MESSAGE FROM ADMINISTRATION

We are very excited to let you know about a renovation project taking place over the next two years. As always, student safety and the well-being of those in our building is our priority and we are pleased that we will be able to use a combination of ESSR and local Facilities funds to improve air quality and humidification levels for the top two floors of the school building and the cafeteria.

This is a major undertaking with the work being completed in five phases over the course of two years beginning on January 2nd, 2023. In addition to the HVAC upgrade, which will provide us with air filters with a MERV rating of 13, we will also be upgrading our lighting and adding building-wide sprinklers for fire suppression. Vermont is the first state to prohibit tube fluorescent lights (2024) so in an effort to get ahead of that change and take advantage of the HVAC upgrade, we are doing lighting at the same time. *Spaulding* had been grandfathered in for a sprinkler system, but by taking advantage of this planned renovation, we can make sure that our building is completely covered.

Hearing all of this, the next question you're probably asking is about how this is going to impact your student's education, and your family. The school calendar will be slightly modified to accommodate the shifting of classrooms as the different phases begin.

The initial calendar change families should be aware of is moving graduation from June 24th to June 17th, with June 20th as the last possible student day for underclassmen. An updated school calendar is available to help you with planning. Keeping safety in mind, all of the areas where work is being completed during the school day will be cordoned off from students. Temporary walls and doors will be constructed for the various crew members to have access to the building without having contact with our students.

We know that this is a lot to process, and that you probably have many more questions. Please refer to this <u>FAQ sheet</u> which will be updated as more questions/information occur(s). We are really excited about this opportunity to make our school a safer and healthier place to learn.
