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Kindergarten November News



We will be celebrating Veterans' Day Veterans on Wednesday, November 9th! Children will honor our Veterans' with songs, poems and cards.

We will be learning about the first Thanksgiving. At this time, we always think about the things we are truly thankful for. We will also be teaming up with first grade to have our 2nd annual CEW Giving Thanks Parade on November 21st with a rain date of November 22nd. Details to follow.

We are continuing to introduce letters and sounds each week and are learning how sentences are structured. In Reader's Workshop, readers will continue to look closely at familiar texts and be immersed in reading.

In Writer's Workshop, we are moving from labeling our illustrations to writing pattern books.

In Math, students are learning to model, count, and write numbers from 0-9. The children are also finding different ways to make groups of 6, 7, 8, and 9. Our students are building fluency in counting and recognizing 0-9 as well.

1st Grade November News

Reading:

We are becoming "Word Detectives"! Students are revisiting strategies learned in kindergarten and learning more efficient word solving strategies that will help them read more challenging books. First graders are also searching for punctuation clues to help make their reading voices smooth.

<u>Writing:</u>

We will continue with *Informational Writing:*How-To, it is our first introduction to writing
non-fiction texts. This unit of study helps students
write procedures for completing a task. Our first
grade writers will write instructions that illustrate
steps in sequence, reread and revise and use
words such as "first, next, then, and last. Children
love to be experts and write steps for all the things
they know how to do!

<u>Fundations:</u>

Students are becoming more responsible for reading and spelling trick words in their writing. Students are also becoming proficient at sounding out decodable words by tapping and applying known spelling patterns of CVC words with short vowels, digraphs, and bonus letters. Students will be learning new glued sounds and baseword/suffix-s word patterns.

Social Studies:

First graders will begin Unit 2, We Are Family. In this unit, the children will explore how families are alike and different. They will create their own family tree and identify family roles and responsibilities. In addition, students will discuss Election Day and voting. They will also learn about the importance of Veterans' Day and Thanksgiving.

<u>Science:</u>

We are continuing our "Spinning Sky" unit in Mystery Science. This month, we will be learning about why the stars come out at night and how to use stars to help us find our way when we get lost.



<u>Math:</u>

Students will continue addition and start working on subtraction concepts and subtraction strategies. They will be using pictures and objects to show taking from, using story problem solving strategies, subtracting to compare, taking apart numbers, and subtracting from 10 or less.



2nd Grade



Reading

In reader's workshop, we are becoming experts as we begin our Nonfiction Unit. We will be growing our ideas about a topic, understanding and using key-words, and connecting information from one text to another.

Writing

In writer's workshop, students learn that anything they know a lot about-(soccer, an ice cream shop, ladybugs)-and write in ways that teach their readers about the topic. Second graders have pride being an expert and they are eager to show and tell channeling them to write with details and with writerly craft!



Math

In math, we will be adding
and subtracting larger numbers using
doubles facts, repeated addition, and
regrouping. We will continue to
strengthen number sense through
number talks and problem solving,
including place value, making tens to help
with mental math, and exploring how
addition and subtraction are related.



<u>Science</u>

In science, we are exploring our first unit in our new program Mystery Science! We are learning the physical properties of matter using size, color, shape, texture, sound, hardness, and temperature.

Social Studies

In social studies, we are learning how to be an active citizen, discussing rules, American symbols, voting, and paying taxes. This month we will be celebrating our veterans at our Veteran's Day Program on Wednesday, November 10th!!



3rd Grade November News

We are ready to begin a new month in third grade. It will be an exciting month with Election Day, Veterans' Day and Thanksgiving activities.

Science:

We will continue working through the Mystery Science program on Weather and Climate. Students will be designing and creating structures to guard against high winds and learning more about natural disasters.



Social Studies:

We will continue to explore maps, the seven continents and the five major oceans. We will begin exploring landforms. Students will be preparing to contribute to our Veteran's Day Assembly.

Math:

We will be continuing to talk about regrouping. We will also be starting multiplication. We launched the 3rd grade Math Madness Competition with addition facts.

Please continue to practice addition and subtraction facts as well as regrouping and estimating.

Writing:

We will work on collecting information on a variety of topics for use in the creation of non-fiction books.

Reading:

In reading, students will navigate nonfiction texts utilizing a box and bullets structure; this will allow us to determine the main idea of a text through the use of supporting details.

4th Grade November News

Social Studies:

Students will be learning about Native Americans in New York State, specifically the Algonquin and Iroquois. Students will learn about Native American culture and how it has shaped our culture today.

<u>Writing:</u>

Students will be learning how to write a realistic fiction story, inspired by true events in their life.

