SYSTEMS OF SUPPORT TO INCREASE LEARNING AND SUCCESS


A STAGGERED START

South St. Paul Schools are excited to be back to in-person learning for the start of the 2021-22 school year. A staggered start to the year made it easier for staff to connect with families before the school year began. The first day of school was pushed back one day for Grades 1-5, 6, 9, and new SSPPS students, while Kindergarten, grades 7, 9, and 10-12 were pushed back two days. This allowed an extra connection day and longer meetings. Longer meeting times meant more time for teachers and families to discuss the year prior and address any of the student's needs. Realizing how challenging last school year was, it was important to take extra time and meet with each student and family individually to hear their experiences from last year and learn how we could best support them as we transitioned back to full in-person learning.



CLOSING THE GAP WITH "WHAT I NEED WEDNESDAY"

New this school year at the secondary building is "W.I.N (What I Need) Wednesday," On the identified W.I.N Wednesdays, all students are welcome to attend class in-person, but those with a C- or less in any class will be required to attend in-person. Teachers and support staff are using W.I.N. Wednesdays to offer an added layer of one-on-one support for struggling students. Teachers also have additional collaboration time on these Wednesdays to work together to create a larger safety net for students. Students who are not required to attend still have assignments to work on during the day. The incentive is, they choose whether they want to complete their tasks in school or at home. Middle School students are required to attened Wednesday, but the day is shortened and begins at 9:30 am. Busing, breakfast, and lunch are offered for students every Wednesday.





BACK TO SCHOOL HEALTH AND SAFETY

SSPPS is committed to keeping students and staff safe while attending school and events in our buildings. Throughout the summer, district leaders developed the health and safety protocols for the 2021-22 school year using guidance set forth by the Minnesota Department of Education and the Minnesota Department of Health. With SSPPS requiring face coverings for all people over the age of 2, guidance says that only students and staff that test positive for COVID must quarantine. This change in guidance from last year, helps limit the amount of

learning disruptions for the students who are close contacts to someone testing positive for COVID. As another layer of prevention, SSPPS also used federal funding to have air filtration improvements made on all district buildings. FLEX LEARNING FOR EMERGENCY SCHOOL CLOSING

New this year, SSPPS will utilize technology put in place during the 2020-21 school year to keep students learning during emergency closings. Each school and grade will have flexible learning plans that are a combination of at-home work and virtual class time. School staff have been preparing these flexible learning plans in the event of inclement weather, loss of power, water main breaks, or any other emergency situation that may close our district buildings. On weather closing days, the Flexible Learning plan for grades 7-12 fulfills legislative "E-Learning Day" requirements allowing these days to be counted for funding

and does not add days to the academic calendar. Details of the flexible learning plans as well as the various ways SSPPS uses to communicate an emergency closing with families, can be found on the district's website under the Newsroom Tab and then Emergency School Closing. STUDENTS COLLABORATE ON NATIONAL MARKETING CAMPAIGN FOR DICK'S SPORTING GOODS

Business and Entrepreneur students in the TriDistrict College and Career Readiness (CCR) program are learning about marketing strategy this semester while working with a major national retailer. The students are working with Haworth Marketing + Media on a media campaign for Dick's Sporting Goods.


Haworth Marketing + Media, a national media agency, is a partner of our TriDistrict Career and College Readiness program. Through this collaboration students will develop a broad base of in-demand, transferable skills that level-up these students in their path forward, be that in higher education or in the workforce.

As a part of their skill-building, through weekly visits with Haworth, students are learning from professionals about the different types of media that are available to businesses. In particular, students will learn how the media industry uses social media and influencers as vehicles for messaging, advertising, and communication. Students also learn about the intelligence

and data behind these tools, the different types of jobs and careers that support each decision that is made, and how it all comes together in order to bring a solution to a client.

TRIDISTRICT CAREER AND COLLEGE READINESS OPPORTUNITIES

The vision of the TriDistrict CCR Initiative is for students enrolled in South St. Paul Secondary, Simley High School, and Two Rivers High School to engage in authentic, real-world career exploration activities. They are given a wide range of opportunities to learn about their interests and personal skill sets to help them discover a career path or plan for their post-secondary education. MNDOT DEMONSTRATION PROJECT

South St. Paul Schools is the recipient of a MnDOT Demonstration Project. What is a demonstration project? It's a short-term, low cost, and temporary roadway project to promote and advance walking and biking safety. The district will be working with MnDOT, ALTA planning, and community partners to evaluate possible infrastructure improvements before potentially investing in permanent changes.

