Where is it spreading?

As of May 31st, monkeypox has emerged in twelve countries. These countries are Australia, Canada, Belgium, France, Netherlands, Italy, Germany, Portugal, Sweden, and the United States. This is excluding central and western African countries where the virus is most concentrated.

Symptoms

The virus begins with the following symptoms: fever. muscle aches, backaches, chills, swollen lymph nodes, exhaustion and/or headaches. Soon after the initial infection, a rash starts from which lesions develop. When a person has such lesions, they have the most transmissible form of the virus.

Transmission?

Monkeypox was seen in monkeys in 1958, however, the main animal source for the transmission of today's strain is rodents. Monkeypox is thought to transfer inefficiently from person to person, although it is spread through direct contact with contaminated objects, skin touching skin, and respiratory droplets. In addition, there are mounting concerns about the sexual transmission of this virus.

What do we know?

Monkeypox is a DNA virus meaning that it replicates using its DNA. DNA viruses are more stable and less prone to mutations, they evolve much slower, unlike the Coronavirus which is an RNA virus, and can mutate quickly. Once more it has been stressed by doctors that the transmission is not highly effective. This virus originates from the west and central Africa where it is endemic. The west African strain is more forgiving than the central African strain as it has a 1 percent fatality rate. The central African strain has a 10 percent mortality rate. Monkeypox is an orthopoxvirus making it similar to Smallpox which was deadlier but was eradicated. The vaccine for smallpox is 85 percent effective against Monkeypox as of now. Monkeypox has only recently started spreading across the globe, following it, is a lengthy 21-day quarantine for those unfortunately infected.

Conclusion

Ultimately, Monkeypox is not a virus to be left horror-struck about, according to numerous health officials. Simply exercise proper hygiene and handwashing, as well as refrain from coming into close contact with individuals who possess symptoms, and you will be fine.

Enlightenment Upon Women's History Month & **Successful Females** By: Ipsita Barnwal

February 1980. A time containing a rather prominent milestone, a testament of our society's constant amelioration. At this very juncture is where President Jimmy Carter proclaimed March 2nd to March 8th as National Women's History Week. Carter had gotten this bright idea from a weeklong celebration of women's history organized by the school district of Sonoma, California in 1978. This idea was adopted within communities, school districts and organizations across the country, eventually seizing Carter's attention, instigating his official proclamation to the country. In his declaration, he expressed his beliefs regarding women and their substantial influence in society. He conveyed how from the initial unfolding of civilization, it was imperative for both men and women to collaborate in order for the United States of America to be. He claimed that women were often overlooked, their involvement and contributions to the flourishing of their community's culture and history disregarded. Carter proclaimed that this was far from ethical, and that women and their exertions were just as much of a requisite than those of any man.

Thus, he specifically established this week in order to incentivize and encourage people to enlighten themselves and others upon the struggles and triumphs of women, as well as their strives for equality and justice. At the time, Carter was especially adamant in ensuring that people had knowledge of certain female leaders mentioned in his proclamation such as Harriet Tubman, Susan B. Anthony, Alice Paul, and so on. He genuinely believed that apprehending and appreciating our nation's past to its full potential would assist us in understanding the exigency for utter equality among all. He went on to ratify the 27th Amendment to the United States Constitution, which was "Equality of rights under the law shall not

be denied or abridged by the United States or by any State on account of sex." Six years later, the National Women's History Project petitioned Congress, and with their success, were able to expand the weeklong event and make it the entire month of March, as we know it today.

Female Role Models of the Past

The number of women that have made their mark on the world by the exceptional life they lead is certainly prodigious. By their stellar endeavors, history was created, and more notably, betterments to society were made, engendering it to be as we recognize it today.

Katherine Johnson - Indelible Pioneer in the World of STEM

This African American woman left many marks on the world, and in outer space too. Too many to name, all impossible to forget. As a Black girl living in the South, Katherine Johnson had to put up with extensive amounts of segregation, including in the school system. The Black school only contained two rooms for seven grades, and Black high schools were not exactly convenient location wise. Johnson's family had to move to attend, which is common at the time. With her exceptional intellect, Johnson was able to graduate high school at just thirteen years of age and went on to continue her education at West Virginia State College. By the age of eighteen, she possessed a double degree in both French and math, graduating with the highest honors.



