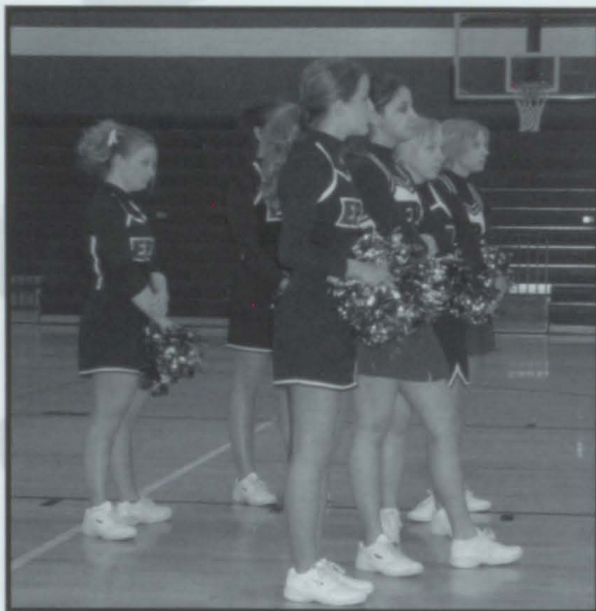

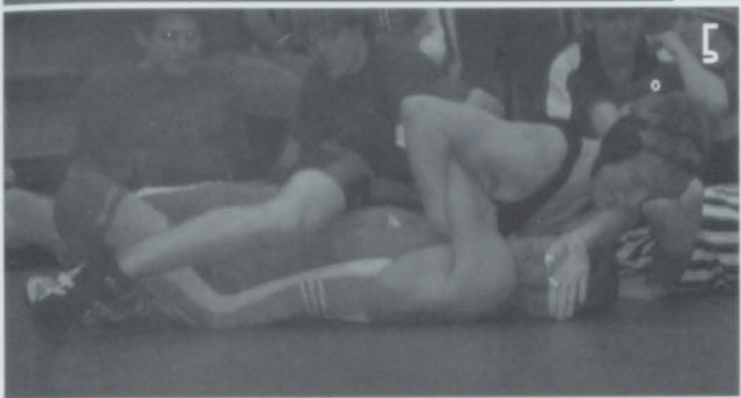

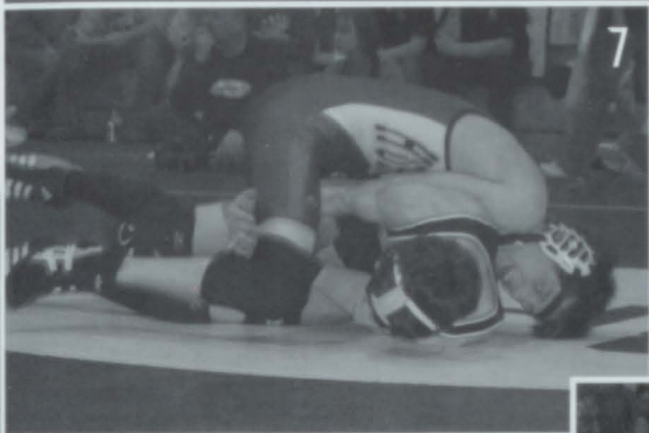

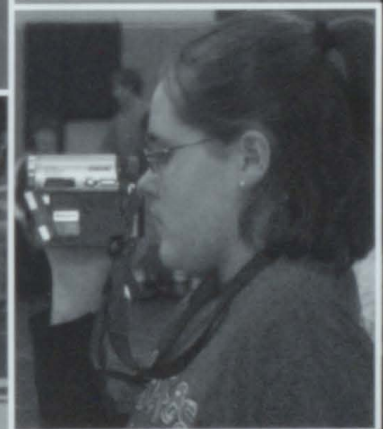

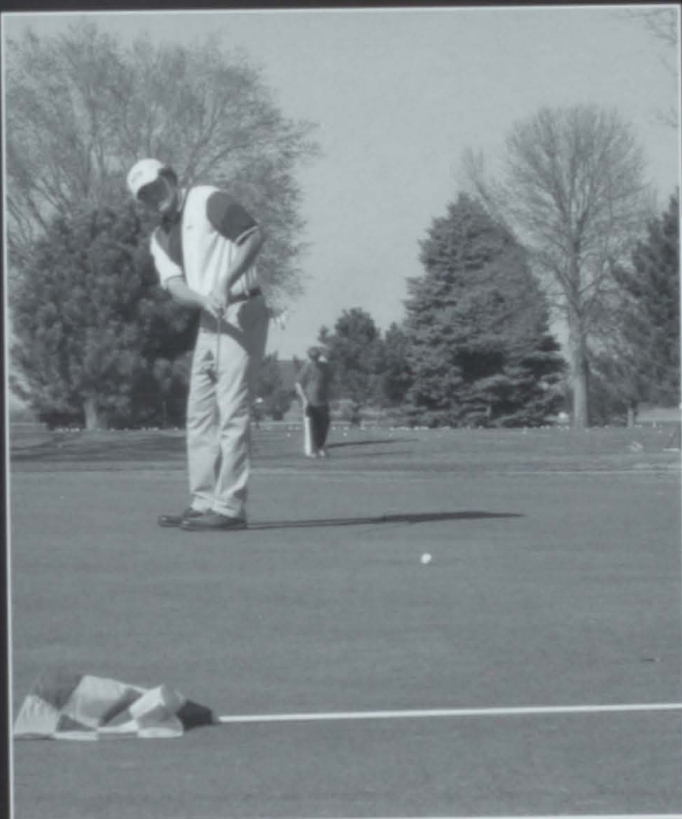

