Last Wednesday evening, Ms. Maharana, Supervisor of Mathematics Instruction and Mr. Howard, Supervisor of Professional Development, hosted a Parent University Workshop at Sayreville War Memorial High School (SWMHS) entitled Math Tracks and Curriculum Information. As they explained during the workshop, due to the pandemic, there has been a sharp decline in math scores as evidenced from multiple data points released at the district, state, and the national level. According to Thomas Kane, a professor and a faculty director of the Center for Education Policy Research at Harvard, which co-led this research, educators and parents think students are 95% recovered from the pandemic, yet the average learning loss, particularly in math is half a year. That's a critical message for parents to hear because surveys indicate most parents believe that students have already made up nearly all of what they hadn't learned. Thus, through this Parent University Workshop, Ms. Maharana and Mr. Howard, who will be holding another session soon, informed

parents of the current research and what the they can do to assist their children's teachers in accelerating their progress and catching them up.

If you did not have a chance to attend the Board of Education (BOE) Business Meeting held on Tuesday, November 15<sup>th</sup>, here is what you missed. Gianna Pesci from Sayreville War Memorial (SWMHS) and Morgan Koonce from the Sayreville Middle School (SMS) began the meeting by providing their respective Student Council Representative to the Board of Education Reports. Next,



Mr. Esposito expressed his opening remarks, as did Mr. Walsh, who also shared a few district highlights.

The Board then moved the action items from the Superintendent's Report onto the Board Agenda and approved them all. To see the Agenda, click <a href="here">here</a>. Among other motions, on the Vision 2030 Finance and Infrastructure portion of the agenda, the BOE approved a resolution determining the form and other details regarding the issuance of the \$97,474,000 in referendum school bonds. It also approved generous donations of 20 My Classroom Poems for Young Children books authored by former Wilson School teacher Michele Killian in the amount of \$319.60 from Meghan and Tayler Miller; a baby grand piano valued at \$4,000 from John Wrubel; trauma kit equipment valued at \$1,005.20 from the Sayreville Police Benevolent Association; and a lamp for the Bombers Beyond 18-21-Year-Old program valued at \$250 from Lucille Bloom. Lastly, the BOE approved the submission of the Division of Early Childhood Services, Annual Preschool Operational Plan Update and projected School Enrollment for the 2023-2024 school year.

On the Student Achievement portion of the agenda, among other motions, the BOE approved of SWMHS to hold a delayed opening on May 23-26, 2023 for NJSLA and NJSLAS testing. Therefore, on May 23<sup>rd</sup> through the 26<sup>th</sup>, students in grades 10 and 12 will have a delayed opening starting at 9:40 am. Since students in grades 9 and 11 will be testing, they will arrive at the normal time of 7:30 am. In addition, the Board approved a new Advanced Placement Pre-Calculus course for the 2023-2024 school year at SWMHS. Lastly, it approved a new Operation Smile Club with Darci Santella as the advisor, and a new Hindu Society Club with Jyothsna Kuchibhatla as the advisor, at SWMHS.

Likewise, on the Governance portion of the agenda, the Board of Education approved <u>BOE Policy 2425</u>

<u>Emergency Virtual or Remote Instruction</u> and <u>Regulation 2425 – Emergency Virtual or Remote</u>

<u>Instruction Program</u>; and <u>Policy 5512 – Harassment, Intimidation, or Bullying</u> for a Second Reading



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and Adoption. Click on each to read them. It also approved a revision to the 2022-23 School District Calendar, which essentially changes the early dismissal days for Parent/Teacher Conferences from the week of January 30, 2023 to January 17-20, 2023; and makes June 6, 2023 a holiday for students and a full day in-service for staff. Click <a href="here">here</a> to see it. Finally, the BOE approved the 2022 School Safety and Security Plan Review Statement of Assurance.

On the Personnel portion of the agenda, as well as other motions, the Board of Education accepted the retirements of Jeanine Caccio, Art Teacher at the Arleth School, and Mary Cinalli, Language Arts Literacy Teacher at the Sayreville Middle School (SMS), effective July 1, 2023. It also appointed new certificated and non-certificated staff for the 2022-23 school year. Likewise, the Board approved the transfer of certificated and non-certificated staff for the 2022-23 school year. In addition, the BOE also appointed personnel for Tier 3 Tutoring, Career and Technical Education Coordination, and for the Unified Sports Summer Track and Field Season. Furthermore, it named the 2022-23 Anti Bullying Specialists at each school, as well as the Coordinator for the 2022-23 school year; and approved of paid Cooperative Education students to work in the Bombers Beyond Café during the 2022-2023 school year. Finally, the Board retroactively approved the adjusted salaries of Sayreville Education Association (SEA) certificated and non-certificated staff for the 2021-22 school year in accordance with the 2021-2026 Collective Bargaining Agreement between the Sayreville BOE and SEA.

During the Board Discussion portion of the meeting, Mr. Fernandez reviewed what was discussed during the last Finance and Infrastructure Committee Meeting, as did Mr. Walsh for the last Personnel Committee Meeting. Mrs. Bloom shared news from the Middlesex County School Boards Association and Mr. Fernandez did the same with regard to the Sayreville/South Amboy Rotary Club.

During the Open Public Comment portion of the meeting, a community member made several inquiries about the issuance of bonds for the Facilities Improvement Referendum, which was approved by voters in Sayreville on October 6, 2022..

The next meeting will take place on **December 20, 2022**. During the meeting the district will present the 2023-24 Food Services Budget. The agenda for this meeting will be posted on the district website on **Friday, December 16**<sup>th</sup>. A complete copy of the **November 15**<sup>th</sup> meeting minutes will be posted on the BOE Meeting Minutes page of the website once they are approved by the BOE during the next regular business meeting on **December 20, 2022**.
