MESSAGE FROM THE HEAD



Dear Parents, Guardians and Grandparents,

Your children and their teachers have stoically pressed on through the past week despite some pretty depressing weather and it has been great to read through this newsletter and see so many smiling faces still. I think our Exeat this afternoon is well-timed and I hope that everyone can enjoy an extra lie in tomorrow!

Yesterday I was pleased to gather Millfield Prep together for a Celebration Assembly and I was delighted that there was such a breadth of areas to congratulate pupils on. In particular, there has been some exceptional work happening across the year groups and I was pleased to see a mention of the Year 5 and 6 Logo Competition which came off the back of the Creativity Workshops which happened earlier in the term – there were some fantastic entries.

This week has been National Anti-Bullying Week and in Monday's assembly, I gave the children a few areas to focus on, both this week and beyond. I thought it would be helpful for you to know what these points were, so that you can support them at home. We talked about children being able to 'reach out' (the main theme of this year's Anti-Bullying Week) whether that be to ask for help if there is something troubling them or in offering support to someone whom they notice is the victim of unkindness or bullying. I talked about being an upstander rather than a bystander, being someone who calls out unkindness if they witness it. Finally, I talked about one of our most important school values: Be Kind.

Linked to that value of kindness, I thought I would share with you a message I received yesterday. Amongst the many sporting successes in the newsletter this week, you will notice a section about our U11 boys and U13 boys and girls being crowned Somerset Table Tennis Champions. When she returned from the U13 tournament, Miss Velasco sought me out to tell me something far more important than their victories.

During the competition a boy from Taunton School, the hosts, had been allowed to play in spite of the fact that he was about to undergo a significantly dangerous 24-hour surgery on a clot in his brain the following day. He was wearing a protective covering on his head because he had already had some of his skull removed in preparation for the operation. His doctors had allowed him to play as they knew table tennis was his major passion. There were many spectators cheering him on, including his parents, and naturally emotions were running extremely high. Two of our pupils, Max and Xavier, played against him and each did so with huge empathy and compassion.

While I'll never presume that MPS is a perfect school, stories like this highlight that we are certainly on the right track here. It was a lovely message to receive as a Head and sent me to Exeat with a spring in my step, as I hope it will you too.




SCIENCE QUIZ




PAINTING ANIMALS














KS1 TRIP TO FLEET AIM ARM MUSEUM


