

# MESSAGE FROM THE CHAIR OF THE BOARD A YEAR OF GRATITUDE AND HOPE

The 2021-22 school year was one of challenges and, as always, blessings.

Our most essential blessing is the 1070 students attending our school daily. Transitioning from the pandemic restrictions was complex for students, faculty, and families. Vancouver College rose to the challenges, as always. We are especially proud of the Class of 2022, who had an uncommon experience in Grades 10 and 11 and finished their Grade 12 year strong, showing resilience and determination. The pandemic has reminded us of our need for the presence and care of one another. The gift of being together 'in-person' is one that we all value anew.

We all appreciate the incredible blessings of the new Lannon Hall and our Manrell Hall, the realization of monumental community achievement. We are grateful to the countless many whose generosity and hard work contributed to the fulfillment of Our Next Century's ambitious redevelopment project.

This year began the excitement of preparing for the celebration of the 100th anniversary of Vancouver College in the coming 2022-23 school year. Groups busily gathered memorabilia, stories, and planned celebration events, in anticipation of a fabulous Centenary year ahead.

At the same time, the school is grappling with the fact that over a year ago, in February 2021, allegations of physical and sexual abuse of students who attended Vancouver College from 1976 to 2013 by former Christian Brothers faculty were brought forward. These allegations weigh heavily upon us. Vancouver College expresses profound concern and sympathy to anyone who has been impacted in any way by any abuse. A hearing commenced in the Summer to determine whether the litigation would proceed as a class action. The hearing will resume once again later this Fall, and at that time, we hope to have greater clarity on the legal steps to follow.

To ensure our school is a safe environment for students, faculty, and the entire VC community. Vancouver College enforces a comprehensive set of policies, protocols, screening processes, and procedures. These policies are

reviewed regularly to ensure the highest standards are maintained and best practices are in place. We are also committed to regularly updating the Vancouver College community on this litigation as we are able.

This year, President Johnny Bevacqua led the school in a milestone undertaking: a *Strategic Planning Project*. This project involved the VC community at all levels, garnering remarkable participation including from our alumni. A 'Strategy Development Team,' composed of Faculty, Board and Staff members, worked together to refresh VC's Vision, Mission, and Values statements and to define four significant goals, creating priorities around those goals. The new strategic plan, to be implemented in the coming year, has, as our Consultant said, "President Bevacqua's fingerprints all over it."

Then in early April 2022, we all received Mr. Bevacqua's hard news of the challenges he is facing due to his diagnosis of muscular dystrophy. We all support Johnny in his decision to take a leave, and we continue to hold him in our prayers.

The Board is grateful to Principal Daryl Weaver for stepping into the initial Interim-President role over the busy final months of the school year, and helping to fulfill two challenging leadership roles. Consequently, we were especially happy to announce the appointment of an Interim President, Michelle Rupp, on July 1, 2022.

At the close of the Century at Vancouver College, we look to the past with gratitude and with humility. We focus on the needs of the present. As a school community intending to educate boys and young men in mind, body, and soul, we look to the future with hope and anticipation, asking God for guidance in all we do.

Ministry Team and student leaders. This program continues to be a pillar of strength for our boys' spiritual, social, and emotional development.

We are fortunate to be able to work alongside all of our parents, the first educators of our students. Despite restrictions due to the lingering effects of the pandemic until the Spring of 2022, the Vancouver College Parents Association Executives found ways for our parent community to come together and grow even stronger through re-imagined initiatives and events. And once restrictions were lifted, our parents worked hard to bring back events in their traditional form, complemented by virtual initiatives. Their continuous support is greatly appreciated and means a lot to our boys.

On a personal note, the end of the school year saw me take a medical leave as I deal with the effects of Muscular Dystrophy. While my immediate work future is still unknown, I remain optimistic and profoundly grateful for the outpouring of support by many in our community.

I look forward with great enthusiasm, humility, and gratitude to celebrating 100 years of Vancouver College with our faith and learning community. May the good Lord continue to bless our students, families, staff, alumni, and friends who have journeyed and continue to journey with us.

### STRATEGIC PLAN


The process to develop the VC100 Strategic Plan launched in the fall of 2021. We are grateful to our community of students, parents, alumni, staff, board directors, and trustees for being a part of this comprehensive and inclusive process. Feedback from the online community survey and stakeholder consultation sessions helped the school's educational leaders determine Vancouver College's strategic goals and priorities to ensure we meet the learning needs of our students today and tomorrow. These strategic priorities will provide direction and guide all members of our faith and learning community through the next decade and into our school's future.

While Vancouver College's vision, mission, and values were revitalized through these community consultations, it was also affirmed that our founders' ideals for the school have endured these past 100 years.