Later on, Johnson landed a job at the National Advisory Committee for Aeronautics (NACA), where she performed as a female computer who fulfilled all of the calculations for the male staff working as engineers. In this time period, the United States was involved in a cold war with Russia. Both nations were in arduous, demanding competition to produce aircraft for their country's security. Although indirect, there was discrimination against black people, especially black women, at NACA. There were two divisions of computers, separated by race. One for black women, and the other for white women. More was expected out of black women who were being hired as computers – black computers had a requisite of a high GPA and college degrees, while white women were not expected, nor required to have these. Johnson also dealt with segregated rules for things such as the bathroom and cafeteria. Just two weeks after Johnson started at her new job, she was singled out by her boss as one of the sharpest computers they had, as one of the male engineers was sought assistance. After catching an error in a set of calculations of his with ease, Katherine Johnson remained a part of their team, advancing from her position as a computer.

Katherine continued to work assiduously, day and night. She was present after Russia had introduced two satellites into orbit, and NACA turned into what we know now, the National Aeronautics and Space Administration (NASA). America's new objective was to have Americans enter space, and Johnson invested copious hours in her work, even when that meant having to leave her daughters by themselves and compromising her time spent with them. Johnson was committed to determining how exactly an astronaut was to be sent into orbit around the Earth. One of the pivotal issues was figuring out where the spacecraft would be landing. But even so, Johnson volunteered to calculate the path, delivering a final report, the first of its kind authored by a woman. Two years later, in 1962, Johnson was requested to do the work that she would ultimately be most known for. John Glenn was in arrangement to be the first American to orbit the planet, and with the immense help of Johnson's calculations, he was able to do so successfully three times around, with a safe

landing on Earth. Johnson was also a significant collaborator in helping NASA figure out how to launch a spacecraft into the orbit of the moon, and how to connect an orbiting craft with one that was landed on the moon. In July of 1969, the United States was able to land on the moon.

Johnson continued to work vehemently at NASA for the next seventeen years, ensuring that all three of her daughters went to college and graduated from it. She went on to tutor students and advocate profusely for improved access to STEM education for young Black females. In 2015, she was rewarded with the Presidential Medal of Freedom. In 2017, a movie centered around her life was released, and it was called "Hidden Figures". In the same year, NASA named its new computing facility after her. Despite the obstructions that were set in Katherine Johnson's path, she was able to do what she did best with unprecedented accomplishment and become the phenomenal women she was.

Florence Nightingale - "The Lady with the Lamp"

Florence Nightingale's legacy is one of considerable heroism, a story of true leadership, a lifelong devotion to an altruistic lifestyle. From a noticeably early age, Nightingale was an active philanthropist. She dedicated much of her time and effort tending to the needs of the ill and poor neighboring her and her family's estate. By the time that she was sixteen, Nightingale became assured that nursing was what she was destined to do, her divine purpose. Unfortunately, when Nightingale approached her parents fervidly with the news of her ambitions, they did not return the same enthusiasm as she did and were disapproving and forbidding to say the least. Part of culture during the Victorian Era was for a young lady of Nightingale's social class to marry a man of means and pursuing a passion such as the one that Nightingale wished to pursue was considered lowly, menial labor by people of her social stature.

However, this was not a hurdle that Nightingale was not capable of leaping over. When she reached the age of seventeen, she repudiated a marriage proposal from a man by the name of Richard Monckton Milnes, considered "suitable" for her. She attested to her rationale for why it was that she turned down the offer, advocating for



her claim that it would become a hindrance in the attaining of her life's goals. Despite all the condemnation that she was receiving, Nightingale decided to enroll as a nursing student at the of Pastor Fliedner hospital stay. in Kaiserwerth,

her true calling.

In the early 1850s, Nightingale voyaged to London where she was hired as a nurse in a Middlesex hospital. Within just a year of being employed at this hospital, Nightingale was promoted to the superintendent due to the imposing work she exhibited. Nightingale was significantly tested when a cholera outbreak surfaced. Nightingale decided to make it her aim to revolutionize practices of hygiene, which would do a noteworthy job in reducing death rates at the hospital. She worked vigorously to guarantee the success of her efforts. Later, in October of 1853, the Crimean War was embarked upon. In late 1854, Nightingale was requested to tend to the sick and fallen soldiers in Crimea. Nightingale acted as competently and promptly as she could and congregated a team of nurses. She then sailed to Crimea with them a few days later. What awaited them school of her own, named the Nightingale Training when they reached Crimea was nothing like what they School for Nurses. This not even being everything had anticipated. The environment was far from even adequate, and soldiers were dying left and right from battle wounds, more so from diseases such as cholera and typhoid.

