ENGINEERS IN THE MAKING AT LINCOLN CENTER



Mrs. Niederkorn's second grade class at Lincoln Center has been working on the Unit of Inquiry: "How the World Works." Students have been learning about different types of engineering. They discovered that an engineer has to work in a team to ask questions, plan, create, test and improve what they are working on. The students have also been learning about how motion and force can change the way things move and can sometimes cause an engineer to change a plan he/she may have had.

The class had a great opportunity to invite guest speakers to come and talk to students about engineering. The first guests were engineers from Aecom Engineering and they shared all the different kinds of engineers one can be and the jobs that different engineers do. Students were very excited as the engineers showed pictures of projects or buildings they have helped design. Students were familiar with some of the projects such as the Regions Hospital building and the Green Line light rail. At the end of the presentation, students participated in an experiment showing how force can impact a bridge.

The second guest speaker was very special because he is a recent South St. Paul High School graduate, Jacob Gustafson, who is currently attending the University of Minnesota to become

an engineer. He answered questions about what he is learning and shared the projects he worked on in class. With all the new knowledge about the engineering process, motion and force, the second graders were ready to build their own bridges.

Students were put into "engineering teams" and as teams, they decided what kind of bridge they wanted to build and what materials they would need to build it. With the guest speakers' advice, students made a plan, designed the bridge, gathered materials and using teamwork, built the bridge. They

discovered that, like real engineers, some of their designs needed to be changed and improved. In the end, they made some amazing bridges that held up against force and motion. It was amazing to hear students' conversations and discussions such as "we need to add more beams because the span is too big and when the force is on it, than it won't hold up" or "hey, why don't we try this." Their enthusiasm and excitement about learning was contagious and I am sure we have a few new engineers in the making!

IMPROVING STUDENT LITERACY WITH PHYSICAL ACTIVITIES

South St. Paul Public Schools recently acquired money through a grant from the county that allows for implementation of programs that increase physical activity and nutrition awareness. A strategy we will be implementing is incorporating fitness into our academic teaching. Studies show that preparing the brain with specific movements may improve communication from one part of the brain to another.

We are happy to announce the implementation of a program that will do just that. Starting the first week

in February, two mornings a week for a half hour, Mr. Moore at Lincoln Center Elementary, and Dianne Spannbauer and Erin Gross at Kaposia Education Center will implement the *Physical Activity to Improve Literacy Program*. This program will review reading, writing and spelling content through movement. This has been found to be an ideal way to review skills, and the retention of skills improves. Teaching new content through movement will help many students understand and retain information.

Engaging students in movement while learning will help build better bodies and minds. Making another connection and building a relationship with another adult in the building is a proven way to enhance the desire to learn. This is just another way of reaching our students and encouraging them to grow in their educational process!

UPDATES ON CONSTRUCTION



Lincoln Center Elementary

As you may have noticed, vertical construction has started for the three-classroom addition at Lincoln Center Elementary. The brutal cold snaps seem to be coming at a rapid pace, but we are pleased to report that the construction projects are still on schedule and not experiencing any delays. We anticipate completing all construction at the Lincoln Center site, with the exception of the resurfacing of the track, by mid-summer. We are anticipating the track project to be completed in mid-August.

Similar to Lincoln, we are also pleased to report that we are on schedule with construction at Kaposia Education Center. At this site, we are building a six-classroom addition which will host our expanded early learning programs for the upcoming school year. We are set to complete all construction work by mid-summer at Kaposia.

Secondary Building

All the interior plans for the Secondary Building construction project are being finalized. We anticipate opening bids for the Secondary Building project on April 8. Once the school year is completed, we will immediately begin our Secondary Building project starting with the sixth grade center which will be located directly between our auditorium and our current seventh and eighth grade classrooms.

Sixteen students at Lincoln Center recently competed in the National Geographic School Level "Geo Bee." These students spent 10 weeks studying various themes of geography.

On January 15, they put their knowledge to the test as they answered questions in seven preliminary rounds. The questions ranged from multiple choice questions on United States geography to open-ended questions about all the countries of the world! Nine students went on to compete in the Final Competition.

