# Celebrating Rashid Carré

## JIS Teacher, Pioneer, and Respected Artist

When alumni reminisce about their days at JIS, they frequently recall the efforts of the teachers who guided and inspired them. One of such teachers fondly remembered by many is Rashid Carré, who taught at JIS for 30 years prior to his retirement in June 1997.

Mr. Carré studied at Sorbonne in Paris. A young artist with a philosophical background, he started his career teaching at a French private school for three years. In 1967, he moved to Indonesia. As he had lived his childhood in Morocco, he did not consider the move to Indonesia a major culture shock. In September 1968, Mr. Carré started teaching at the International School of Djakarta\*. He was hired to start the Art and Foreign Language (French) programs along with his friend Halimah Brugger, who was hired to start the Music program. The move from a French private school to an American approach to education and school traditions at the time presented more of a cultural adjustment challenge than the move to Indonesia itself.

One of Mr. Carré's favorite pastimes was to draw caricatures of JIS's Heads of School over the years, which were then published in the school newsletter. Most could appreciate the humor in the caricatures, but there were definitely one or two who were "not amused".

Mr. Carré taught Art at all levels at JIS over the years, from Kindergarten all the way through to 12th grade. He appreciated the



fact that JIS gave him the opportunity to develop his own approach to teaching Art. He had room to experiment with approaches to learning without interference and generally with the encouragement of the successive administrations. There was a generous art budget, which allowed the art department to improve the equipment at hand and have adequate supplies. According to Mr. Carré, the number of students in contact with him during the 30 years of teaching "probably amounted to about 5,000".

One of Mr. Carré's most significant achievements was creating the International Baccalaureate Art and Design (IB Art) course. Over his last 10 years at JIS High School, this program developed considerably. With colleagues Steve Sadokierski and Corinne Calvert, the program was brought to a very high level of excellence. It was at such a high level that JIS IB Art became a model and a reference in IB circles in Southeast Asia and Australia. These were fascinating years for Mr. Carré,

with constant interaction and brainstorming between colleagues and students.

Over the course of 10 years, Mr. Carré also developed a "Theory and Practice of Visual Criticism" based on the realization that in a world of visual communication, there was an urgent need to develop and include Visual Criticism in the curriculum. Mr. Carré was given numerous opportunities to do interactive presentations in various classes (Health Science, English, Math, Social Studies,

French) and conduct workshops and courses for teachers in Jakarta and Southeast Asia.


Two theatrical achievements stand out in the memory of Mr. Carré. The first one is the multi-cultural production of *King Stag*. He considered it to be an exhilarating experience to be part of a team consisting of Susan King, Tom Schulz, and Corinne Calvert. The second one is *Gulliver* with Charles and Laura Schuster and Tom Schulz, where Mr. Carré produced gigantic open-air puppets.

Mr. Carré also had fond memories of the last two years in Middle School. In close cooperation with Lynnette Diem, he developed an art program to prepare students toward High School, away from “kiddy stuff”, emphasizing drawing from observation.

In recognition of what was considered Mr. Carré’s dedication to the Visual Arts at JIS, upon Mr. Carré’s retirement in June 1997, then Head of School Dr. Niall Nelson created the Rashid Carré Award, which was attributed each year to an outstanding Senior in Fine Arts and Creative Writing. Mr. Carré was very happy as this award contributed to the prominence of these disciplines at JIS.

I attended JIS during my family’s stay in Jakarta for several years in the early-to-mid-1980s. I graduated in 1985, along with one of my sisters. We both left Jakarta that year to continue our studies back in Canada. My parents and younger sister (also a JIS student) stayed on in Jakarta for a few more years.

There’s a direct connection for sure. Some people may recall the busy cartoon poster I created titled “Jakarta: A World of its Own”. It was a kind of caricature of the city’s chaotic, bustling street life. I’d been drawing it in my spare time after school with no specific purpose in mind, and one day, I took the large and detailed pencil sketch to school to show the art teacher, Mr. Carré. He immediately saw the potential in it and allowed me to work on it in class as an independent project while everybody else had to do the regular coursework. When it was nearing completion, he took me to see Mr. Bear, who taught a course on journalism and was organizing the design and compilation of the yearbook. Mr. Bear made me a proposal: He wanted me to create a similar panoramic cartoon scene of the school, which he could then publish in the yearbook along with the Jakarta poster. And in exchange, he would provide the funding to print a large batch of both posters, which I could then sell. The revenue from the poster

helped pay for my undergraduate university tuition at McGill University in Montreal, where I graduated in 1992 specializing in geography. I would go on to do a Masters of Environmental Studies at York University in Toronto, graduating in 1995.

### Advice to current students:

## My Return to Jakarta-Summer 2022

As I write this, I am currently at one of the many new hotels that have sprung up in Jakarta and watching a thunderstorm roll through the city. You can feel the rain in the air, and I know that any minute the skies will open, and it will be like standing under a warm shower. The issue is that it is June 12, which is meant to be the dry season. Like so much in the world today, the old patterns are changing, and a new world with new patterns is emerging.

When I left Jakarta in 1988, the tallest building in the Kuningan region was maybe five or 10 stories. Now, the skyline reminds me of parts of New York or Shenzhen. The biggest difference is that in both New York and Shenzhen, the city grew up around planned roads in a grid. In this part of Jakarta, the old kampungs still exist, with winding rivers and winding roads, but now, there are 60-story apartment complexes and mega malls that sprouted up organically on any land that was able to support the weight of the complex. My hotel is less than 1 kilometer from my office, but the walk takes 45 minutes. A car can do it in 15 on the way there, but the way back can take an hour. Motorcycles still are your best bet to get around quickly, but the days of finding one on the side of the road and negotiating a good price are over. It is all apps and ride-hailing services, and a JIS grad founded the most popular one. If you come back, make sure to install Gojek. It will be your everyday app in Indonesia.

My connection to JIS is that I spent my formative years there from 10 to 18 years old.

It was my elementary, junior high, and high school. It was where I grew up and where the roots of my childhood still are planted. It is where the foundation of who I am today formed, even though it was more than 40 years ago. I don't mean to wax poetic about how it was the "best time of my life", but I will be the first to admit that my memories are mostly positive, even though Jakarta can sometimes be hard to live in. I can still call the friends I made back then, and when we get together it is always good to reminisce about the crazy Jakarta days!

I have been in Jakarta for 62 days now and will be heading home to Calgary soon. I am fortunate to have the opportunity to work with my brother. It is a passion project for both of us, and it was an amazing trip back to Jakarta.

## Call for Dragon Support

### IB Business Management Students in Search of Projects

The International Baccalaureate (IB) Business Management course, which is recognized as a university-level course (BUS 101 & BUS 102) by many American universities, requires students to complete a 20-hour internal assessment (IA) consisting of primary research (interviews, focus groups, surveys, etc.) that can be supported by secondary research.


Students are tasked with choosing a business that faces a strategic decision based on the internal and/or external environment, i.e. divestment, growth, or expansion. It would be an incredible privilege for these students to have the opportunity to work with you and your company as part of this IA. This would involve conducting several interviews with you and any relevant stakeholders, and acting as consultants to attempt to evaluate the decision that you face. The more financial information (sales forecasting, budgets, costs, final accounts) you would be able to volunteer, the better the evaluation would be for the IA. Upon completion of the IA, the students will present you with a copy of their report.




## JIS Learning Center


## JIS Podcast