Consequently, Nightingale went straight to work, making sure the hospital was uncontaminated, and the soldiers were cared for. She would travel through the lightless hallways in the evenings carrying acknowledgement as the pioneer of modern nursing. a lamp while she ministered her patients. This is how she acquired the title "the Lady with the Lamp". Moved by her endless compassion and consoling, people would also call her "the Angel of Crimea." The work Nightingale did, reduced death rates at

the hospital by a staggering two-thirds. Not only did Nightingale vastly enhance the hospital's sanitary conditions, but she also created a variety of services for patients which served the purpose of improving the stay that patients underwent at the hospital. For example, she instituted the manufacturing of a service where patients with special dietary requirements and restrictions were cooked food that was pleasurable for them to consume. She established the concept of laundry as well, so that patients would have access to materials such as clean garments and bedding. She even introduced a classroom, as well as a library that patients would be able to go to, serving as Lutheran Hospital entertainment and intellectual stimulation during their

Based on her time spent in Crimea, Nightingale Germany in 1844, wrote Notes on Matters Affecting the Health, Efficiency set on getting to pursue what she always believed to be and Hospital Administration of the British Army, a report consisting of eight hundred thirty pages. It was written as an analysis of her experience at Crimea, and proposed reforms for other military hospitals which were also in appalling condition. Her report would spark a comprehensive amending and restructuring of the War Office's administrative department, and the establishing of a Royal Commission for the Health of the Army in 1857. After the Crimean dilemma was resolved in the summer of 1856, Nightingale returned back home, and was greeted by Queen Victoria, as well as rewarded for her work with an engraved brooch called the "Nightingale Jewel" and \$250,000 from the British government. Nightingale was able to take this additional support to go even further to create change, and do things such as employ researchers, create visuals such as "Nightingale's Rose Diagram", fund hospital establishments, and she would even create a Nightingale has accomplished in her lifetime; it is clear she made a stark difference with her efforts. Thanks to Nightingale, nursing became a much more respected and reputable occupation, an honorable one at that, and created momentous change in the medical industry in myriad ways. Her work, lifechanging for so many, definitely made her deserve her

Female Role Models of Today

The female role models that we have as fantastic leaders in our world today are crucial to the development of our society, as with their involvement comes notable differences. These leaders are some of the people keeping our world spinning in the current day, and the examples they set are likely to be the footsteps that our future leaders walk in.

Greta Thunberg - Tiny but Mighty Environmentalist

This youthful leader is truly an inspiration to many and took on quite the salient responsibility of turning mere anxieties about the planet into a much more serious calling. Thunberg first realized that this was something she had to pursue, something that had to be further prioritized when her primary school teacher showed her class a video of what the effects of climate change looked like. The extreme weather, starving polar bears, and melting ice affected Thunberg in a way that it affected none of her classmates, and she fell into a deep depression when she turned eleven. She stopped speaking almost entirely for several months, and became so malnourished that she was nearly hospitalized, later stunting her growth. Thunberg remembers the striking confusion she felt through this period, claiming how she could not have a handle on how such a threat could exist, without being any sort of precedence in the slightest. She recalled the bit of denial she experienced as well, saying "that can't be happening, because if that were happening, then the politicians would be taking care of it". When she came to terms with the fact that this was not at all the reality she lived in, minor changes were first implemented in her household, by Thunberg's family to abide as well, in an effort to provide Thunberg with comfort, and start to make a difference one step at a time by reducing their emissions. The family mostly terminated their meat intake, installed solar panels in their estate, began growing their own produce, and even gave up flying as a mode of transportation. Slowly, Thunberg started to get back to her normal self, and began to eat and talk again. Thunberg was diagnosed with Asperger's Syndrome, a form of autism spectrum disorder, a development disorder. This information served as a

prime explanation as to why Thunberg had such a crisis. Thunberg asserted that in a way she was grateful for her diagnosis, as there were advantages to the way her brain worked in her opinion.

