2020-2021 School Year Recap

Here's to another school year in the books! From academics to extracurriculars to sports, Port Angeles School District (PASD) has successfully navigated a year of obstacles. Optimistically, the district is returning in 2021-22 with a semblance of years past. We couldn't have done this without YOU. Your dedication to keeping transmission rates low in Clallam County and providing community support was key to our success. Thank you. If there is one thing we learned this past year, it's that our community, staff, parents, and students are capable of incredible feats.

This year, staff and teachers went above and beyond, exploring creative ways to connect and stay engaged with students. Seaview Academy saw record-breaking enrollment for families who preferred a flexible, online learning experience. When school went remote in the fall, Stevens Middle School worked with the Clallam County Health Department to allow Career and Technical Education (CTE) students to work on engineering projects in-person, safely. After learning that 40% of elementary students struggled to engage with online learning consistently, we brought

them back five days a week. When in-person classes resumed, and extracurricular activities trickled back into our daily schedules, spring felt like hyperspeed. Port Angeles High School (PAHS) students finally reunited with their peers through athletics and competed in our league. Band and orchestra students practiced together and went on to deliver in-person performances. PAHS restored homecoming week and held competitions and other traditional festivities. Dare we say that we are returning to the way things used to be?

The 2nd Annual Senior Parade kicked off graduation weekend, and the Port Angeles community celebrated in droves. Parents, businesses, first responders, and district employees filled the streets to cheer on our seniors. The PAHS class of 2021 had 225 graduates, with

102 receiving scholarships totaling more than \$2.8 million from 121 donors! Of those funds, \$525,000 came from local donors and organizations. Through our academic programs and CTE departments, PASD staff worked hard to ensure our graduates were career or college-ready and prepared for life-long learning. We are so proud of our staff and the entire graduating class of 2021.

Last year, local sponsors and foundations provided funding for school events, gardens, musical instruments, and a strider bike program for our youngest learners. In addition, fundraisers took place to ensure integral programs and events could continue, despite the evident roadblocks. For example, the annual community shred event in April raised \$2,200. Funds raised from this event will buy school supplies for our 13th Annual Back to School Fair (scheduled for both in-person and drive-thru on Saturday, August 21st, 2021)!

Each May, PASD partners with the Juan de Fuca Foundation for the Arts (JFFA) and busses students to the Port Angeles Performing Arts Center to enjoy live performances by touring artists. This year, JFFA arranged a complete-

ly free virtual school program. Students enjoyed music by Black Violin, a group of classically trained musicians. The band uses its unique blend of classical and hip-hop music to overcome stereotypes. They encourage people of all ages, races, and economic backgrounds to join together to break down cultural barriers. Thank you to the Port Angeles and Sequim Education Foundations for funding this year's virtual programming and to JFFA for creatively bringing the arts to our students.

Not even Covid-19 could stop our school and community members from volunteering as a way to come together and support one another safely. PASD AmeriCorps Members provided over 19,920 hours of service throughout our district. Their volunteer efforts included tutoring, serving food at distribution sites, and they were a daily source of support for struggling students. In addition, 15 high school students earned their varsity letter through the Youth United program by volunteering more than 1,855 hours at 37 local non-profit organizations and events. Another inspiring act of community service featured a partnership with Clallam County Emergency Operations Center, Health Department, and North Olympic Healthcare Network. Each weekend, for four months, the high school gym morphed into a mass vaccination clinic. Almost 130 volunteers donated more than 1,200 hours to make these clinics happen, and health care professionals administered over 12,000 vaccine doses. Wow! It's incredible to look back on what our community and district accomplished together.

We've mentioned it before, and it's worth repeating that we plan for a near-normal return next year. It's monumental and something we don't take lightly. We look forward to welcoming back all of our learners full-time, five days a week, with fall sports starting on schedule. Again, immense gratitude and thanks go out to our community and families for your understanding and support of our efforts this last year. We know that hope is on the horizon.

What a year! I am very proud of our staff, parents/guardians, community, and students. Port Angeles School District lead the movement across the State of Washington to return students to in-person learning, performances, athletics, homecoming, etc. We worked hard as a community to find creative ways to engage students as safe as possible.



Looking ahead to the 2021-22 school year, we are returning to full-time in-person instruction. I am happy to report that we had no known community transmission within our schools last year. This fact is impressive considering we had thousands of staff and students pass through our buildings each day. I have always known that our schools are safe because of the mitigation strategies we implemented as a school district. Next year we are planning the following mandatory Covid mitigation strategies:

- Require face coverings for the foreseeable future

STAYING CONNECTED THROUGH A PANDEMIC

The movie Apollo 13 has a scene where Gene Kranz, the Chief Flight Director, is standing in the Mission Control room. The engineers present are reeling off information regarding the major malfunction the Apollo space capsule is experiencing. In the capsule itself, master alarm buzzers are going off, and the three astronauts are rapidly communicating flight instrumentation data. After Kranz gets the engineers to quiet down, he states to his engineering team, "Don't tell me what's not working. Tell me what is working." As I reflect upon this past year, there were many things in our community that worked to carry our students through this Covid saddled school year.

