Where a statewide summative assessment was not the most viable option for the LEA (or for one or more grade-level[s] within the LEA) due to the pandemic, LEAs were allowed to report results from a different assessment that met the criteria established by the State Board of Education (SBE) on March 16, 2021. The assessments were required to be:

- Aligned with CA CCSS for ELA and mathematics;
- Available to students in grades 3 through 8, and grade 11; and
- Uniformly administered across a grade, grade span, school, or district to all eligible students.

#### Options

Note that the CAAs could only be administered in-person following health and safety requirements. If it was not viable for the LEA to administer the CAAs in person with health and safety guidelines in place, the LEA was directed to not administer the tests. Schools administered the Smarter Balanced Summative Assessments for ELA and mathematics, other assessments that meet the SBE criteria, or a combination of both, and they could only choose one of the following:

- Smarter Balanced ELA and mathematics summative assessments;
- Other assessments meeting the SBE criteria; or
- Combination of Smarter Balanced ELA and mathematics summative assessments and other assessments.

## Percentage of Students Meeting or Exceeding the State Standard on CAASPP

School Night in September and Family Learning Nights in October and May are opportunities to see and hear about classroom procedures and curriculum. The School Site Council (SSC) meets monthly in the late afternoon, and the Home and School Club (Padres Unidos) and the English Learner Advisory Committee (ELAC) meet monthly. The parents who attend these groups are actively engaged in decision-making and fundraising. If family members are not able to attend meetings, they are encouraged to keep in touch and help in other ways. We have a bilingual school secretary who is able to answer questions and help all of our families and students. Parent Achievement Academies are provided to parents interested in becoming more engaged with their child's teacher and the principal. Cradle to Career is an ongoing parent involvement program that has incorporated a parent liaison to work with all of our families. The group leader and parents talk about the factors that are essential for their child to be prepared for school all the way through college.

This year Live Oak Elementary School hosts numerous events, such as virtual back to school night and other controlled outside meetings and events. Cradle to Career and parents host bi-monthly food drives to serve the community at large and an extensive monetary distribution program.

## 2021-22 School Safety Plan

Teachers, administrators, support staff and first responders work together to ensure that we maintain a safe and positive learning environment for all students. All visitors are required to check-in at the front office and playground staff supervise students on the playground and cafeteria. This year we have added a comprehensive health screening program to address the Covid-19 pandemic. We have also implemented strict protocols that govern the small cohort programs implemented at the school site. All of our schools also implement Positive Behavioral Supports and Interventions and Second Step Curriculum to foster social-emotional well-being, including anti-bullying lessons.

Pursuant to Sections 32280 - 32289.5 of the California Education Code, Live Oak Elementary School District, develops and adopts a Comprehensive School Safety Plan on an annual basis. The current 2020-2021 Comprehensive Safety Plan was reviewed and adopted on February 25, 2021, by the District's Board of Directors. The 2021-2022 Live Oak Elementary School District Comprehensive Safety Plan, including both the public and internal components, will be reviewed and considered for adoption on February 16, 2022, and includes but is not limited to both of the following:

- (1) Assessing the current status of school crime committed on school campuses and at school-related functions.
- (2) Identifying appropriate strategies and programs that will provide or maintain a high level of school safety and address the school's procedures for complying with existing laws related to school safety, which shall include the development of all of the following:
  - (A) Child abuse reporting procedures consistent with Article 2.5 (commencing with Section 11164) of Chapter 2 of Title 1 of Part 4 of the Penal Code.
  - (B) Disaster procedures, routine and emergency, including adaptations for pupils with disabilities in accordance with the federal Americans with Disabilities Act of 1990 (42 U.S.C. Sec. 12101 et seq.). The disaster procedures shall also include, but not be limited to, both of the following:
    - (i) Establishing an earthquake emergency procedure system in every public school building having an occupant capacity of 50 or more pupils or more than one classroom. A school district or county office of education may work with the Office of Emergency Services and the Alfred E. Alquist Seismic Safety