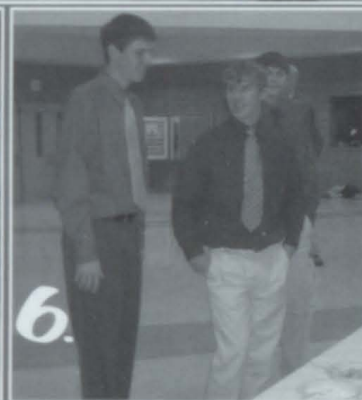

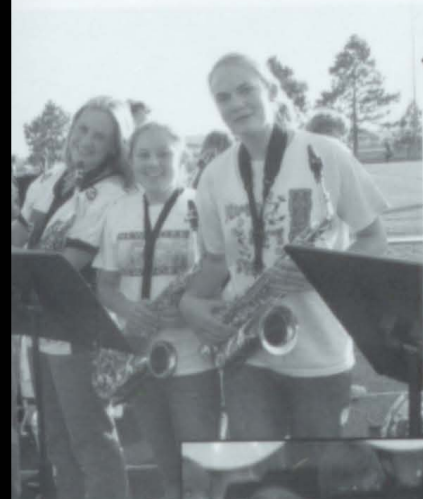

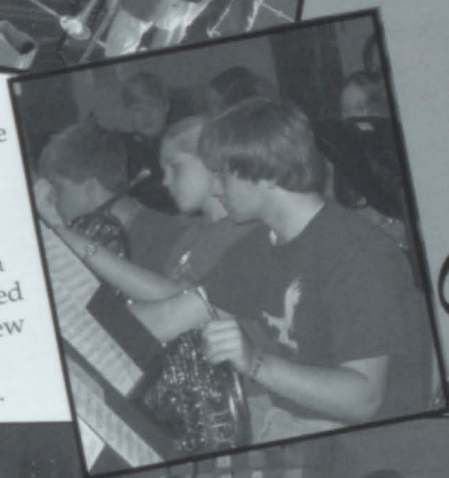

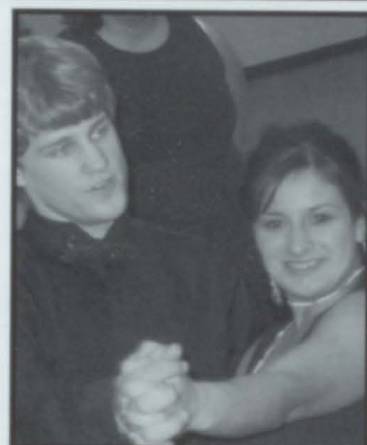

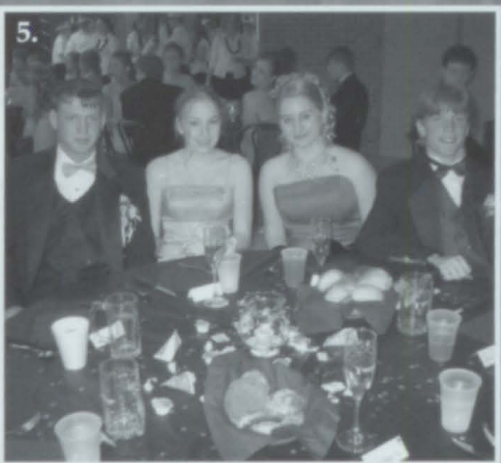

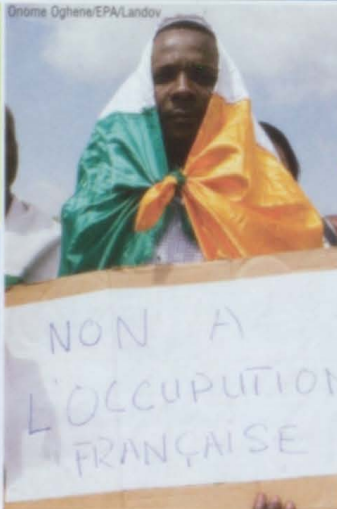

