The Canadian (Ontario) Curriculum is an internationally recognised curriculum equivalent to many other leading curricula and education systems around the world. As show in the Programme for International Student Assessment (PISA) 2022 results. Canada outperformed other English-speaking countries in Reading, Mathematics, and Science.

Students work closely with our Higher Education and Pathways Advisors to design their secondary program to meet their individual needs. Like other curricula, graduates with the OSSD qualification are eligible to apply to all the top universities worldwide.

The OSSD program is particularly suitable for students planning to attend university in Hong Kong or abroad, for students transitioning from a local curriculum into an international curriculum, and for athlete scholars or creative scholars who need the support of a flexible program that can be designed around their individual needs.

Teacher Advisor Program (TAP)

Students are assigned a Teacher Mentor who mentors them throughout their secondary educational journey. Students remain with the same Teacher Mentor from Grade 9 to 12. Mentors support students by delivering bespoke workshops and helping with course selection each February. In February, students will be provided with a course selection sheet for the subsequent academic year. During a TAP session, a teacher mentor will work with students in identifying completed OSSD requirements and those they still need to complete.

Application Process

Student responsibilities

The DSC Higher Education and Pathways Advisors are fully committed to supporting students in their postsecondary education. To minimize stress during the application process and ensure fair distribution of guidance among students, several expectations are in place. Support for students in their university application should be carried out in accordance with the student responsibilities and internal deadlines indicated in the table below. DSC internal deadlines are earlier than application deadlines to ensure the application process runs smoothly for everyone. For many applications, the Higher Education and Pathways Advisors, our Head Office, and teachers need to generate specific documents on students' behalf. The earlier deadline allows sufficient time to do this before the official deadline.

Responsibilities

- Students need to be realistic about their expectations and consider both their interests and aptitude in the process of selecting best fit higher education institutions.
- Students need to maintain good communication with their advisor throughout the application process. This includes attending scheduled meetings, responding to email communication in a timely manner, and completing assigned tasks in the Google Classroom.
- Students are expected to follow up on all instructions provided by the advisor.
- Students should complete all necessary documentation and forms without delay to avoid missing deadlines.
- Students must register independently on the admission platform at the targeted higher education institution. Applications are made independently by the student and their families, not the advisors.

Planning Timeline

Grade 11

Grade 11 is a crucial time for university planning. Students begin taking prerequisite courses that will help them meet the requirements for university admission. This is when students should start their research and become familiar with the admission requirements and processes so that they are well prepared for when applications become available at the beginning of Grade 12.

Grade 12

A majority of post-secondary applications open in September and October. Students should return from summer break with their final list of institutions and programs to which they wish to apply along with final drafts of personal statements/essays when required. With the support of our Higher Education and Pathways Advisors, students will be ready to tackle their applications with ease, leaving plenty of time to focus on their studies.

Finding the Best-Fit University

Selecting the best fit university can be a daunting task. Our best advice is to start with gathering as much information as you can about the opportunities available to you. Attending university fairs, visits by university representatives, virtual information sessions, and taking campus tours will be an excellent start in learning more. There are several factors to consider when selecting the best fit university. Although reputation and ranking can provide valuable insights into the overall academic standing and recognition of an institution, we advise you to consider the following:

Interests and Aptitude

Reflecting on your interests, strengths and goals will help you to more clearly identify the subject area that you should pursue. Students should also be realistic about their aptitude. When selecting universities, choose schools that fit into three categories: Reach, Target and Safe. You should easily be able to meet the admission requirements of the Safe option, while a Target school will be the best academic fit and the one you really want to attend. Target schools will make up the majority of schools on your list. A Reach school will be the one you dream of attending but it may be very competitive or the admission requirements may be slightly higher than your predicted average grade.

Geographic Location

Narrowing down your search by limiting yourself to 1-2 countries maximum will be very helpful. When selecting a destination, you should be thinking about whether or not you want to study in an urban, suburban or rural setting. Travel distance from your home country may also be a factor. The climate will also be something to consider. If you have grown up in a tropical climate, moving to a part of the world that has harsh winters may influence your wellbeing and negatively affect your education.

Academic Programs

Students should seek out universities that have a strong reputation for their chosen field of study and offer programs that align with their interests and career goals. It is a good idea to review the curriculum and also look for additional opportunities such as joint degrees, study abroad/exchange programs, co-op programs or internships. Students should also consider the professional qualifications they wish to achieve and their transferability to other countries (ie. law, education, medicine, dentistry etc.).

Class Size and Student-Faculty Ratio

When evaluating universities, it is important to consider the class sizes and student-faculty ratios. Smaller classes allow for a more personalized learning experience, as they provide greater opportunities for individual attention and interaction with professors. On the other hand, larger universities often offer a broader selection of courses and research opportunities due to their extensive faculty resources.

