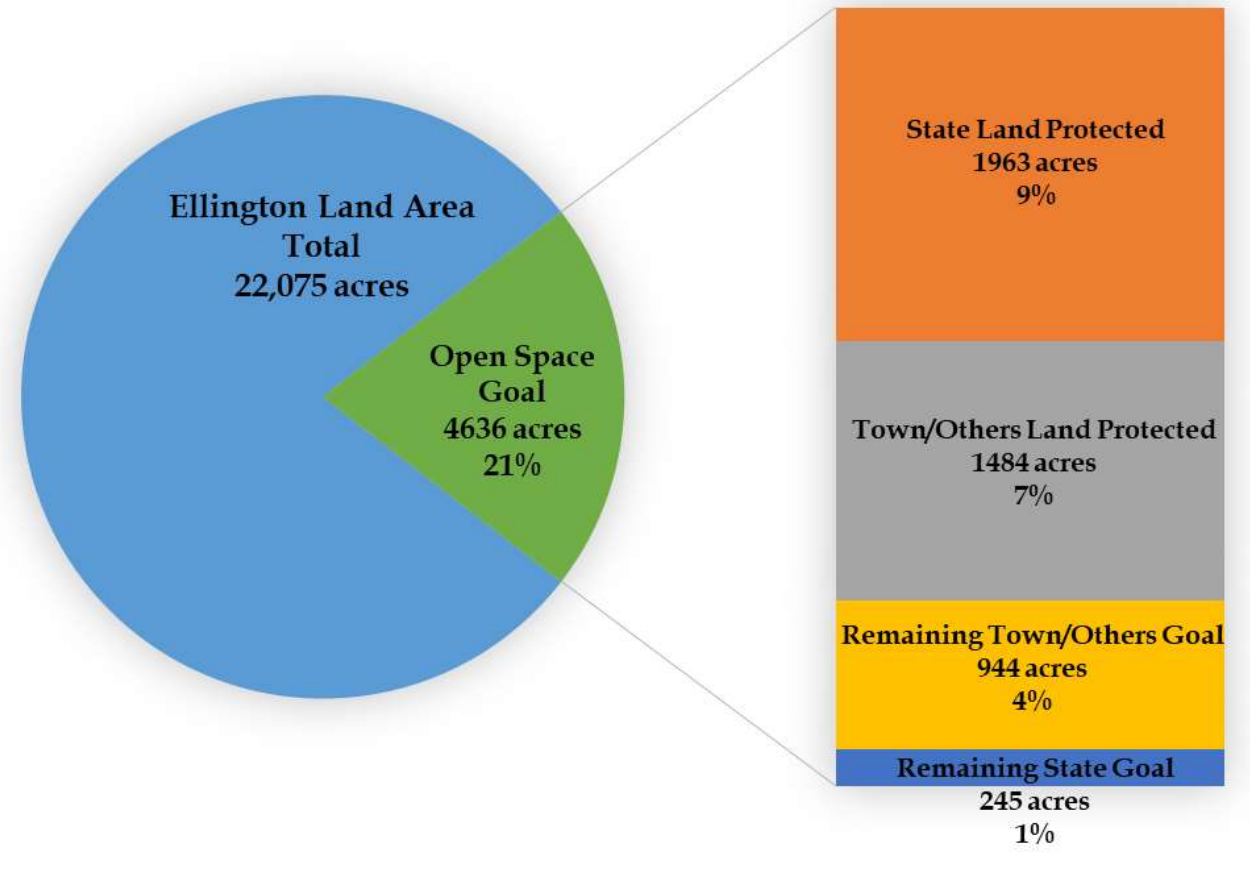

EXISTING OPEN SPACE: 3,447 ACRES OR 16% AS OF OCTOBER 2022

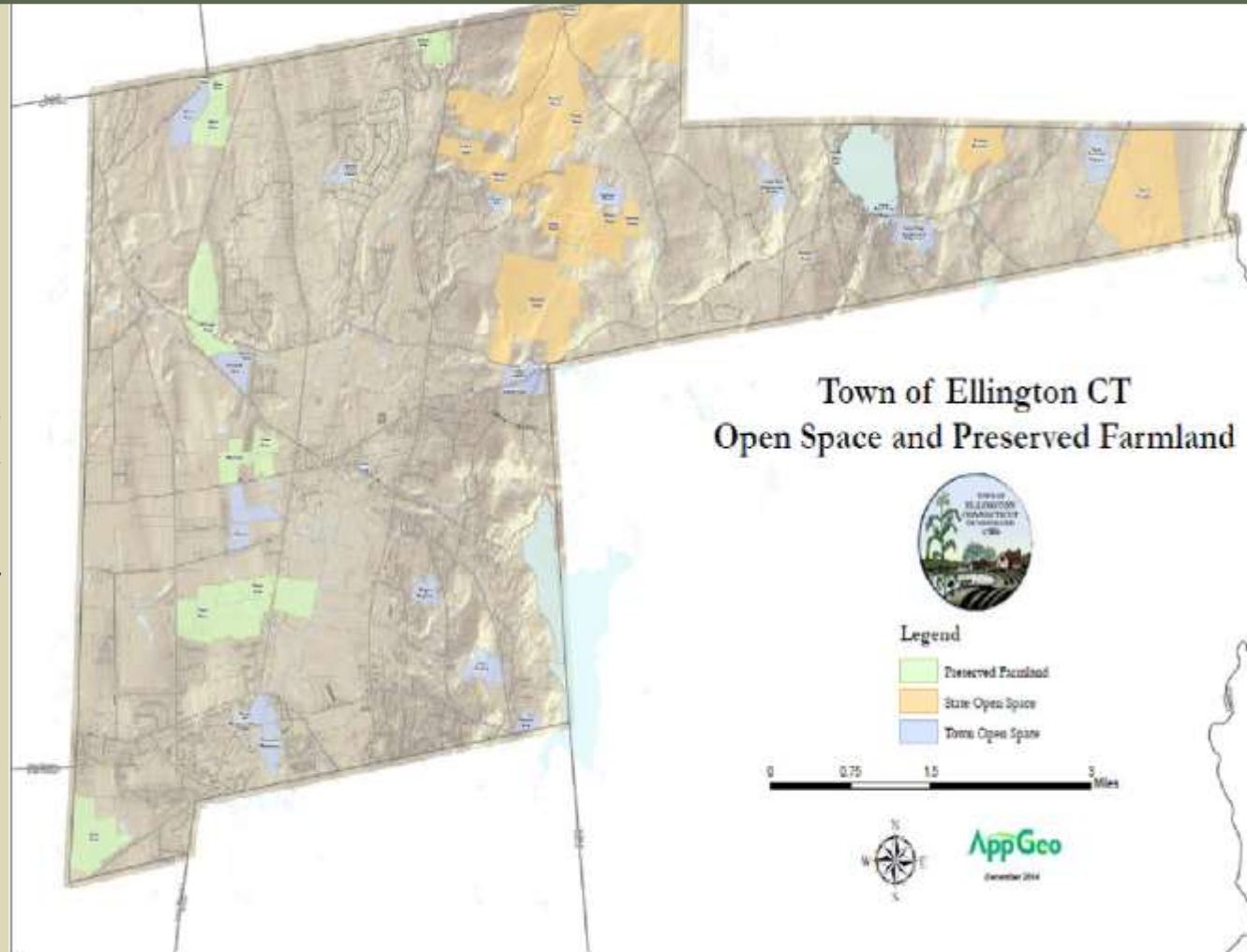
STATE OF CONNECTICUT GOAL FOR OPEN SPACE: 21% BY 2023

Why Conserve?

Open space provides many benefits for Connecticut's citizens. Pleasant views help to preserve community character. Forested areas reduce pollution by filtering the air and water. Protected areas provide opportunities for passive recreation and provide habitat for wildlife. Open space acts as a balance against the negative aspects of development.

Impact

According to the Cost of Community Services study from March 2018, for every \$1 in tax revenue for residentially developed land it costs \$1.13 in services but for open space land only \$0.27.
