Eastview (est. 1997) is a comprehensive & college preparatory public high school located in Apple Valley (suburban Minneapolis/St. Paul), Minnesota with an enrollment of 2150 students in grades 9-12. Eastview has been distinguished as one of "America's Best High Schools" by US News and World Report.

Our Mission: Educate, Inspire and Develop our students for lifelong success

Our faculty and staff believe that all students can learn through personalized student-centered engagement. Our talented faculty implements multilayered tiers of support while establishing alliances with students to empower them to learn. All of our Eastview Scholars engage in comprehensive programming, preparing them for post-secondary academic success for their college and career opportunities. And we dream together for what is next in our student's futures.

Comprehensive and Developmental Counseling Department

Our counseling department is dedicated to fostering an equitable and supportive environment where every student can thrive. Our services are personalized, student-centered and inclusive, promoting social and emotional learning with access to resources for academic, social, and personal success. Our commitment is to serve the diverse needs of our students while empowering them to develop resilience, build meaningful connections, and achieve their full potential.

Our Learning Community

District 196 encompasses 110 square miles and is located 15 miles south of Minneapolis & St. Paul. 165,000 residents and 29,000 students are served in 19 elementary, six middle & six high schools, and four specialized learning sites.

Our Faculty

College readiness is perpetuated by 230 faculty and staff members. Approximately 80% hold masters or doctorate degrees. 75% have 10 or more years of professional experience. All faculty members are engaged in focused collaborative teams of professional practice, where action research informs instruction.

Comprehensive & College Preparatory Curriculum

17 subject areas are offered, including: Honors & Advanced Placement, College in the Schools, AVID, STEM Scholar Program, six languages; emphasis on instrumental and vocal music, which includes an in-school private lesson program; theater & dance; Career Development opportunities; Special Education and work program alternatives. Bilingual/Multilingual Seals and World Language Proficiency Certification Program

Eastview recognizes the unique advantages of being a bilingual or multilingual speaker. Students are assessed in reading, writing, listening, and speaking in a language other than English and scored in all four areas based on proficiency guidelines established by the American Council on the Teaching of Foreign Languages (ACTFL). Students who meet proficiency guidelines are recognized with a notation on their transcript. Students in the Class of 2024 demonstrated proficiency in the following languages: Amharic, Arabic, Chinese, French, German, Japanese, Polish, Portuguese, Russian, Somali, Spanish, Tamil, Ukrainian, and Vietnamese.

Fine and Performing Arts, Athletics, Activities, Intramurals, Community Service and Leadership

Opportunities beyond the school day play a substantial role in providing meaningful learning for our students. Our Triple "A" philosophy is centered on the importance of Academics, Arts & Activities, and Athletics. More than 80% of our students are involved in state and nationally recognized activities. Over 110 different programs are offered to students to extend the spectrum of engagement, recreational involvement, personal development, competitive performance, leadership, and service to our community. Advanced Placement, Honors and U of M College in the Schools Courses (CIS)

Advanced Placement and Honors/Accelerated courses are offered across the curriculum and grade levels to meet the special needs of high-performing students interested in challenging and extending their intellectual potential. About 40% of our students take an Advanced Placement course and the associated AP Exam. 85% of those students will receive a 3 or better score on an AP Exam.

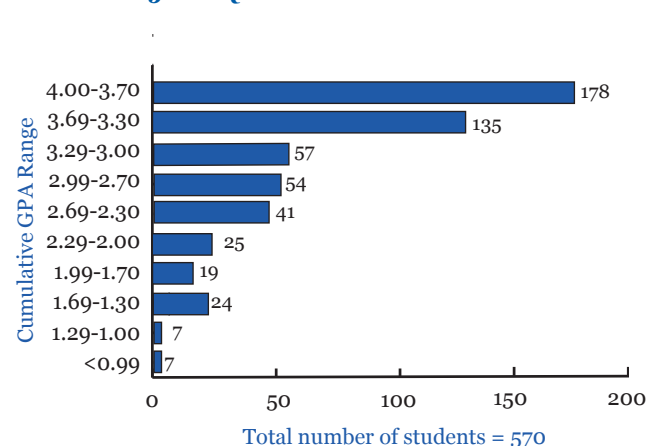