Financial Considerations

Take into account the cost of tuition, availability of scholarships and the overall cost of living. In some countries you will pay very high international tuition fees; other countries may offer lower tuition fees for international students.

School Services and Facilities

Students should consider the available services and facilities when making their choices. Both can contribute to the comfort, support and wellbeing of a student. Having access to academic, career and educational support advisors can be impactful on student success while access to facilities such as the library, gym, on campus housing options and dining are also important.

Campus Culture

Students should research the campus culture including diversity, inclusivity, extracurricular activities, clubs and organizations that align with their interests. When given the opportunity, students should aim to visit a campus, connect with international student mentors or DSC alumni to gain better understanding of the campus culture.

Glossary of Key Terms

IELTS

IELTS (International English Language Testing System) is an English language proficiency exam jointly managed by the British Council, IDP, and Cambridge English. IELTS scores are accepted by universities worldwide but it is preferred by universities in the UK and Australia.

OUAC

OUAC stands for Ontario Universities' Application Centre. It provides a central service for applicants to apply to universities in Ontario, Canada. Students can apply to 3 universities or programs for one fee. They may wish to apply to more universities for an additional charge. The OUAC application is straightforward requiring students to complete a basic application form. Student grades will be sent to the OUAC on behalf of the student at the midterm and end of each semester. It is the student's responsibility to check with each university if any supplemental information is required.

SAT

Stands for the Scholastic Assessment Test, a standardized test that the College Board manages. Most colleges in the US accept SAT scores as part of the admissions process. Most students take the SAT in 11th or 12th grade in preparation for college applications.

TOEFL

TOFEL (Test of English as a Foreign Language) is a standardized test to measure the English language ability of non-native speakers wishing to enroll in English-speaking universities. TOEFL scores are accepted by universities worldwide but it is preferred by universities in the US.

UCAS

UCAS stands for the University and Colleges Admissions Service, it provides a central application service for universities in the UK. UCAS opens each year in May for students to apply for the next academic year. A buzzword that is unique to DSC students is created by our Higher Education and Pathways Advisors that students need to link their application to DSC International School. A teacher reference and personal profile questions are required to complete the application. Good communication is required between the students and their advisor as the advisor will submit the student application once it is complete.

UCAT

The University Clinical Aptitude Test is an admissions test used in the selection process by a consortium of universities in the United Kingdom, Singapore, Australia, and New Zealand for their medical and dental degree programs.

Unifrog

Unifrog is an online platform that supports students Individual Pathways Planning. From Grade 7-12, all DSC students have access to the Unifrog platform which provides useful tools and curated resources for students to learn more about themselves, explore career opportunities, and set goals for the future.

University Tracking Sheet

Potential graduates in Grade 12 are asked to complete a University Tracking Sheet. This document is shared with their Higher Education and Pathways Advisor and serves to track their university application process. It is a living document that tracks potential post-secondary applications, requirements, and eventually the student's final application and acceptances.

TIPS by DSC Advisors

- Students in Hong Kong should take advantage of University Open Days to explore the local campuses and speak to admissions representatives.
- A wide variety of summer programs are available to Grades 9-12 students that offer credit bearing courses which can be applied to a student's first year academic record.
- When possible, students are recommended to apply for the first round admissions as thereafter, applications may be accepted subject to availability of places. First round applicants may receive offers as early as January.
- Reference letters play an important role in the application process. When selecting a referee, be sure to select someone who can speak about your academic background and aptitude.

TIPS by DSC Advisors

- Students will begin the application process by creating a UCAS profile that is linked to the DSC Higher Education and Pathways advisors.
- Students interested in studying medical programs in the UK need to write the UCAT Exam and need to be mindful of deadlines (May-September). A UCAS account is required to register for the UCAT.
- The personal statement is an important part of the application and provides the applicant an opportunity to explain their motivation for selecting the program and their future aspirations. A well written statement should emphasize academic achievements, subject specific knowledge and a clear interest in the selected program. Extracurricular activities and volunteer service in the personal statement are relevant if they relate to the academic profile and should focus on the learning skills gained from the experience. With the support of our guidance team, students can select extracurricular activities that will support their interests.

