## SHAPE MD names Margolis Elementary PE Teacher of the Year

A recent afternoon at Walter J. Mitchell Elementary School found third graders in an intense game of battleship as their physical education teacher, Marty Margolis, observed — and at times joined in. Rather than focusing on the game board, two teams set up on either side of a barrier made of mats.

Then they let loose a barrage of dodge balls in hopes of toppling the five oversized bowling pins (still draped in ghost costumes from Halloween) strategically placed on the other side.

When a student needed to catch a glimpse of the other side's ship placement, they ran to a safe zone where they had a second or two to gauge coordinates by peering through an oversized pair of binoculars made up of two hula hoops.

Laughter, cheers and groans of defeat pinged off the gym's walls — it was chaotic in the most fun way. And keeping with the third-grade physical education curriculum it was designed to improve the overhand throwing abilities of the students.

Margolis has spent his entire 26-year teaching career at Mitchell, all as the PE teacher. He was recently honored by the

Society of Health and Physical Educators of Maryland (SHAPE MD) as its Elementary School Physical Education Teacher of the Year. SHAPE MD is an organization that provides advocacy, resources and professional learning opportunities for current and future health and physical educators who teach students in prekindergarten through 12th grade.

"Elementary age kids are so motivated to give it their all," Margolis said. "They love being active and it doesn't take much to get them interested in something. It's my job to help them to be able to get better at what they're learning. I meet them at their confidence level and skill level, and we build on those."

"Mr. Margolis is beloved at Mitchell Elementary," Matt Golonka, content specialist for health and physical education for Charles County Public Schools (CCPS), said. "He has proven that he is the best at what he does. He has impacted the lives of his students for over 25 years in his own hometown."

### In Memoriam Maureen "Deen" Stewart

Maureen "Deen" Stewart, a Spanish teacher at North Point High School, passed away Nov. 10, 2022.

With more than 30 years of experience as a teacher, she taught thousands of Charles County Public Schools (CCPS) graduates. As a sponsor for North Point's *It's Academic* and SkillsUSA Quiz Bowl teams, she has influenced many more. Among them is Moriah Rochlinski-Evans, a former student who became Stewart's colleague when Rochlinski-Evans began teaching Spanish at North Point six years ago. They also cosponsored the *It's Academic* and Quiz Bowl teams.

"She was a truly involved member of our school community, cared deeply for our students and staff, and

was the type of person who would check on you anytime she heard someone needed help," Rochlinski-Evans said. "She was dedicated to Spanish teaching, and would speak Spanglish to any person she met, even if they spoke no Spanish at all."

Students in Stewart's classes not only learned Spanish, but about life, Robin Burns, cyber security and computer science teacher, said.

Stewart was one of the first friends Burns made at North Point

and they hit up Taco Tuesdays at Mexico Restaurant in La Plata, watched football on Sundays and recently became roommates. "She was a master of sarcasm and wit, and would crush anyone in a game of Scrabble," Burns said.

Maria Vargas-Garcia, the world language chair at North Point, remembered Stewart for her sense of humor and kindness. "Her sense of humor was so sharp," Vargas-Garcia said. "Her kindness was so big. She helped so many people from our community that we don't even know. She was always doing something — something good, something amazing."

In 2021, Stewart was one of five CCPS teachers to

earn the Global Seal of Biliteracy, a recognition given to students and educators who have studied and attained proficiency in two or more languages. In college Stewart took part in a student trip to Mexico, launching a love for the Spanish language. "It was the beginning of a beautiful thing," she said in a 2021 interview.

Stewart is survived by her daughter, Lauren Duque and her partner, Dom Samoraj; her son, Stewart Duque and his wife, Janice; four grandchildren; nine siblings; nieces and nephews; and family and friends.

### In Memoriam Brian Wells

Brian Wells, a computer science and Project Lead the Way (PLTW) engineering teacher at Westlake High School, passed away Nov. 12, 2022, following a battle with sudden acute pancreatitis.

At Westlake, Wells was well-known beyond the classroom with many calling him "Coach."

Wells coached the golf teams and track and field.

He was involved in activities like robotics, the Mathematics, Engineering and Science, Achievement (MESA) team, was coach of the chess team, sponsored the National Technical Honor Society and was a mentor for the Elite Black Men.

Wells was among other male Westlake staff members personally selected by students to sponsor the Elite Black Men group. Students chose sponsors they admire and who possess the character traits they wish to emulate.

"This is a devastating loss for our school community," Westlake Principal Diane Roberts said. "His presence brought love and light to Westlake. Mr. Wells's superpower was the ability to provide a safe space for students where they could feel a sense of belonging."

Wells was Westlake's nominee for Charles County Public

Schools (CCPS) Teacher of the Year Award in 2020.

He was named a SMECO Outstanding Teacher in STEM in 2022.

Outside of school, Wells enjoyed spending time with his sons, traveling, camping, playing sports and building Legos. Wells also loved the family dogs.

"Brian Wells was the fixer of all things broken, morning DJ for the Tech Ed hall and a gentle giant, a teddy bear," Beth Shook, instruction specialist for special education, said. "He never said 'No' to anything he was

asked to do and was always the first one to lend a hand. Wells had a way of making everyone — staff, students and parents feel welcomed and part of the family. He was one of a kind."

Wells is survived by his wife, Joana; sons, Bryan and Zachary; parents, Ronnie and Kathy Wells; brothers, Phillip and Paul; and nieces and nephews.