Thunberg's actions started to acquire lots of recognition when she skipped school and embarked upon a global movement in August of 2018. She would spend her day to day camping



out in front of the Swedish Parliament holding her well known sign with bold, black letters reading "Skolstrejk för klimatet" (School Strike for Climate). She would often sit alone, aside from a few journalists who would come by to speak with her. The quantity of people that accompanied her grew gradually. A

couple. A few. A dozen. Hundreds. Thousands. This gave birth to the "Fridays for Future" movement, where protesting would take place every Friday until Sweden aligned with the Paris Agreement. Striking was something that made Thunberg feel alive, and brought her true happiness, and this seemed to be true for lots of others in one way or another, as soon, people worldwide were beginning to strike as well. People were taking action left and right to do something about the abuse that our planet goes through. In a matter of months following this event, Thunberg had addressed heads of state at the U.N., met with the Pope, sparred with former President Obama, and even instigated four million people to join her in the global climate strike on September 20th, 2019, marked down as the largest climate demonstration in human history. Thunberg has successfully created a worldwide attitude shift and has persuaded a multitude of leaders, from mayors to presidents, to make valuable commitments regarding climate change. For example, after speaking with Parliament and demonstrating with Extinction Rebellion, a British environmental group, the U.K. passed a law requiring that the country make an endeavor to

eventually eliminate their carbon footprint. Despite the powerful reaction to being enlightened upon climate hurdles Thunberg encountered, she was capable of things that mattered a lot through her fervent passion for the world and the environment.

Sonia Sotomayor - Hispanic History in the **Supreme Court**

Throughout the course of her life, Sonia Sotomayor had a great deal of encumbrances to combat, which she eventually overcame with impressive resiliency. To name a few, at only seven years old, Sotomayor was diagnosed with Type 1 diabetes, and typically when one got diagnosed at an age of considerable prematurity for such a disease, they were not expected to survive anywhere past the age of fifty. Furthermore, Sotomayor grew up having an alcoholic father who had passed away when she was nine, and a mother who was frequently absent in her life, especially due to Sotomayor's late father. Sotomayor's mother also possessed a lack of affection towards her daughter, thus the relationship that was sustained between them was quite complicated, as she tends to express in the book she wrote, titled "My Beloved World." In this book, Sotomayor discusses the many struggles she faced throughout life, which ultimately shaped her as a person and lead her to where she is today.

Despite the fact that she was rather intellectual



and perseverant, Sotomayor's family lacked the knowledge and financial resources which would have aided her in her path to success. Her parents were incapable of fulfilling the task of giving Sotomayor her insulin shots, so she decided to do so herself, even when she was barely capable of performing the task. In an interview she once

how being diabetic drover her in a way "that perhaps nothing else might have to accomplish as much... as early as possible", as she was living with the belief that her lifespan was significantly shortened.

Moreover, Sotomayor was also discriminated against at her time studying at Princeton. Being a woman, a minority, and a recent admit into college, she encountered an abundance of hostility in her direction.

Along with that, her grades in her classes were falling short. However, she did not let that be an obstruction in her path, but rather something for her to address and utilize as motivation to do better. She studied a bountiful amount of grammar and vocabulary over her summer breaks, and later graduated Princeton with honors. Later, Sotomayor moved on to become the first Hispanic and Latina Supreme Court Justice in America. Sotomayor did not let any of the adversity that faced her derail her path to Washington, DC.

Conversion therapy. What is it?

Conversion therapy is a type of "therapy" used on people in the LGBTQ+ community to "convert" them into being straight and cis. (Cis: someone who identifies as the gender they were assigned at birth). Conversion therapy is a very harmful process and many survivors of conversion therapy have spoken out against it.

Conversion therapy has been banned in many countries, including Brazil, Samoa, Fiji, Taiwan, Argentina, Uruguay, Ecuador, Malta, Germany, Spain, Australia, At least 20 states in America, Chile, India, Canada, France, and New Zealand. Several bills have been introduced to preserve the practice of repeal the bans on conversion therapy across the United States.

Conversion therapy has been discredited time and time again. It has been discredited by every major professional association that deals with mental health. The belief that someone's sexual orientation or gender identity can be changed, or "fixed", is not based on medical or scientific evidence, according to the American Medical Association.

Throughout a lifetime, the estimated cost of conversion therapy adds up to almost \$100,000 per person. Affirmative therapy has been shown to save more than \$40,000 per person. In total, conversion therapy costs were estimated to be



more than \$650 million per year, and the issues connected with that economic issue were \$8.58 billion. In total that is \$9.23 billion. If LGBTQ+ youth were given affirming therapy, the estimated amount saved would be nearly \$6.19 billion over their lifetimes.

In 2021, more than half a million LGBTQ+ youth in the US alone were at risk of undergoing conversion therapy. Many countries have been working to ban, or have already banned conversion therapy. Other countries unfortunately don't hold the same viewpoints. The UK Prime Minister, Boris Johnson, has failed to fully ban conversion therapy. In the UK, it is legal for a transgender person to go to conversion therapy.