The Community Survey was held between September 20 to October 4, 2021. The survey focused on three key questions:

- What makes Vancouver College special or unique compared to other schools? If you are new to the Vancouver College community, why did you choose Vancouver College?
- From your experience, what opportunities does Vancouver College have for growth or improvement?
- What must Vancouver College pay attention to, as a Catholic school in the tradition of Edmund Rice and the Essential Elements,

During the stakeholder consultation sessions, participants were given the opportunity to discuss two of the 16 themes in small groups, answering the following questions:


- 1. Provide 2 examples of where we **EXCEL**

### 2020-2021 FINANCIAL REPORT

### Sources of Funds

In 2021/2022, funding from all sources totaled \$14.82 million, an increase of \$520,000 from the previous year. Tuition increased \$200 per student to cover increased costs and Government Funding only increased 2.17%. Other sources of funds include donations from Vancouver College Millennium Foundation (VCMF), VC Parents Association, and Walkathon. These graphs highlight the regular operations of the school. The Board continues to support the Blessed Edmund Rice Financial Assistance Program to help families in need of financial assistance by providing \$346,453 in tuition funding.

In the spirit of our founder, Blessed Edmund Rice, Vancouver College is committed to ensuring tuition fees remain as affordable as possible. We also set aside \$500,000 annually for our financial assistance program to help families with tuition and activity fees as needed. Our revenues, supplemented by donations from our generous community, are responsibly appropriated to ensure our students receive an exceptional faith-based educational experience while servicing and retiring our debt in a timely manner so that funds may be redirected into academic and co-curricular programs for our students. 


### **Expenditures**

On the expenditures side, Vancouver College spent \$13.92 million to operate the school and invested \$903,000 in capital assets for school operations. The main expenditures for operating the school are salaries and benefits, but also include expenditures on Academics, Administration, Maintenance, and the required mortgage principal and interest payments. Capital expenditures were mainly computers for students with one-to-one chromebooks for Grades 7 to 12 and shared computer and ipad carts for the elementary, as well as continued upgrades of audio-visual and other equipment and furniture for the campus.

As of June 30, 2022, the school's overall debt was decreased from \$15.4 million to \$11.1 million, a decrease of \$4.3 million made possible from generous donations from the Vancouver College community.

## IN GRATITUDE PRO OPERIS AWARD

### Larry Olson

Larry, an alumnus from the class of 1977, has always been a larger than life member of our faith and learning community. Joining us in 1989 from the University of Saskatchewan, Larry took over the



reins of the Music Program from his equally legendary father, Gordon Olson. Together, Larry and Gordon shaped this vibrant part of our school program and changed the lives of thousands of VC boys for the past 70 years.

Over his time here, Larry always had a knack for passing on his inherent gifts and talents so that his musicians achieved excellence while having a great time doing it. Balancing rigour and enjoyment was his trademark, perhaps best exemplified in his always entertaining Spring and Christmas Concerts and stellar gold performances at musical competitions. The latter were often the 'capstone' experiences for his musicians, as Larry combined his love of travelling and music by taking the boys to places such as San Francisco, Disneyland, Hawaii, and Whistler.

Larry was also always available to support Vancouver College in other ways, including his ongoing role as a sound engineer and as a successful coach of our Golf Team. He also served as our Fine Arts, and then Music Department Chair for many years.

Larry Olson was awarded the Pro Operis for his hard work and dedication over 33 years, and the extraordinary number of volunteer hours he contributed towards ensuring our students leave Vancouver College as better men.

#### Lillian Vernier

Lilian has been a key member of our community for the last 23 years, and has been ever present for VC's boys daily. As our Outreach Coordinator, she created the vibrant Faith In Action



Program, one of our school's hallmarks, and she set the standard for what it means to lead these transformational experiences. As a Grade Level Coordinator, she connected with the boys, liaised with their teachers, and created plans that led to each student's ultimate success.

As an Encounter organizer, Action facilitator, and one of our Campus Ministry leaders, she was a role model and an inspiration to many, teaching us how to walk the walk of our faith.

Lilian is also an exemplary teacher, serving as Social Studies Department Chair for many years, and during her tenure, taught students in Elementary, Middle and Senior Schools. Amazingly, she found time to build our liturgical choir, support our school plays, and volunteer with athletics, especially the basketball program.

Lilian Vernier was presented the Pro Operis Award for her commitment and faithful service to Vancouver College as a teacher, mentor, and spiritual leader. Through her various ministries at Vancouver College, she has advanced the school's legacy of faith, service, and excellence.

### ADVANCEMENT REPORT

## **GOD HAS CREATED ALL AND IS IN ALL**



Reflecting on the 2021-22 school year, our first full academic year since the completion of the Our Next Century Campaign and campus redevelopment project, a host of emotions come to mind. I fell pride and joy for what we have accomplished as a community, relief that we did so before the upheaval of the pandemic that led to economic challenges locally and globally, and most of all, gratitude for the good Lord's guidance and grace.