TIPS by DSC Advisors

- Each province and university in Canada will have subtly different admissions requirements.
- Students apply directly to a program rather than a faculty or department and select a major.
- Students will either apply through a centralized application system or directly to the institution. Examples of centralized application systems include:
 - Alberta-Apply Alberta
 - British Columbia-Education Planner
 - Ontario-Ontario Universities Application Center (OUAC)
- Application to Canadian universities should be made as early as possible as offers are given on a rolling basis.
- In Canada, entrance scholarships are available to both domestic and international students and will be automatically considered upon admission. Entrance scholarships are merit based.
- Professions such as medicine, dentistry or law are only offered at the postgraduate level, so in Canada, students should focus their undergraduate degree on major subjects that will help them be successful in a chosen professional field. Some pre-professional degree pathways are available such as Health Sciences.
- There are many excellent post- secondary options for study across Canada. Students should begin their research by exploring universities that have a strong reputation in your field of interest and explore their

TIPS by DSC Advisors

- If a student visa is required, students should take into consideration the student visa application process
 as it can take from several weeks to several months. This is particularly important when considering which
 month of intake you would like to apply for. A DSC June graduate should apply for November or January
 intake.
- Applications for Australian universities can open up to 2 years in advance. The universities in Australia have strict deadlines so students can prepare their research in advance to ensure they are following the guidelines.
- Scholarships are available to international students. In most cases, an additional application should be submitted by the student. This opportunity should be taken advantage of.

Macau

Macau has a unique cultural setting with its blend of eastern and western cultures providing an environment for both academic exploration and cultural immersion. Students can embrace the fusion of Chinese and Portuguese influences across the city through Macau's local cuisine and architectural landmarks. Macau is home to several public and private schools such as University of Macau and Macau University of Science and Technology, these colleges offer opportunity for international OSSD students to apply for direct admission upon the completion of 6 Grade 12 U/M courses with an overall minimum average of 70% or higher. Eligible students may be invited to complete English and Math examinations as well as program-specific examinations and interviews.

Taiwan

Taiwan is an increasingly attractive destination for post secondary studies due to its affordable tuition, low cost of living and the rich cultural experience it can provide. Taiwan has an outstanding higher education system with many world class universities, such as National Taiwan University and the National Tsing Hua University, offering opportunities to study English taught degrees across many subject areas. An increasing number of English programs are being offered to attract international students along with an increasing number of scholarships. DSC students can apply to universities in Taiwan with completion of the OSSD and evidence of English language proficiency demonstrated through IELTS, TOEFL or other. Applicants should also be prepared to complete a personal statement, provide reference letters and meet subject specific academic requirements.

TIPS by DSC Advisors

- Top universities in China that accept the OSSD include: Peking University, Tsinghua University, Fudan University, Shanghai Jiaotong University, Zhejiang University, Nanjing University.
- Carefully review the admission requirements for each university as they may vary.
- Students with Chinese Nationality will apply under a local application scheme and are advised to check with the university regarding completion of the Gaokao entrance exam and additional requirements.

OSSD Requirement for universities in Japan

TIPS by DSC Advisors

- The academic year in Japan begins in April with the first semester from April-August and the second semester from September-March. However, many English taught undergraduate programs begin in September.
- Understand the application process. Japanese universities have different entrance examination systems
 within the university to select international applicants with different abilities and qualities. Usually each
 institution has a comprehensive application guide that outlines the application process and documents
 required.
- There are many opportunities to study in Japan in both English taught and Japanese taught programs. Students should consider taking Japanese language courses to enrich their experience of living and studying in Japan, even if they are not required by the university.

I have had the privilege of being a part of DSC community since Grade 1. The best part of the Higher Education and Pathways Advising support at DSC is that they adapt to unique individual circumstances. In my case, I aspired to pursue my football career and had flexible options for which country to go to after graduating from high school, however, I was uncertain about which country exactly. The advisors had given me advice for future career planning. Growing up as a Japanese away from Japan in an international environment, the post-secondary stage would be the last chance for me to experience Japan as a student, so with further consideration, I have decided to attend universities in Japan.

Japanese University application is complex compared to where many of my peers are going to, such as Canada, Australia, Hong Kong, etc. Scheduling applications, collecting documents, and creating personal statements for some universities was a lot of work especially when the deadline overlaped with the assigments and exams. Through the great support from the advisors, I was able to prepare in advance with confidence, which led to the successful acceptance from Keio University in Japan.

TIPS by DSC Advisors

- In the United States, students can choose from private or public universities or liberal arts colleges. Private institutions tend to be smaller, have less choice of programs and fees are higher when compared to public institutions that have a wider range of programs and lower tuition rates.
- When required, register for your SAT and/or ACT tests early. Spaces for these tests fill up quickly. SAT and ACT should be written in the summer before a student begins Grade 12.
- Professions such as medicine or law are only offered at the postgraduate level, so in the US, students should focus their undergraduate degree on major subjects that will help them be successful in a chosen professional field.
- Did you know you can apply to universities under Early Decision and Early Action? Early Decision (ED) is binding, you may only apply to one university via early decision and, should you receive an offer, you are legally obliged to attend that university. Early Action application is not binding, students simply receive an early response from the university.
- The personal essay written for US applications provides more opportunity for the applicant to share personal experiences, extracurricular activities and interests in a manner that showcases their overall character. The essay is less focused on academic interest and achievement and should demonstrate the applicant's personal growth and capacity for leadership and community engagement.

