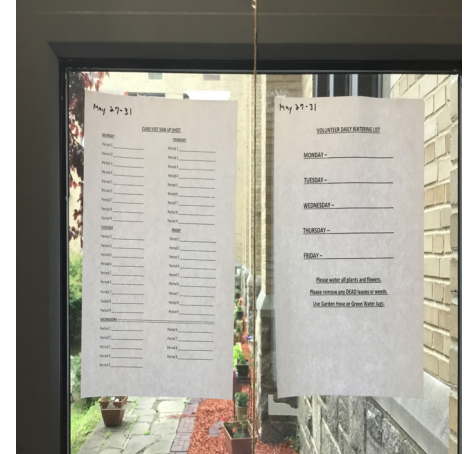

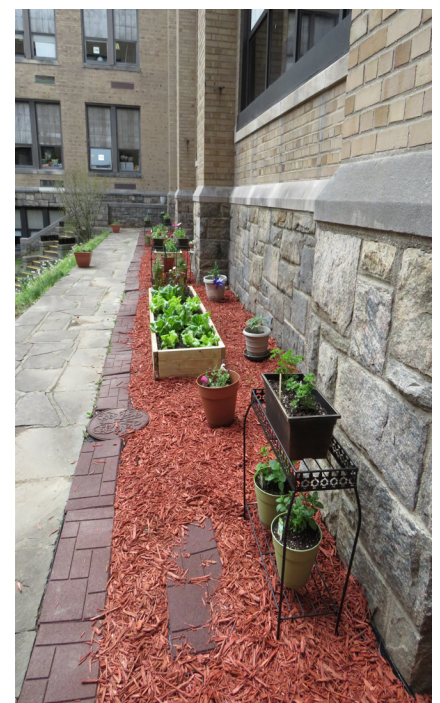

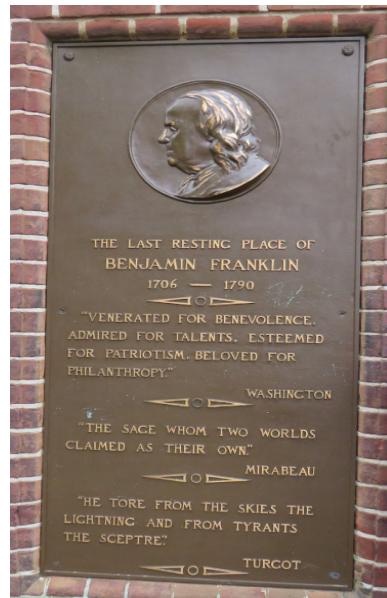

THE EQUALITY ACT

In twenty-eight states in this country, it is legal for someone to be fired on the basis of sexual orientation. In thirty states in this country, it is legal for someone to be fired on the basis of gender identity. Most transgender persons are not allowed to serve in the military due to gender identity. This is wrong. This is not what America stands for. A new bill called "The Equality Act" would provide non-discrimination protections for those of the LGBTQ+ community in areas such as employment, housing, education, etc. This act would amend the Fair Housing Act, the Equal Credit Opportunity Act, and most notably the Civil Rights Act of 1964. This act would be a huge step forward for the United States and seems reasonable to think that lawmakers would unanimously agree that we must put this into effect. However, there are some representatives who find this act too dangerous and superfluous.

The Equality Act would prohibit anyone of the LGBTQ+ community to be denied service based on their sexual orientation or gender identity. This means that incidents like a pediatrician refusing to treat Krista and Jaime Contreras' daughter will not happen again. In 2015, Krista and Jaime Contreras were given a different pediatrician than the one they had requested for their infant daughter because they are a lesbian couple. When this incident was brought up in a hearing, Rep. Ken Buck (R-CO) had compared LGBTQ people to Nazis stating, "Is it your position that an Orthodox Jewish doctor whose grandparent was killed in the Holocaust should be required to work with a Nazi patient?" While this example question was wildly inappropriate and irrelevant, it brings up the issue that many may have with offering service to those in the LGBTQ+ community. The solution to that should simply be if someone is not willing to have their service open to everyone, they should find a different profession.

EQUAL PAY FOR EQUAL EFFORT

This year the WNBA salary is close to 75,000 dollars, and the maximum veteran salary is around 115,000 dollars. This year for the NBA season, the minimum salary of an NBA player is around \$800,000. This is a huge gap between the NBA and WNBA salaries. Yes, the NBA has been around for a long period of time, but because the WNBA is so young it should be more advanced, and the WNBA season should be extended and give WNBA players close to the same amount of money that the NBA players get paid. Elena Della Donne stated, "sexism is in the workforce, as well. There isn't even equal pay, so its not just in sports it's everywhere. The 2018 World Cup ended about a year ago, and was filled with surprises. Next the 2022 World Cup will be held in Qatar. This had been decided in 2010. Ever since Qatar was chosen to host the 2022 World Cup, they have been working hard to create an event the world will never forget, but how they're doing it is horrific. Qatar is a rather unfavorable place for the world's most celebrated soccer tournament. Qatar's summertime temperatures often soar into the triple-digits, which led FIFA move the tournament's kickoff to late November. In preparation for the World Cup the country had created the world-class soccer infrastructure that the tournament demands. However, to meet the tournament's demands, modern slavery takes place. Qatar's labor practices use a system meant to monitor and manage migrant workers, who come to places like Qatar from poorer nations. To find work in Qatar, migrants must first find an employer to sponsor them, to whom they are subsequently bound. In addition, Qatar's exit visa system states that migrants cannot leave Qatar without their passports and paperwork, both of which their sponsors control. This means that even under harsh conditions, the workers cannot leave Qatar's borders. These horrific labor practices though have existed way before the men's World Cup. This tournament has brought attention to this important issue. While what's being built in Qatar for the largest soccer tournament is breathtakingly beautiful, the poor are paying for the risks taken for it.