One way to combat conversion therapy is by contacting your state representatives and letting them know what you think about it. This is useful in states where they are trying to undo the ban. I hope you found this article helpful and informative.


Umbrella Terms

Common Sexualities and Genders

Introduction

Hey, my guys, gals, enby pals, and all other genders. Happy Pride Month! Pride, as most of you know, is a month celebrating LGBTQ+ people. I won't go in depth about the history of the movement leading up to now; there's another article for that!

LGBTQ+:

There are a few acronyms used to represent this community. There are LGBT+, LGBTQ+, and LGBTQIA+, but for the rest of this article, we're going to be using LGBTQ+. The definition of LGBTQ+ from Merriam Webster is "Lesbian, gay, bisexual, transgender, and queer/questioning (one's sexual or gender identity)," but those five letters only show a fraction of what the LGBTQ+ community is, which is why we have the plus sign.

LGBTQ+ doesn't begin to represent all the sexualities and genders one can identify as. These five letters show how a fraction of the LGBTQ+ community identifies. We are going to discuss some of the most common sexualities and gender identities These are only some of the common ones. There are hundreds and maybe even THOUSANDS of sexualities and gender identities, but I'm only going to talk about a few.

Sexualities

Being Gay/Lesbian

Let's start with the fact that being gay is, by definition, "a person who is homosexual (used especially of a man)." It is usually used to express people who are both gay and lesbian. In simpler terms, if a man is attracted to only men, then he is gay, and if a woman is attracted to only women, then she is a lesbian. People do not get to choose who they are attracted to. People do not choose to be gay, lesbian, transgender, or queer, just like how people can't choose to be straight or cis. It is never okay to judge someone based on who they're attracted to or how they identify. Choose kindness, not homophobia or transphobia.

Bisexuality, Pansexuality, and Polysexuality

As well as being attracted to one gender, many people identify as bisexual, pansexual, or polysexual. These people are attracted to more than one gender.

Bisexuality is being attracted to both males and females. People who are also attracted to nonbinary people can classify as bisexual. Being bisexual does not mean that you equally like boys, girls, and nonbinary people. Most people who identify as bisexual have preferences over which gender they prefer.

Pansexuality is being attracted to all genders. Genders don't just include male, female, and nonbinary. There are hundreds of different genders that you can identify as and can feel attracted to. Being

pansexual means that they feel attracted to all genders. As I said with bisexuality, pansexual people can have preferences over which gender they prefer.

not feel that they fit in with the gender "boxes" set for each gender. They feel that their gender falls outside of the gender binary. Instead of using pronouns such as he/him or she/her, they use pronouns such

Genders

Intersex

Someone who is Intersex is defined as someone who doesn't fit the gender binary of male or female physical traits at birth. Someone may have both or neither. The traits don't necessarily have to be visible. For example, someone who is intersex may appear female physically, but they may have hormones that typically define males.

Transgender

People who are transgender are people who identify as a gender other than their birth sex.

The first thing to know is that sex and gender are different. Sex is what a person is defined as at birth, based on chromosomes and other physical characteristics. Gender, on the other hand, is what someone defines themselves as. It can be what they were assigned at birth, if so, then they are considered Cisgender, or Cis, but it isn't necessarily. One who doesn't fit into this last statement is considered transgender. Every trans person's experience is unique.

Let's also speak about gender expression. The way you express your gender (meaning the way you dress, things you like, makeup you wear, and other things) doesn't mean you are a certain gender. For example, some things are seen to be more feminine, such as makeup, dresses, and nail polish, but wearing or doing any of these things doesn't necessarily mean you are a girl! It doesn't mean that you are gay! It means that you are you, that you are happy and expressing yourself the way you want. No matter how you choose to express yourself, you are valid. Your gender is valid.

Pronouns

Pronouns don't equate gender, and gender doesn't equate pronouns. Usually, girls use she/her pronouns, but a girl may be more comfortable with they/them pronouns. The most common pronouns are She/Her, He/Him, and They/Them, though countless others are used. Many people also use multiple pronouns, such as He/they. Depending on the person, they may use the pronouns interchangeably, or they may use different pronouns in different situations. Some people also use neopronouns. Neopronouns are pronouns other than She, He, They, and It.

It may seem daunting to ask somebody for their pronouns, but it is important information to know to make sure that everybody is comfortable. If you need clarification, ask. If you have questions, ask. Don't be embarrassed.