The application for this demonstration project highlights areas near Kaposia Education Center:

- Intersections of concern 7th/Dale, 5th/Dale, 7th/Spruce and 5th/Spruce
- High traffic speeds
- Pedestrian safety and limited infrastructure (sidewalks, bump outs, stop signs, stop lights, etc)
- Open to community input on how to best utilize this project to support SRTS efforts in SSP

The planning stages are currently underway and any needed installation for the project will happen in the spring of 2022. Data will be collected as MnDOT evaluates the success of the



demonstration project. This data will be used to decide if any permanent changes need to be made.

THE AMERICAN RESCUE PLAN ACT/ESSER FUNDING

On Thursday, March 11, 2021, the American Rescue Plan (ARP) ACT was signed into law bringing \$1.3 billion to school districts across Minnesota. These funds, also known as ESSER funds, are provided to help districts safely reopen and sustain the safe operation of schools and address the impact of the coronavirus pandemic in our students.

SSPPS was allocated a one-time ESSER funding of \$3.8 million to be spent over a three-year period. In order to prioritize investments that will not incur ongoing costs beyond the three-year period. SSPPS will engage with students, staff, families and the SSP community to help develop a plan for utilizing these one-time funds to support the greatest academic, behavioral and social/emotional needs of our students as a result of the COVID pandemic. DAVID R. METZEN SCHOLARSHIP HALL DEDICATION

The South St. Paul Educational Foundation is proud to announce the naming of the SSP Secondary Cafeteria as The David R. Metzen Scholarship Hall.

David R. Metzen graduated from South St. Paul High School in 1960 and received his degrees at the University of Minnesota. He returned to South St. Paul as a Principal and became the Superintendent from 1982 to 2000.

During Dave's tenure, he expanded the classroom experience to accommodate different learning styles



by adding The Alternative
Learning Center, The International
Baccalaureate Programme, and a
partnership with the Dakota County
Technical College.

Under his leadership, The South St. Paul Educational Foundation was established. This Foundation has funded education initiatives in classrooms and provided a broad scholarship program

to help students achieve their goals. The SSP Educational Foundation, in partnership with SSPPS, is dedicating the cafeteria to Metzen to commemorate his accomplishments in South St. Paul.

WALKING SCHOOL BUS

In support of Minnesota's Climate Week, September 20-24, Kaposia Elementary hosted a Walking School Bus. The Walking School Bus provides students with an opportunity to walk safely to school while also being good stewards of our earth. Staff volunteers walked with the students while teaching them about walking and traffic safety.

ADULT BASIC EDUCATION (ABE) IT'S NEVER TOO LATE TO LEARN!

We caught up with recent SSP ABE grad, Kelly Simien, to hear how having her GED has impacted her life.



Many reasons. I knew in order to get a better paying job that I needed to have it.

WHAT BROUGHT YOU TO SSP FOR YOUR GED?

I'm from SSP and I heard they had an adult program. I explored other adult education opportunities and took the GED pretest, but had trouble with the math section. I knew I wasn't going to be able to learn the material on my own and needed classroom help. I remember seeing that South St. Paul Schools had an adult education program and looked into it. It's free and I was able to take classes around my current schedule which made it easier for me to attend.

WHAT DID YOU ENJOY MOST ABOUT ABE CLASSES?

The people at SSP Community Education. They were always welcoming and helpful. My ABE teacher was great. She went above and beyond to give me one on one personal time, which really helped me understand the material. She also gave me some great advice when it came time to take the exam that really helped me with my time management. Using those skills I was able to answer every question to the best of my ability.

HOW HAS HAVING YOUR GED HELPED YOU?

I recently began working as a dispatcher for a transportation company. I am now at a higher paying job that I know I wouldn't have gotten without my GED. I really like what I am doing and feel confident I'll be able to keep moving up.

WHAT ADVICE DO YOU HAVE FOR ANYONE CONSIDERING GOING BACK TO SCHOOL **FOR THEIR GED?**

Explore all of your options and just know that the sky's the limit. You really can do anything you put your mind to no matter where you are in life. Keep going, it's worth it and ask for help when you need it. You don't have to have all the answers so don't stress if you struggle with one small section.
