The start of the school year always brings a sense of new beginnings and excitement. This year, especially, the energy in the district around the return to school was palpable. For the first time in three years, the first day of school felt normal. The anticipation - and relief - was real.

In late August, I had the opportunity to welcome all our staff back for the first time in person since I began my tenure at ECCS. I wish I could have bottled up what it felt like to be together in community, preparing ourselves for the work of this school year. All of our educators and support staff were fired up to see our students again, and their care and joy for their work was contagious.

At that staff meeting, we launched our district's new strategic plan. In July, our School Board approved the district's roadmap: our mission, vision, core values, and strategic directions.

I am proud of the work we did over the past two years, the long hours, the intentional engagement and time spent listening to feedback from our students, staff, families, and community. As a result, we have a clear direction, plans for each building and department, and metrics that will hold us accountable to the work.

NEW TRADITIONS

The 88 students who formerly attended East Union Elementary brought their school tradition of ringing in kindergartners with them to the first school assembly of the year at Clover eam it, you can do i Ridge Elementary. Five fifth graders rang the bell for each kindergarten class. The 125year-old school bell from East Union is now housed at Clover Ridge to carry on the traditional beginning and end of year ringing to welcome in new students and celebrate fifth graders at the end of the year moving on to middle school.

STEADFAST COMMITMENT TO PERSONALIZED LEARNING

The commitment to personalized learning has remained steadfast in Eastern Carver County Schools for many years. Personalized learning is a student-centered framework that drives teaching and learning to prioritize what helps each student achieve their personal best. Our teachers prioritize what students need and make adjustments for students in how they plan, prepare, and interact with students.

The new district strategic plan highlights the importance of personalized learning as one of the four strategic directions: Improving teaching and personalized learning for the development of each learner.

The focused efforts of past years include defining learning targets, power standards, and creating collaborative spaces- these all continue now as standard practices in ECCS. This year our staff is focused on increased student engagement, active learning, and collaboration. In our classrooms that means students are talking more, working with others, using multiple resources to find information, and asking questions. In the shared areas of our schools this means student groups of all sizes will be collaborating, practicing, researching, and learning in the places that best support their needs.

Walking the halls this September, I am filled with hope and optimism about our shared future. We have a tremendous staff lifting up our students, challenging them and supporting them. I see students who are connecting with each other and their teachers, engaged in their learning. There is so much to be proud of and I hope you share in that feeling as a member of our community.

When I started as your superintendent, in the midst of some very real challenges, I talked about how as a community we are stronger together. Now, with a strategic plan guiding us, and a shared commitment to what's best for every child, I am excited about how we are moving forward together.

Summer educational programming

The six-week Summer Learning program was a way to provide enriching opportunities to support student learning beyond the school year in core academic areas and prepared students for the school year ahead. In addition to learning, social emotional and leadership development and high school credit attainment were part of the programming.

"We really wanted to take a proactive approach to summer learning," said Chris Hentges, leader of personalized learning, digital services. He added that by using hands-on learning experiences that were both engaging and fun, strong student connections, relationships and classroom communities were built.

Camp Emoji, an interactive camp designed to help students learn about, manage, and identify emotions, was well received by both parents and students. Parents all responded "yes" that their child felt connected and included during the program.

EARLY CHILDHOOD SCREENING





Between the ages of 3 and 4, screening can detect possible health or learning concerns so that children can get help before they start school. Early Childhood Screening is not a "test." Your child will not pass/fail. It is a tool to identify concerns, if any exist, to provide help before kindergarten. Screening is required before entering kindergarten in a MN public school. Early childhood developmental screening helps identify children who may benefit from district and community resources available to help in their development.