Looking back, it has become more apparent to me that our accomplishment was possible only because He made it possible. The fortuitous completion of our new campus was God's timing, not ours. God has created all and is in all (Col 3:11). He is behind the way things are and the way they are going to turn out. Vancouver College continues to be blessed indeed.

In the 2021-22 school year, the Advancement office worked closely with the Parents Association and Alumni Association, planning events and activities scheduled for the 2022-23 school year in celebration of our 100th Anniversary. These events include the Hall of Honour and Honorary Alumni Celebration and Centenary Kickoff Party in September, Finnegan Ball in November, Centenary themed Mothers Christmas Tea in December and Mayfair in the Spring, installation of the 100-Year Timeline wall in Lannon Hall, and writing and publication of the VC100 Stories and accompanying physical displays on campus, among others. We are grateful to members of our community for their support of these initiatives.

I found the research work for the comprehensive timeline and stories that chronicle the school's legacy a rewarding and enlightening experience. In our school's 100-year history and my own 17 years with VC, I have witnessed changes: new academic programs, more co-curricular activities, increased opportunities for faith formation, and brand new buildings. But what's equally impressive is how some things have stood the test of time.

In a publication from the early 1920s, our founding Principal, Brother Jerome Lannon, stated the "school's ideals". He said Vancouver College, "will endeavor to educate the whole child. Nothing will be neglected which will aid in the production of a fine gentleman. ... He will be shown how to equip himself physically, intellectually and spiritually for the great battlefield of life."

While these words from a hundred years ago have been revised, it is clear that what we do, why we do it, and for whom we do it - our raison d'etre - these have not changed. As we enter our second century, we continue to focus on the education of the whole person - mind, body, and soul. We are grateful to all those - in particular, our dedicated faculty and staff, supportive parents, and generous donors - who share in this mission.

I believe that each of us found our way to Vancouver College for a reason, and collectively, we play a part in helping VC be an even better school. The gifts and acts of service that Vancouver College receives from its community members are varied; but, what they have in common is that each one comes from the Holy Spirit for His purposes.

On behalf of the staff and students of Vancouver College, I express immense appreciation and gratitude for all that has been this year and I pray that 2022-23 brings us even closer as a community, so we can continue the work of those who came before us and advance the legacy that is Vancouver College.

His gift was formally recognized at the closing night of the school's musical production of Footloose in April, 2022 with the rededication and naming of The Irene Manrell Theatre for Performing Arts.

### THE IMPACT OF YOUR GIFT

For over 100 years, Vancouver College has sought to honour the mission of our founder, Blessed Edmund Rice who believed that education should be accessible to all. In light of this, our Board of Directors and Administrative leadership team work diligently to ensure that tuition rates remain as affordable as possible. Meeting this commitment, however, means that the additional costs of providing the school's many different co-curricular activities - including music, sports, clubs and campus ministry outreach programs - are not part of the annual tuition calculation and, thus, must be funded by additional means, primarily donations. The Annual Giving Program is important as it addresses the annual shortfall between what the school receives in revenues, through tuition and government funding, and what the actual costs are to provide students with the range of different co-curricular activities, additional educational resources, and to satisfy periodic capital needs. This Annual Giving Program also supports our financial assistance program and financial sustainability objectives.

### 2021-22 gifts to the Annual Giving Program were directed as follows:

- Most of our donors directed their gift to "The School's Greatest Needs" Fund, an unrestricted fund that gives Vancouver College's Administration the flexibility to appropriate funds according to the school's mission and needs. In 2021-2022, debt retirement continued to be a priority as reducing costs related to financial obligations enabled the school to reinvest in our boys and educational programs. In this regard, \$1.36 million (57%) of the funds raised this year serviced our debt.
- \$475,000 (20%) was received in the form of pledged or future gifts towards the School's Greatest Needs Fund.
- \$400,000 (17%) funded our educational needs including learning assistance program, music program, performing arts, and athletics. This also includes \$185,676 raised through Finnegan Ball's 2021 Fund-a-Need, which was directed towards the Wellness Centre.
- The Vancouver College Alumni Association's gift of \$20,000 provided tuition financial assistance to approximately six students.
- Walkathon 2021 raised an additional \$145,296 (not included in the \$2.385 million total) and directly funded Encounter, Campus Ministry, and Ministry Outreach (42%) and the balance 58% paid for a new PA system in Rice Hall and Holler Family Science Centre, outdoor furniture, and instruments for the new drumline program.

As Vancouver College continues to meet the needs of our students, teachers and staff in our increasingly complex world, we remain grateful for the generosity of VC's community of giving and for their ongoing support.