Nonbinary and Genderqueer

Being nonbinary means, in simplest terms, that a person does

not feel that they fit in with the gender "boxes" set for each gender. They feel that their gender falls outside of the gender binary. Instead of using pronouns such as he/him or she/her, they use pronouns such as they/them or ze/zir. Nonbinary people can choose to represent as transgender, and many of them do. However, if you are nonbinary, it does not necessarily make you transgender. Non-binary also includes those who believe they are bigender (a mix of male and female) and agender (they don't identify with any identity or gender).

Being genderqueer is very similar to being nonbinary. When you are genderqueer, you feel that you also have no predetermined way to describe your gender.

Genderfluid and Agender

Being genderfluid is when a person's gender is, as said in the name, fluid. Drifting from one gender to the other. It does not necessarily always go from male to female. Genderfluidity can be on a spectrum of genders including but not limited to male, female, non-binary, agender, bi-gender, tri-gender, demi-girl, demi-boy, etc. a genderfluid person's gender can change daily. They cannot control what gender they identify as on one specific day. They deserve respect no matter their gender.

Someone who is Agender, (Agender, not a gender, quite the opposite actually) doesn't define as any gender. Some may not have words to explain their gender, not care about gender, not want to label their gender, consider gender to be a social construct or other things. People who are Agender may identify as Genderqueer, Non-binary, Trans, or other genders that they feel fit them in addition to Agender.

Queer and Questioning

Sometimes, you don't need labels. Queer is an umbrella term, for the whole community. Some people choose to solely identify as Queer. They feel that that is the identity that represents them best. They may also just not know who they are. Haven't figured themself out yet. That's called Questioning. When you don't know who you are. Some people never question it. They just know. But for others, it takes longer, some never figure it out.

Society puts such stress on labels. It's not always that black and white. Don't be afraid to not label yourself. Don't be afraid to not fit into that little box over there. You are you. You don't need everything to be solved. Sometimes, not everything has an answer. No matter what, you are valid. You can love (or not love) who you want, be who you want, and appear as what you want. You are you, and that's all that matters.

We know this only scratches the surface, and there is so much more information not stated, but taking the time to learn is the most important thing we can do. Happy Pride!






Some of My Favorite Books as of Now (and why) Olivia Tuzel





In 1863, a medical sanitarium worker by the name Liz comes to realize that Wes isn't too bad after all, and of James Caleb Jackson discovered that by drying graham flour dough, and then breaking it into pieces, you could make mildly appetizing grain cakes that could be eaten at breakfast. These cakes, however, were extremely hard, and thus had to be soaked in milk the night before to be edible in the morning. Jackson called his invention "granula."

> Some years after the original granula was created, a surgeon in a different sanitarium, John Harvey Kellogg,

Some confusion arose, as Kellogg called his Kellogg changed the food's name to "granola." John's brother, Will Keith Kellogg, also worked at the sanitarium, and the brothers would continue experimenting to come up with a healthier breakfast food, one that was more breakfast.

The brothers began boiling wheat, rolling it out into a sheet, then grinding the wheat. This led to mixed results, and the Kellogg brothers kept experimenting with this method in an attempt to perfect it. In 1894, the brothers left a pot of wheat out by accident, but decided to roll it anyway. The grain did not roll out into a sheet like the previous attempts, but instead split into hundreds of flakes, which the Kellogg brothers promptly toasted, creating the blueprint for modern cereal.

W. K. Kellogg saw that his brother wasn't going all in into their new endeavor, so he bought John out, and began selling the toasted corn and wheat flakes. Over time, other cereal brands would emerge, such as Post. Post started when C.W. Post, a man from Texas who was visiting the sanitarium that the Kellogg brothers worked at was so amazed by the new product "Grape-Nuts" and "Post Toasties," respectively.

More innovation to cereal came in the early 20th century, when the Quaker Oats company acquired puffed-rice technology. Soon after, the highly nutritious wheat and grain flakes became less popular, and puffed cereals, such as Cheerios, Rice Krispies, and Trix became household names. These new puffed cereals had less fiber, but had loads of added sugar, making them especially popular with children. The transition from the health-focused origins of early cereal brands, to a more marketable, sugary breakfast treat, caused cereal companies to become the billion-dollar food corporations we know today.

Cereal is deeply rooted in a rich history,

filled with out-of-the-box thinkers, masterful innovators, and cunning business magnates, all working to cement their names in history, and create the ultimate breakfast food.

In honor of cereal history, we have decided to rank 43 different cereals, using the basic tier list format of S++ through F.