The competition continued until the Championship Round when Allison Benning took the lead. The next step was for her to take a 75 question paper-pencil qualifying test that was submitted to National Geographic to determine which students in Minnesota will move on to the state-level competition.

ACTIVE LEARNING



Fifth Graders at Lincoln Center recently finished a unit on Environments and Ecosystems. Our students used water tables on loan from the Science Museum of MN to learn about the effects of dams on an ecosystem.

The tables were a replica of the Elwha River and we learned how environmental engineers studied and worked to remove the real Elwha Dam with as little damage to the environment as possible.

ELL CIVICS GRANT



South Suburban Adult Basic Education (SSABE) was awarded an ELL Civics Grant from the Minnesota Department of Education. The grant is for the purpose of "providing English language learning in the context of employment and the world of work, occupations, and employability skills, while integrating at least one of four civics concepts: naturalization, civic participation, U.S. History, and Government. Civics, for the purpose of this grant opportunity, focuses on the need for

limited English individuals to understand the world of work in Minnesota, which may include, but is not limited to, career choices and in-demand job opportunities, governmental and educational resources for employment and employment training, career pathway experiences, and other concepts that are employment and work-focused in nature."

SSABE received nearly \$40,000 to further its ability to assist students in developing their English and employment skills. This a great opportunity to increase the impact education has on our local communities.

This grant allowed SSABE to purchase 20 ChromeBooks (personal computers developed by Google), along with a charging cart to be used by ELL students. The teachers use them to increase digital literacy skills as well as administering citizenship quizzes, creating PowerPoint presentations, researching colleges, searching for jobs and a lot more.

ELEMENTARY SCHOOLS RECEIVING GRANT FROM PEACEMAKER MN



The South St Paul School District is proud to accept \$37,000 in grant money from PeaceMaker MN to fund the Peace Guide positions at the elementary schools. Each elementary school received \$18,500 to pay for their Peace Guides and other peacemaking programs. The Peace Guide positions were created for the schools through the South St Paul Restorative Justice Council (www.ssprj.org). The

Peace Guides are available daily during the lunch hours at both schools.

The guides assist the students with conflict resolution, respecting others, friendship issues, bullying, and offer a quiet place to talk and eat lunch. Students can come to the guides directly, or they can be referred by a teacher, administrator or other staff. Guides use common restorative practices in the Peace Room to facilitate conflict resolution. Once resolution is found, apologies are made and friendships are restored. The Guides are the first step in supporting our students and often eliminate the need for additional staff involvement. For more information or to make a donation, visit www.peacemaker.org

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MESSAGE FROM THE SUPERINTENDENT







South St. Paul Public Schools (SSPPS) is committed to helping every student leave high school prepared for college and career success. This is a commitment that we strive at even before a child steps into a classroom here in South St. Paul. Here is a snapshot of ways our various sites and programs are working with you, your child's first and most important teacher.

Early Learning

In our preschool programs, we are expanding our service for the 2014-15 school year to begin offering five-days a week programming to our families that desire this option for their child. These half-day programs will also be accompanied with a half-day child care option so our preschoolers can ride our busses, attend our programs, eat a school lunch, and receive child care all in the same building they will be attending during their elementary years. This has never happened before in South St. Paul, and we believe this will help many of our families by assisting in the preparation for college and career readiness in our earliest grades.

Elementary

Within our elementary buildings, our teachers are personalizing the education for each and every child more than we ever have in the past. Teachers share multiple times each year, with parents and family members, the reading and math progress of their student based on nationally normed tests. With clear college and career readiness targets at every grade level, our families can now best measure their own child's progress and assist in their success. The use of technology at each of our elementary school sites has increased this year by equipping every classroom with a station of computers for students to access during the day which supports 21st century learning for all.

Secondary

Within our Secondary Building and Community Learning Center, more and more of our students are completing their coursework in a hybrid format, and frequently accessing coursework, assignments, and assessments through the teacher's digital classroom interface. While at the core, we are still teaching Math, English, Science, and Humanities, allowing our students to develop 21st century skills that will prepare them for college and beyond.

Thank you for all of your support for our schools and our kids. We have so much to be proud of.
