

CLASSROOM HIGHLIGHTS

5TH GRADE SCIENCE-MS. OLIVERIUS

This month in 5th grade science, students have been wrapping up their unit on Matter! We identified mystery substances based on their properties, measured matter in different ways such as with a thermometer or scale, witnessed conservation of matter demonstrations, and practiced graphing! It has been a busy month that ended with an assessment this week for students to show what they know. Throughout the year students also have an opportunity to take part in a "Mission to Mars" curriculum that focuses on STEM integration into the science classroom! Students explored hydrophilic and hydrophobic substances, engineered gliders, and even programmed a Mars rover to collect rock samples. It has been a great start to science this year!





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7TH GRADE SCIENCE-MS. SARSLAND

Our 7th graders have been creating experiments, observing ecosystems and measuring data this year in science. Students saw a variety of results from





darkness creating long white stems to heating pads accelerating growth. Outdoors we observed our school forest ecosystem and recorded the results on beautiful posters. Recently we have begun preparing for Bottle Biology projects and learning about photosynthesis, respiration, aquatic ecosystems and fish behaviors in a whole new way.





The "Guppy" project is a chance for students to design an experiment that focuses on animal responses with the data collection. Planning and collecting data help the students demonstrate their understanding of the scientific method while using a genuine ecosystem. Plus, babies add to the excitement of learning about this unique live bearing fish!



8TH GRADE SCIENCE-MS.BUDDE



This month in eighth grade science has been all about energy! Eighth graders focus has been on thermal energy and its relationship to temperature and heat. We started our week learning important vocabulary words, while taking the time to delve into the properties of matter that affect thermal energy the most. On Wednesday we discussed different methods of heat transfer, and used examples and illustrations to extend and apply our learning. We are finishing out our week on thermal energy by practicing our laboratory skills. Students will be planning and conducting their own lab investigation to compare the thermal energy of a set of objects!



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8TH GRADE WRITING-MS. BEATTIE

This month, 8th Grade Writing students dove into the world of persuasive writing. We began by learning about Pathos, which is the art of emotional appeal. Students were given a random item, problem, result, and compensation and were challenged to write a persuasive letter to the customer service department of a fictional store to describe their problem and ask for their compensation. Besides being a fun creative challenge, students had to dig deep to write letters using professional and persuasive language.

Students then used their logical appeal, called Logos, to create and sell a "haunted" house. Students had to think about what would make someone want to buy a house, and how to put the most positive spin on a spooky situation. It was fun to see what students came up with, and we may have some future successful real estate agents in our midst!

Students culminated their persuasive writing unit with a persuasive essay. Students chose from a list of 53 potential topics and began to research. Many students learned that having an opinion is not the same thing as having evidence to support that opinion! Once students had their research and claim, we wrote thesis statements explaining what students would be teaching the readers of their essay. Then, students practiced quoting and paraphrasing information and writing organized paragraphs. Essays will be due next Friday!

As the quarter wraps up, I am so sad to say goodbye to this group of students! They have been through a lot during their middle school years, and I am so proud of the people that they are becoming. I will miss them when they start Art class next quarter!



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
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6TH GRADE SCIENCE-MS. WERTH

After much research, most students have determined that there is, in fact, a difference between the soil found in those sites. The question now is, "Why?" To pursue this further, 6th graders have been looking into how moving water may have played a part in why we are seeing differences in the soil at these different sites. This week, students started investigating with stream tables and are currently discussing what questions they might wish to investigate further using the stream tables.