S++ Tier

- Shaq Edition Frosted Flakes: Shaq. Dr. O' Neal. Diesel. Big Shamrock. Superman. The Big Aristotle. Wilt Chamberneezy. The Big Shaqtus. The list goes on. Shaquille O' Neal is known by many names. Widely regarded as one of the best basketball players of all time, it's no surprise that Shaq would have his own cereal flavor. Performing in various commercials alongside Tony the Tiger, O' Neal has already become synonymous with the Frosted Flakes brand and Kellogg's as a whole. Shaq is also a huge supporter of Mission Tiger, a program led by Kellogg's to ensure that every child has access to school sports. To display Shaq's support for Mission Tiger and Frosted Flakes, Kellogg's gave Shaq a limited edition flavor, featuring cinnamon basketballs in addition to the classic frosted corn flakes. The box art has also been redesigned, and now features Tony the Tiger spinning one of those cinnamon basketballs on his finger, as the NBA Hall of Famer's gigantic head stares at the feline mascot in awe. Frosted Flakes are already one of the best cereals, and everyone loves Shaq, so having this cereal in S++ is a no-brainer.

S+ Tier

- Rice Krispies: Rice Krispies are an example of what cerea should be. They are an exciting texture that wakes up the mouth and with a simple yet pleasing flavor they are easily one of the best.
- Frosted Flakes: The default kind of Frosted Flakes is one of the most versatile, well rounded cereals. They are the best cereal to eat without milk, and are just as good with milk. They have the perfect amount of frosting, to the point where it's sweet, but not overbearing. They have an immaculate crunch to them, and the flavor they turn the milk is just heavenly. The only gripe I have is that they don't taste all too great when they're soggy, but at that point, the flavor of the milk will make up for any lost flavor on the flakes themselves.
- Cookie Crisps: Everyone loves chocolate chip cookies so why not put it in a cereal? Cookie Crisps does this well by having good cookies that pair great with milk and they don't have the hassle of a regular sized cookie.
- Honey Nut Cheerios: Another classic cereal, Honey Nut



Cheerios are an improvement over regular Cheerios in every way. Whereas the original Cheerios are a bit lacking in both cereal flavor and milk flavor, the hint of honey they added fixed all of that. However, I'd argue that this is better in the case of Raisin Bran, as the lack of bold flavors allows you to taste the milk, raisin, and bran in each spoonful, letting you feel the individual flavors, whilst also seeing how they blend together. - Fruity Pebbles: When you think of good cereals one of them that comes to mind is of Rice Krispies mixed with a sweet fruity flavor and the Flintstones on the box.

S Tier

- Froot Loops: Froot Loops are one of the most iconic, recognizable cereals ever created. Everything about them just oozes style, from the logo to the box art, to Toucan Sam, the quintessential mascot. Thankfully, this cereal's greatness goes beyond the box. First of all, the smell. It's just incredible, and lets you know that you're going to have a good breakfast, before you even take a spoonful. The fruity flavor is great, and the loops themselves have a glorious crunch to them, one that has not been successfully replicated in any other cereal. However, in modern day, Froot Loops have fallen on evil days. In an effort to become more "consumer friendly," Kellogg's has massacred Toucan Sam's iconic design, and like Babylon, this gilded cereal has lost it's gold, revealing it's true colors. Alas, without the old Toucan Sam, Froot Loops are a shell of their former glory, and it has been truly saddening to see this cereal's fall from grace. Also, the loops themselves are a tad too big for my liking, and sometimes scrape the roof of my mouth. They still taste good, though.
- Trix: Trix cereal is great. It has the very simple yet common ball shape and the flavor of a fruity pebble. Where it lacks however is compared to other trix breakfast items like their yogurt which is just better in most ways.
- Raisin Bran Crunch: Like regular Raisin Bran, Raisin Bran Crunch gets slept on by many. However, I can see why people would criticize this particular iteration of Raisin Raisin Bran is somehow bad. This of course, Bran over the original. The main gimmick of this cereal, the thing that adds the "crunch," is a cluster of what I assume are oats, and there's a ton of them in each box. The ratio of raisins to oats is like 3:2, so there's a good amount of them. These oat balls don't really taste like anything, they're just there to add a crunch, so I can see why people don't like this.  - Franken Berry: Franken Berry is one of the three "monster cereals" from General Mills, sold during the Halloween season. The only real difference between the trio of cereals are their flavoring. Franken Berry happens to be the strawberry flavor, although I'm not completely sure how the flavor of strawberry translates to Frankenstein's monster, who is typically green, but I guess nobody would want to eat mint flavored cereal. In terms of taste, it's pretty

much just strawberry Lucky Charms. I happen to like strawberry flavored stuff, so for me, this is better than Lucky Charms, which is already a pretty good cereal, if a little flavorless.

