Project SEARCH

Transitioning students with disabilities to work

Project SEARCH is a unique business-led transition program for students with disabilities. It provides students who want to work a chance to explore careers and develop transferable job skills. The ultimate goal: Independent adults working in a competitive environment.

Designed as an unpaid internship program, Project SEARCH places students in real-world situations where they learn all aspects of obtaining and maintaining a job. Large organizations – such as banks, hospitals, or universities – host the program. This process of immersion facilitates the teaching and learning of new work skills on-site.



Individualized job development and placement occurs based on the student's experiences, strengths, and skills. A series of internships lasting up to 10 weeks allow students to find positions that best suit their preferences. They receive support with accommodations, adaptations, and coaching by a skills trainer.

Students who have completed all requirements for graduation from high school may apply for enrollment in Project SEARCH. Participants may be 18 to 21 years old. Three elective credits can be earned for successful completion of the yearlong program.

Great Oaks provides Project SEARCH through a partnership with the Opportunities for Ohioans with Disabilities (OOD), and the host business sites which provide non-paid internship sites to develop competitive, marketable and transferrable skills.



Project SEARCH



A typical day's schedule

School day: August through May, Monday through Friday, 8 a.m. to 2:30 p.m.

- 8-9 a.m. Students attend employability skills class at the job site. Lessons are based on daily living such as check writing, nutrition, and resume writing. Instruction follows an approved Ohio Department of Education curriculum.
- 9-11:30 a.m. Students participate in non-paid job rotations throughout the location.
- 11:30 a.m.-12:15 p.m. Lunch
- 12:15-2 p.m. Students return to job rotations.
- 2-2:30 p.m. Students return to classroom for journal writing/reflection.

Job rotations

- Job rotations last about 10–12 weeks.
- Students are matched to the most appropriate job site based on interests and skills.
- Each student interviews for a job rotation placement.
- A job coach works with the student until the tasks assigned can be performed independently. The time and instruction is individualized.
- Students are evaluated by the job coach, the instructor, and the department supervisor.

Job placement

Job placement is the final goal of the program. Students can be employed at any time throughout the school year. The IEP team – which includes the student, family, Project SEARCH instructor, affiliated school representative, and vocational rehabilitation counselor – meets regularly to discuss progress and issues at work sites. The team assists each student in defining a career goal.

Eligibility criteria

- . Is 18 21 years old
- Student has an Individualized Education Program (IEP)
- Student has met all academic requirements for graduation
- Student needs extended learning services to prepare for transitioning to employment while diploma is held by school
- Student qualifies for services with Opportunities for Ohioans with Disabilities (OOD)
- Student is able and willing to follow all host site employee guidelines
- Students is able to pass site background checks
- Student has updated immunizations per site requirements
- Designed for students in the last year of school services in order to lead to employment