Europe | European Union

Europe provides a vast array of opportunities for students to study at institutions renowned for their high academic standards and quality education. A majority of universities are state/public universities, and offer 2 tier tuition fees for EEA/EU Passport holders, and international students. Across the continent, students will find a diverse range of undergraduate programs across a variety of disciplines. Beyond the academic opportunities Europe provides, students will have the opportunity to study in a multicultural environment, learn or improve language skills, and explore the rich history, diverse landscapes and vibrant cities that European countries have to offer.

The admissions requirements will vary between universities and programs in each country, therefore it is advisable to speak to a an advisor and visit the official university websites or contact the university admissions office for the most up to date information. Numerous students have applied and been accepted to universities across Europe that may not be listed below. Entrance exam may be required for some universities. For more information about European university applications, please contact the Higher Education and Pathways advisors.

Germany

Tuition is free for international students at most public universities, so it makes studying in Germany an excellent option. The OSSD is accepted for admission in Germany if the student has met the following conditions:

- Completion of at least 12 credits between Grade 11 and 12 with a minimum of 6 credits at the Grade 12 4U/M level. A minimum average of 65% is required in these 6 courses.
- The subject and grade overview of the above must include (with at least two annual courses each):
- Two languages (i.e English + one foreign language)
- One credit from Advanced Functions or Calculus and Vectors
- One credit from Chemistry, Biology or Physics
- One additional subject corresponding to the upper classes of secondary school in Germany

Applicants who do not meet the above subject and grade profile will qualify for a general admission to preparatory course to meet the university qualification entrance exam.

Many universities in Germany will require students to apply via the uni-assist platform. Please visit www.uni-assist.de/en for more information.

Ireland

Admission requirements vary widely by university and program. Applicants with an OSSD are required to have at least 6 Grade 12 U/M courses, including Grade 12 English and minimum average score of 65% average and above. The minimum average score may be higher and applicants should check subject specific grade requirements. Competitive schools may require an average of 85% or above. The English Language requirement can be met with proficiency tests such as IELTS or TOEFL. Applicants to Irish post-secondary study will either apply directly to the institution or through the Central Applications Office (EU, Switzerland, UK passport holders). The applications open from September/October and students have a higher chance of receiving offers if they apply early, often within 3-4 weeks of application. Ireland provides exciting opportunities for students interested in studying medicine, offering students direct access to 6 year programs with the OSSD and no supplementary examinations.

Italy

Students can apply for post secondary education in Italy with successful completion of the OSSD. Italian language proficiency may be required and can be met through completion of the CILS (Certificazione di Italiano come Lingua Straniera) or CELI (Certificato di Conoscenza della Lingua Italiana). Additional entrance exams specific to the program of application and a personal statement expressing interest in studying a specific program could be required. Applicants are advised to check the requirements of individual universities carefully. Generally a pre-application request is required and should be sent to the Italian embassy or consulate in the country of residence.

Netherlands

University admission requirements are quite consistent across programs and institutions in the Netherlands, however it is always best to confirm with each institution before applying. Universities in the Netherlands require applicants to apply through Studielink (www.studielinke.nl), a centralized platform for enrollment where students can apply to up to four programs. For information about individual application procedures and admissions requirements, applicants are advised to visit the university website.

The minimum admission requirement is completion of the OSSD with at least 6 relevant academic Grade 12 U/M courses and minimum scores of 70% in each subject. Recommended accepted subjects include: Languages (e.g. English, French, Spanish), Sciences (e.g. Mathematics, Biology, Chemistry) and Humanities/Social Sciences (History, Geography, Economics). Applicants should consider subject specific requirements and minimum scores that may be required. International applicants applying to English taught programs usually require IELTS or TOEFL to meet the English language requirement but exemptions may be given if the applicant has studied under English medium of instruction for a set period of time.

Switzerland

Switzerland offers a number of publicly funded post secondary education pathways at research focused universities, applied science and arts institutions, and those specializing in teacher education. Studying in Switzerland provides students the opportunity to learn Italian, German or French, depending on the region of study. Swiss universities will accept the OSSD with the completion of six Grade 12 U/M general education courses. In addition, students should complete 6 general education subjects from the list below in both grades 10 and 11:

- First language (native language)
- Second language
- Mathematics
- Natural sciences (biology, chemistry or physics)
- Humanities and social sciences (geography, history or economics/law)
- Elective (one subject from category 2, 4 or 5 or computer science or philosophy. Computer science and philosophy can only be chosen as a sixth subject)

Entrance examinations may be required by some universities so students are advised to check individual university admission requirements.
