Reading at Glazer Academy

Reading is one of the most fundamental skills a child needs to learn to succeed in life. Developing good reading habits is vital to your child's future not just academically, but in everyday life as well.

Reading develops vocabulary: The more your child reads, the more new words will find their way into her/his vocabulary. Students who scored 90% better than their peers on reading tests, read for more than 20 minutes a day – exposing them to 1.8 million words a year.

Students who scored at fifty percentile, read on average only 4.6 minutes a day – exposing them to 282,000 words per year.

The reding program at Glazer is called Success for All or SFA. Our program is researched based and evidence based and can support strong reading achievement! In order to support its success this is what we need from students and families!

Scholars are required to:

- * Read 20 minutes a day
- * Complete Read and Response forms daily.
- * Turn in their completed forms to their SFA teachers every Friday.

When is too Sick for School?

Keep students home if they: Have a temp above 100. Return 24 hrs after clear Are throwing up or have diarrhea. Return 24 hrs after clear Eyes are pink and crusty. Return after Dr. visit Have a runny nose or sniffles not related to allergies relieved by allergy medicine with no other symptoms and not getting better after a few days. A slight cough with no other symptoms not getting better after a few days with cough medicine.

Remember our goal is to reduce our chronic absenteeism by 15% from 45% to 30% and to increase our average daily attendance from 86% to 96%!

Emergency Contact Forms

Emergency contact Forms went home this week. Please ensure that we get the form back completed. Remind parents of the importance of having this form. Also, if you become aware of custody situations the school must have all documentation. IT IS EXTREMELY IMPORTANT THAT WE HAVE THIS FORM!

Students who arrive late and leave early from school miss out on key learning opportunities such as, morning announcements, academic activities, tests and quizzes, and social interactions with peers.

Chronically tardy students are more likely to accept that absence altogether is tolerated, often leading to chronic absenteeism. This not only reflects poorly on the students and the school, but can affect their peers as well. Research has found that not only do students who are chronically tardy perform worse on their test scores, but so do their more prompt peers. The less time students spend in the classroom means the less they can contribute; often leading to class being disrupted, placing group and class projects on hold, and making less significant peer connections.