- Cap'n Crunch Berries: Cap'n Crunch Berries is a prime cereal creation led to a lack of innovation when it example of just right. It has both the original Cap'n Crunch cereal and the berries in a nice equilibrium, which is why it outclasses the original and Oops All Berries.

A Tier

- Cap'n Crunch: I've never actually had Cap'n Crunch in cereal form, but one time, I went to a 7/11, and I got a Cap'n Crunch flavored slurpee, and it was pretty good. Also, pretty much everyone else, including my cowriter, Jacob, said it was good, so I trust them.
- Cheerios: Cheerios are a classic cereal and are nice and simple. However, they are outclassed by Honey Nut Cheerios due to their simple flavor. Despite this, they are still a fantastic choice.
- Lucky Charm: Lucky Charms is a very popular and iconic cereal, and is especially popular with young children due to the copious amounts of sugar it contains. However, the older I get, the less I like Lucky Charms. The regular oat things are pretty bland and flavorless, almost like a plain Cheerio in a bunch of weird shapes. The marshmallows themselves, while good, have a strange texture, where it feels like they never get fully soaked in the milk. They seem to scrape against your teeth when they're dry, have an outer layer oats are just too much for the simplistic nature of of slimy goop when they've been partially soaked in milk, and completely disintegrate once they soak in milk - Special K: In a way, Special K is similar to Lucky for a while. Both Cocoa and Fruity Pebbles are made similarly to Rice Krispies cereal, utilizing rice as the main ingredient. I've always believed that rice cereal is just inherently less popular than corn or oat or wheat cereal, and that none of the largest brands of rice cereal ever really reached the popularity of something

like Cheerios or Corn Flakes. This doesn't make rice cereal terrible. In fact, I think a lot of rice cereals are great, but the lack of popularity with some of these brands compared to other conventional methods of comes to rice cereal. This is why the largest of the rice cereal brands, Pebbles and Rice Krispies, are nearly identical in all forms except flavoring. Cocoa Pebbles, are obliviously the chocolate flavor of this base rice cereal template, and while good, they just miss the mark in terms of taste when compared to its counterparts within the genre. Chocolate itself, in my opinion, is hard to make work in cereal, although many brands have done it successfully, and is even harder to make work in rice cereal. Cocoa Pebbles are so light and airy that it is hard for the chocolate flavor to really stick. This changes after a while, when Cookie Crisps. - Honey Bunches of Oats: Honey Bunches of Oats are a prime example of too much in a cereal. The Cheerios. - is a great cereal and for many people a favorite. However where it falls off is durability. When you pour a bowl of Cinnamon Toast Crunch unless you eat quickly it will soon turn to mush and nobody wants to eat that.

French Toast Crunch: I don't think I've ever had French Toast Crunch before, but I've eaten French toast, and I've eaten regular Cinnamon Toast Crunch, so I can at least infer. The issue with this cereal is probably the same as Cinnamon Toast Crunch in that it's a bit too sweet, and it tastes terrible when its soggy. Also, isn't French toast just toast with cinnamon on it that's made with eggs? Because then having two different cereals that are basically the same thing feels a bit unnecessary.

- Krave: Krave is similar to Honey Bunches Of Oats in that it is a cereal that simply too much going on. The chocolate inside just overtakes the outer shell and it becomes a very basic flavor.

- Boo Berry: The last of the trio of monster cereals, Boo Berry is just worse than Count Chocula and Franken Berry. - Wheaties Wheaties are a cereal that are similar to corn flakes, but not as good. There's nothing

- Cap'n Crunch Oops All Berries: This cereal is just atrocious. They took out all the regular cereal bits from regular Cap'n Crunch, and kept all the berries. It's a cereal full of only the berries. At that point, just eat Trix! It's like if Raisin Bran or Special K were only raisins and strawberries, respectively. It scares me. It scares me how a company could do this to such a beloved cereal. It appalls me how Quaker Oats could turn the lovable Cap'n and his classic cereal brand into such a twisted amalgamation of what once was, disfigured beyond recognization. The fact that stores still carry this sorry excuse for a product is beyond me. And we, the consumers, are also at fault. We allowed this evil and corruption to enter our homes, and enter our stomachs. We appeased Quaker Oats, saying to ourselves, "They couldn't possibly mess up that bad." But they did. They