THE 2020 CENSUS

The United States conducts a census to count the population every 10 years. The Trump administration proposed to add a new question pertaining to citizenship to the 2020 census. In today's political climate, immigration is a topic of concern. The new census question poses a very serious problem, and America might suffer a great deal.

The purpose of a census is to count every person. It is used to determine the spending toward a given place based on recorded population. It also determines the number of representatives for each state. The United States census asks for the relationship status, age, race, and sex of all members of each household. The upcoming census may bring back a question of citizenship. This question was

last widely used in 1950. People who are not citizens will likely opt out. There is concern that legal immigrants will not complete the census, and they will go unrecorded. A potential outcome is that diverse cities, such as New York City, might receive a low count due to its high number of immigrants. This would, of course, be disastrous for both the economy and the wellbeing of residents. Then New York City will receive less funding for housing, transportation, police and fire departments, and schools. Diverse and populous states would have fewer seats in the House of Representatives. Every other city in the country would be impacted, including White Plains. The Supreme Court is currently reviewing the question to determine whether it will be added.

This question must not be reintroduced to the census or else countless people will suffer.

THE OPIOID CRISIS

Each day, more than 130 people in the United States die as a result of opioid-related overdoses.¹ The opioid crisis began in the late 1990s when opioids were prescribed more often. The sudden increase in availability resulted in increasing misuse. The misuse led to addiction. Pharmaceutical companies assured doctors that people would not get addicted to opioid pain relievers. When doctors heard that their patients felt pain, they prescribed opioids.²

The Rochester Drug Cooperative, a large drug distributor, was criminally charged by the federal government and settled for \$20 million in April 2019. The company was responsible for the illegal distribution of opioids. This is not unique to New York – all but two states are now suing large companies involved in the opioid crisis. There are hundreds of opioid distributors and manufacturers charged with deception and false marketing.

Insys is a company which produces opioids. The manufacturer agreed to pay \$255 million to settle national charges of fraud. Insys sold fentanyl, an opioid 100 times stronger than morphine³,

to doctors. One such doctor wrote 672 prescriptions and in return was paid \$44,000 from the company.⁴ Insys was approved for marketing fentanyl to cancer patients. Doctors were persuaded to expand beyond cancer patients, with incentives.⁴

This past summer, I had surgery on my leg. I was prescribed OxyContin for the pain. I didn't use it, and we returned it to the pharmacy. I was surprised that something this strong was prescribed to me. I understand that some people may need it, but many may be getting prescriptions unnecessarily and are being put at risk for addiction.

1. Devel Sixteen (300-360 mph)

The Devel Sixteen is a Hypercar from the city of cars, Dubai. The engine supposedly produces 5,007 horsepower, granting it a top speed of above 340 miles per hour! Not much is known about this car. Almost all of its claims have not been proved. Let's hope their claims are true!

2. Hennessey Venom F5 (300-318 mph)

The rival to this car is the upcoming Hennessey Venom F5. It is powered by a 7.0-liter twin-turbocharged V8 engine, and is the successor to the SSC Ultimate Aero.

4. Bugatti Chiron (261-288 mph)

This amazing hypercar, by the legendary company, the Bugatti Chiron can reach speeds of 288 mph, but the tires can only reach 261 mph. Their engine Until Michelin comes up with a better tire, only then, it can withstand higher speeds.

5. Koenigsegg Agera RS (278 mph)

The Agera RS, the only tested car for the highest top speed on this list can reach speeds of 278 miles per hour! It's record-breaking engine produces 1,360 horsepower with the IMW upgrade. The successor to this car is the Koenigsegg Jesko.

6. Hennessey Venom GT (270 mph)

I don't think I need an intro for this one. Everybody knows this insane car, which beat the SSC Ultimate Aero TT back in 2010. The car with its 1,200 horsepower and 6,400 rpm, can achieve a top speed of 268 miles per hour!

8. 2020 Rimac C2 (256 mph)

The Rimac Concept 2 is an insane car from Croatia which creates 1,914 horsepower, a top speed of 256 miles per hour, and a 0-60 mph is a mind-blowing 1.85 seconds! This is my favorite supercar, and I also think, arguably, it is the best overall supercar in the world.

9. 2006 SSC Ultimate Aero TT (256)

The SSC Ultimate Aero TT is an American Supercar which took the record of top speed of the Bugatti Veyron. It was produced in 2006 and it is capable of 1,300 horsepower and can achieve speeds of up to 256 miles per hour.
