# Record-Setting Sleep Out Raises \$23k for Covenant House

# Friday Night Lights shine bright on Saint Joe's campus



# Dr. Gomez's Congris Rice Recipe

-It's done when the rice is soft; if not, add a little more water, spray the rice, and leave it a few more minutes. Then, it is ready to eat.

When the band name "The Beach Boys" comes to mind, one might think of sunshine, beaches, and happiness displayed by several teenage voiced harmonies as a cliche melody plays in the background. Though this was the repetitive sound of the Beach Boys on their initial releases, 1964 would mark the end of sunshine and happiness for Beach Boy Brian Wilson.

On a plane trip during a 1964 tour, Brian would encounter a terrible panic attack, which was a result of years of stage fright and stress from tours. It was a dark time for Wilson that was plagued by pressure from the media, critics, and even his own father, who urged him to be perfect. Despite his personal issues, like a clam, he produced a pearl from the pressure: the Beach Boys' 1966 release, *Pet Sounds*.

Straight after the panic attack, Brian made the life changing decision to return to the studio and express his pain in the language of music. Initially inspired by the impact of the Beatles' 1965 release

Rubber Soul, Wilson knew that he needed to birth the American Equivalent of the British scene-changer, and that is just what he did. Studio-Ridden for hours on end, Wilson collaborated with Tony Asher in order to come album up with an that consisted of no "filler songs;" he wanted a narrative and an album that had a meaning and purpose.

The writing itself took roughly two to three weeks at

Wilson's home; then, Wilson would stay in the studio for hours trying to get the perfect sound out

As a whole, these reflect the sudden detour that Brian Wilson took from the cliche So-Cal sound that the band had been known for. He is famously noted for urging his musicians to get "emotion" out of their instruments, even making it seem like the instruments were "crying." The result was a perfect reflection of his dissolving emotional state due to years of abuse and grueling touring.

Though the album consists of poppy headliner songs such as "Sloop John B" and "Wouldn't it Be Nice," several songs sound like Brian Wilson breaking down in the language of music. For example, "Caroline, No" displays a love tragedy, punctuated by emotional instruments and Brian's mellow voice.

Arguably the most emotion altering song on the

album is "I Just Wasn't Made For These Times," which is about someone who struggles to fit into society or be perfect, which can be connected to Brian's life both in the outside world in at home, especially with his abusive father who pushed him and his brothers to be pitch perfect, quite literally. Every song on the album tells a story of Brian's troubled life.

Pet Sounds is deemed a

masterpiece; most notably Beatle Paul McCartney claims that "God Only Knows" off of the album is his favorite song, even influencing The Beatles' 1966 Revolver release, "Here There and Everywhere." According to Rolling Stone's "Top 500 Albums of All Time," the only album ahead of Pet Sounds is actually an album that was inspired by the album: The Beatles' Sgt. Pepper's Lonely Hearts Club Band. Nevertheless, the utter complexity and heart wrenching story of Pet Sounds puts a different perspective on that time period of the Beach Boys, forcing every listener to realize that the Beach Boys are much more than their name suggests.



of his session musicians. The songs are notably complex, so from a musician's standpoint, they are brilliant, to say the least.

The part that gets the majority of listeners moved musically is the sudden sharp "right turns" in the middle of songs. They aren't a key change or a time signature or tempo change as the 5th Dimension did in "Age of Aquarius / Let the Sunshine in" for reference. Wilson's choices suit the songs as a whole thematically, and he made each sharp right turn feel like a majestic right drift on a magic carpet.


## **Introducing New Partners: Part 1**