Math:

Students will use the strategies they learned for multiplying by 1-digit factors and apply those strategies to multiplying by multi-digit factors.

Science: Students will be continuing to learn about energy. Students will investigate how energy is stored, how it can make objects move, and how collisions transfer energy between objects. Students will also construct devices that convert energy from one form into another, such as heat into motion and electricity into light.

Health:

Students will be continuing to learn about managing stress, conflict resolution, and their growing and changing bodies.



<u>Reading:</u>

Students will be learning how to interpret characters and make claims about characters.

ART



Second Grade

This month, second graders will be learning all about the element of art, color! We will learn about primary colors and how they mix to create secondary colors using crayons. They will create a step-by-step drawing of a Turkey with its feathers as the color wheel. Students will also be introduced on how to properly use watercolor paint and brushes for the background.


Third Grade

This month, third graders will be learning about color theory. We will dive into color while learning about the art movement, Pop Art. The students will understand basic color schemes: primary, secondary, and complementary colors as seen in Pop Art. They will also look at and produce art in the style of Wayne Thiebaud using a basic color scheme.

Fourth Grade

This month, fourth graders will begin color theory while learning about the art movement, Pop Art. We will review the color wheel as well as what colors are primary, secondary, and complementary. Students will produce artwork in the style of pop artist, Roy Lichtenstein. Using onomatopoeia, we will learn how to create block/bubble letters and create drop shadows to make it more three-dimensional.

K-1st Grade: In November students will continue using the First Steps in Music curriculum to explore the world of music. We will begin using new kinds of instruments, and we will start building up the skills necessary to create our own music using instruments.

2nd-3rd Grade: We will continue to develop our rhythm reading skills and begin learning about melody in music. We will also learn about the importance of Veterans' Day and Thanksgiving through singing different songs and experiencing music of varying meters and tonalities.

<u>4th Grade:</u> We will continue developing our rhythm reading skills and learning the proper names of symbols in music notation. We will also learn about the importance of Veterans' Day and Thanksgiving through singing different songs and experiencing music of varying meters and tonalities.

4th Grade Band: Band: The Band students have begun testing for their first band karate belt songs (Hot Cross Buns and Go Tell Aunt Rhody) Students have mastered the first five notes of the scale and are reading them on the staff. Players should be practicing a minimum of 15 minutes a day. Please encourage daily practice at home.



KINDERGARTEN

LIBRARY

Here in the Primary Center library, we are continuing to explore the literary world and learn together through fun and engaging read-alouds in both grades!

Since we've been reviewing the parts of a book and front cover features (author, illustrator, title) in October, we will kick off November by starting our Mo Willems author/illustrator study! We will try to touch on all of his series and characters, such as Gerald & Piggie, The Pigeon, Leonardo the Terrible Monster, and more!

1ST GRADE

Mid-October we began our unit on inferring, using a special series of wordless picture books by Aaron Becker (*Journey, Quest, Return*) to help us practice! We finished the first book in the trilogy at the end of October and we will continue our "Quest" through the rest in the month of November. Will the little boy and girl be able to save the world? Ask your kid(s) how it all ends!

During November, the 2nd grade will be introduced to Sora. Sora is a 24-7 digital Library that can be accessed through the app or online. Our second graders will learn how to access Sora online and how access books through Sora. We will also be reviewing the differences between fiction and nonfiction. The 2nd grade will be reading Balloons over Broadway. We will learn about Tony Sarg-the puppeteer that invented the helium balloons that are the trademark of the Macy's Day Parade. The 2nd graders will then use different STEM materials to create their own floats.

NOVEMBER 2022 COLD & FLU SEASON

With the temperature starting to get lower, it's becoming that time of year where we need to start preparing ourselves for cold & flu season. Be sure to get plenty of rest, eat well and always dress appropriately for the weather to keep our bodies happy! Here are a few guidelines to help you make a decision regarding school attendance:

- ➤ All children with a temperature of 100 degrees or more should remain home and not return to school until they have maintained a normal temperature for at least 24 hours, without fever reducing medication. If the fever has been high and the child has been sick for a few days, he/she may require additional days of rest. Sending your child back too soon may result in a relapse of symptoms.
- ➤ A child who is coughing frequently or has severe congestion may need to stay home. Constant coughing makes any child weak and also may disrupt the class. Children with a cough or cold type symptoms may attend school with manageable symptoms.
- ➤ A Medical Provider or the School Nurse should be consulted before a child returns to school that has had a diagnosis of a contagious disease.
- ➤ Medical documentation with a diagnosis, return date and any limitation or restriction is helpful for the child's return to school.



We can continue to work together to make healthy, safe choices for our children and focus on things we can be thankful for during November.