Commission to develop and establish the earthquake emergency procedure system. The system shall include, but not be limited to, all of the following:

- (I) A school building disaster plan, ready for implementation at any time, for maintaining the safety and care of pupils and staff. The department shall provide general direction to school districts and county offices of education on what to include in the school building disaster plan.
- (II) A drop procedure whereby each pupil and staff member takes cover under a table or desk, dropping to his or her knees, with the head protected by the arms, and the back to the windows. A drop procedure practice shall be held at least once each school quarter in elementary schools and at least once a semester in secondary schools.
- (III) Protective measures to be taken before, during, and following an earthquake.
- (IV) A program to ensure that pupils and both the certificated and classified staff are aware of, and properly trained in, the earthquake emergency procedure system.
- (ii) Establishing a procedure to allow a public agency, including the American Red Cross, to use school buildings, grounds, and equipment for mass care and welfare shelters during disasters or other emergencies affecting the public health and welfare. The school district or county office of education shall cooperate with the public agency in furnishing and maintaining the services as the school district or county office of education may deem necessary to meet the needs of the community.
- (C) Policies pursuant to subdivision (d) of Section 48915 for pupils who committed an act listed in subdivision (c) of Section 48915 and other school-designated serious acts that would lead to suspension, expulsion, or mandatory expulsion recommendations pursuant to Article 1 (commencing with Section 48900) of Chapter 6 of Part 27 of Division 4 of Title 2.
- (D) Procedures to notify teachers of dangerous pupils pursuant to Section 49079.
- (E) A discrimination and harassment policy consistent with the prohibition against discrimination contained in Chapter 2 (commencing with Section 200) of Part 1.
- (F) The provisions of any schoolwide dress code, pursuant to Section 35183, that prohibits pupils from wearing "gang-related apparel," if the school has adopted that type of a dress code. For those purposes, the comprehensive school safety plan shall define "gang-related apparel." The definition shall be limited to apparel that, if worn or displayed on a school campus, reasonably could be determined to threaten the health and safety of the school environment. A schoolwide dress code established pursuant to this section and Section 35183 shall be enforced on the school campus and at any school-sponsored activity by the principal of the school or the person designated by the principal. For purposes of this paragraph, "gang-related apparel" shall not be considered a protected form of speech pursuant to Section 48950.
- (G) Procedures for safe ingress and egress of pupils, parents, and school employees to and from school.
- (H) A safe and orderly environment conducive to learning at the school.
- (I) The rules and procedures on school discipline adopted pursuant to Sections 35291, 35291.5, 47605, and 47605.6.
- (J) Procedures for conducting tactical responses to criminal incidents, including procedures related to individuals with guns on school campuses and at school-related functions. The procedures to prepare for active shooters or other armed assailants shall be based on the specific needs and context of each school and community.

## 2020-21 Types of Services Funded

Live Oak has a well-developed Response To Intervention (RTI) Program managed by a highly qualified Intervention Specialist funded by Title I. All students are assessed at regular intervals throughout the year to determine the need for services. We utilize multiple literacy programs to respond to intervention and support including Systematic Instruction in Phonological Awareness, Phonics, and Sight Words (SIPPS) for all students in grades 1 and 2. Our 3-5 grade students are provided with additional comprehension support through ACT resources and also participate in targeted instruction at their instructional level through our RTI program. We provide access to Star Early Literacy for students TK to 2 and Accelerated Reader for students 2-5, reading comprehension and motivational program that continuously measures reading progress throughout the year. These additional programs are paid for by LCFF and Title I. Our outdoor science/lifelab instructor is paid for by local parcel taxes and through school fundraising efforts. The parcel taxes also pay for our music, art, and p.e. specialists as well as our mindfulness coach.

We employ a full time health clerk, mental health clinician and recess coach as well.

Translations of all materials are made available to the families we serve and are paid for through Title I categorical programs.