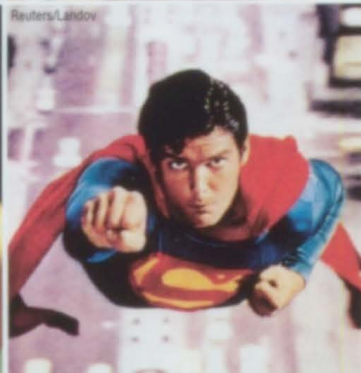

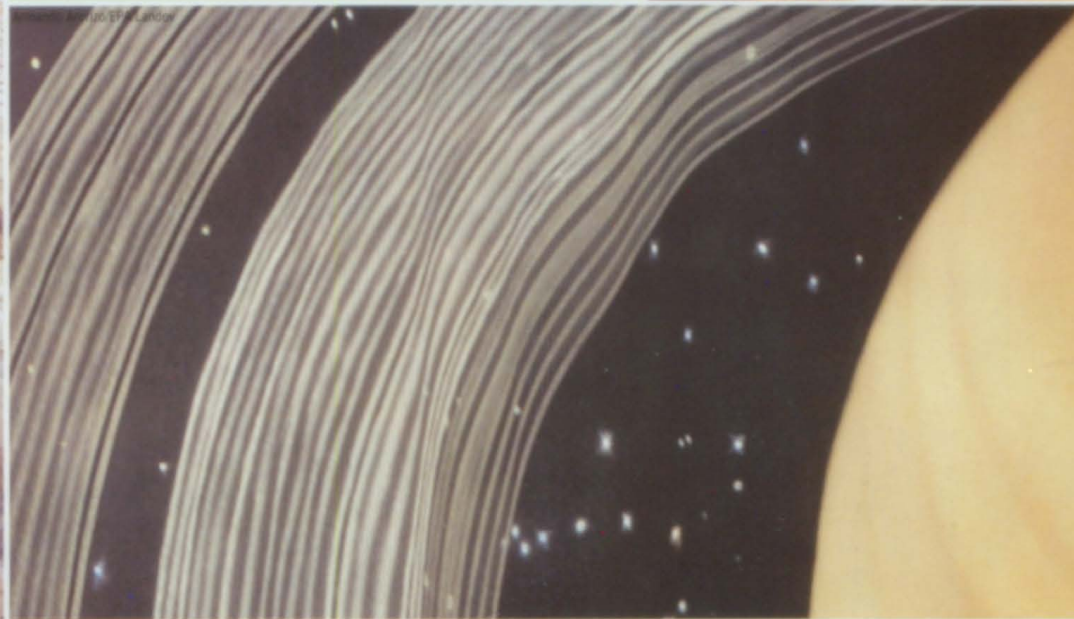

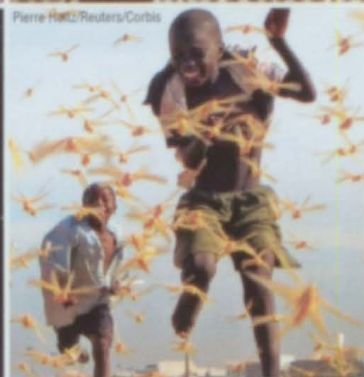

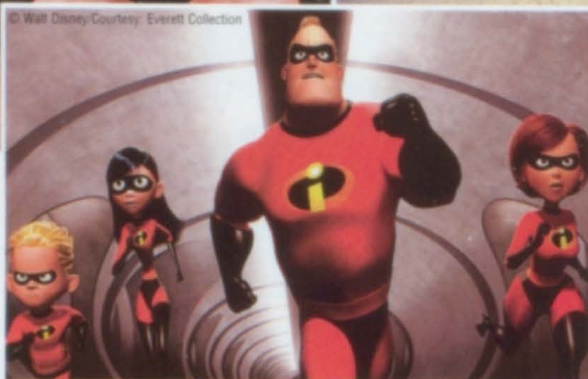

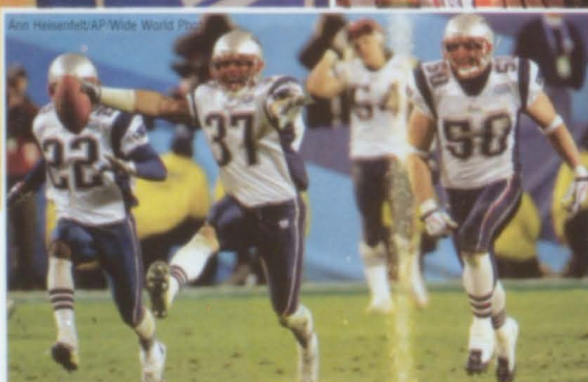
