Virtual community meeting on safety set for Oct. 17

Charles County Public Schools (CCPS) is hosting a 6 p.m. virtual community meeting about safety in schools on Monday, Oct. 17. The meeting will be held on the Zoom platform and is open to any CCPS parent, staff or community member. Anyone joining the meeting will need an active Zoom account to participate. Superintendent of Schools Maria Navarro, Ed.D., will open the meeting followed by staff providing a brief oral presentation about safety in schools. Topics of the meeting will include staff background checks, required training for CCPS staff, the CCPS visitor management system, CCPS social media rules for staff includ-

ing communication with students, the CCPS cell phone policy, age-appropriate instruction and curriculum, and counseling lessons and other mental health supports.

CCPS staff reserve the right to remove any participant from the meeting for inappropriate conduct. The meeting format is that of a Zoom webinar, in which participants will not automatically enter the meeting with audio and video controls. Staff will ask those who want to ask questions or provide comments to use the virtual hand raise tool in Zoom and/or the chat feature. Video and audio access will be provided to participants who wish to speak during the meeting.

Special education virtual discussions set

The Charles County Public Schools (CCPS) special education department is hosting two virtual discussions and one inperson meeting. Tia McKinnon, Ed.D., director of special education, will meet with families of CCPS students with disabilities to talk about what is working in CCPS regarding the specialized services it provides to their students through sessions called Collaboration Through Conversation. Participants will have an opportunity to share their experiences and different perspectives to assist in the continual growth of special education in CCPS.

The first virtual meeting will be held on Thursday, Oct. 20, from 6:30 to 7:30 p.m. The second meeting is set for Feb. 6, at the same time. Parents and guardians who are interested in joining Collaboration Through Conversation can sign up here.

The special education department is also hosting an in-person Special Education Expo on March 18 from 8:30 a.m. to 4 p.m. at North Point High School.

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CCPS partners with community organizations for healthy children initiative

Charles County Public Schools (CCPS) Superintendent Maria V. Navarro, Ed.D., joined representatives of the Charles County Branch of the NAACP, Charles County Department of Health, the American Heart Association and the Center for Science in the Public Interest, on Oct. 4 to accept a proclamation recognizing October as National Children's Health Month.

Presented by the Charles County Commissioners, the proclamation recognizes that children need care and guidance to grow up healthy and safe.

The proclamation is the first step community organizations such as CCPS are taking to ensure children are introduced to and develop healthy eating and exercise habits that will benefit them throughout their lives.

"As educators, we are focused on fueling the minds of our students as they develop into critical thinkers," Navarro said. "As such, children and teens improve their decision making and refine their problem-solving abilities. These skills are exercised beyond the classroom. They are weaved into every aspect of a person's life. When a young person makes the decision to opt for healthy meals and take part in physical activities, they are making the decision to invest in their health and wellbeing."

Nominate principal, teacher for honors

Charles County Public Schools (CCPS) is looking for nominees for its annual Principal of the Year award. The award honors exemplary leaders for not only their leadership, but for their commitment to providing an exceptional learning environment for students. The principal chosen for the honor will also represent CCPS as the county finalist for *The Washington Post* Principal of the Year award.

Each year, *The Post* selects an overall award recipient for its Principal of the Year award from among finalists in the Washington, D.C., metropolitan area. Principals can be nominated by staff, students, parents, colleagues or community members, but are not eligible if they have received the honor in the past.

Criteria for nominees includes five years of experience as a principal, three of which are required to be with CCPS, and a commitment to maintain their position as a principal with the school system for the 2023-2024 school year.

Charles County Public Schools (CCPS) is accepting nominations for *The Washington Post* and Maryland Teacher of the Year awards programs. Nominated teachers will be considered as honorees in either one or the other awards program. Schools and centers should submit one teacher nominee annually.

Nomination criteria include a minimum of five complete years of teaching and must be a full-time classroom teacher in prekindergarten through Grade 12.

Submission suggestions can be made by teachers, students or community members. Anyone interested in suggesting a teacher for nomination should contact the school in which the teacher works. Nominees who have received either The Post teacher finalist award or were named Charles County Teacher of the Year in the past three years are not eligible. One CCPS teacher will be selected from the pool of nominees by a committee of school system staff to represent Charles County as the Charles County Teacher of the Year and finalist for the Maryland Teacher of the Year award.