Similar to the Apollo 13 engineers that safely returned the three astronauts from their aborted mission, the Port Angeles community handled adversities and constantly changing parameters to support our PASD students throughout

this school year successfully. These Apollo engineers became known as the "Tiger Team." Since that moment in time, "Tiger Teams" have been created in government and private industries to solve complex issues. This past year, every member of our Port Angeles community became part of a "Tiger team" to make learning as effective as possible. One effective tool they used was communicating with administrators and counselors for support.

When parents reached out to Stevens Middle School (SMS) administrators or counselors about their child's need to interact with others, we brought them into the SMS Engineering classroom to build solar cars, water bottle rockets, basswood dragsters, and balsa gliders. It was fulfilling to see quiet students, hesitant to speak and struggling to complete schoolwork online, find success with building something physical with their hands. These tactile constructions promoted a sense of success and optimism. Optimism is a habit of mind intrinsic to engineers, and these students were able to experience this firsthand by applying planned improvements to their projects. From this process, students learned that working on models lends itself to being optimistic, whether it is something physical or a social manifestation. In addition, whether students were online or in class, we also focused on being conscientious and discussed the ethical aspect of engineering. That is, when you build or create something, you must consider the impact on others. This impact on others speaks to an interconnectedness the Salish tribes honor and reference through story.

At SMS, we occasionally spotted a coyote near campus. In most First Nation stories, the coyote is a trickster. However, the Salish and Spokane tribes also view the coyote as a healer. Part of their origin tale affirms the return of coyotes will mark a time when all people's spiritual and social values are interconnected, creating a complete circle. I like to think this is the coyote from the Salish/Spokane legends, and he has come to acknowledge how our Port Angeles community is completing the circle of healing as we move beyond Covid. For this reason, I congratulate and celebrate our P.A. Tiger Team. Your commitment to each other and our children has done more than keep us safe; it has kept us connected.

In closing, I acknowledge that I teach and wrote this article on traditional Klallam Tribal land.

Like anything in a pandemic, this last year has been challenging, but we are grateful for continued community support in our music program. We have a lot to celebrate, especially as we welcomed new staff to our team: Jarret Hansen (PAHS Band), Vicki Helwick (PAHS/ SMS Choir), and Hannah Reed (SMS Band).

We are proud to share that student Adam Weller completed his 3rd consecutive orchestra audition to Washington Music Educators' Association (WMEA) All-State. This is especially impressive considering the digital format and intense competition within the state's orchestra students.

The music department appreciates the support of our district and building administrators as we created plans to ensure public safety while presenting meaningful experiences in music.

In the fall, smaller in-person groups of string students and percussionists were approved

to gather. Doing this helped get us through the fully remote phase of the school year. We used this time to measure student growth and simulate our "normal" in a small but effective way. We are incredibly grateful to Superintendent Brewer for working with us to create a plan for return to school that included our programs and performing opportunities during Term 4.

North Olympic Music Educators (NOME) organized and presented a virtual "Solo and Ensemble" contest that served a greater purpose in this unique time. Although we received news from the WMEA that future student events were at-risk after a year of low revenue, the NOME members voted to keep costs as low as possible for our NOME Solo and Ensemble performers. We hired a team of rock-star adjudicators who volunteered their time so we could donate our total amount of proceeds to WMEA. I later learned that this donation played a decisive role in the future of WMEA student

We are also grateful for our chance to hold spring band and orchestra concerts. In the music department, these performances are essential to our measurement of student growth and our ability to motivate our young musicians through the power of music. Orchestra Leadership students Abby Sanders, Lucas Gavin, Maizie Tucker, and Emma Weaver took the reins to coordinate the schedule for spring concerts. With their help, we safely held performances that met our requirements for sanitization and distancing protocols. In addition, for the first time in 2 years, we organized a reduced "All-City Strings Review" for graduating

seniors. This event was their chance to get their capstone performance every generation of PAHS seniors prior has enjoyed. Last year, the retired Ron Jones joined us to distribute roses in a drive-thru ceremony honoring seniors. This year, we were able to do substantially more. Dr. James Ray and Sabrina Scruggs (the teachers who started this year's seniors when they were in 4th grade) joined me in directing students one last time through some of their favorite repertoires. With the help of our elementary orchestra colleagues Traci Tyson, Amber Mattfield, and Teresa Bjornes, we continued the tradition of featuring 4th-grade students in the final piece, Ode to Joy, and distributed roses to the graduating seniors. Orchestra Leadership also hosted a small outdoor event where we painted several retired instruments. We will feature these instruments in our classroom for generations to come.

With dates for next year's events soon to be added to the district calendar, the music department remains grateful for the support of our community and looks forward to sharing our talents with you in the fall!

AKB Fully Funded

Port Angeles School District (PASD) is excited to announce that we will implement an All Kids Bike® program for kindergarten and first-grade students in the fall. All Kids Bike® (AKB) is a national movement led by the Strider® Education Foundation. Inc.

AKB places elementary PE Learn-To-Ride Programs into public schools for free, using donations from individuals, businesses, and organizations. Thanks to local sponsors, Lincoln Park BMX Association and Sound Bikes and Kayaks, this program has been fully funded! The program includes a full curriculum, a fleet of 24 Strider AKB-Specific Bikes, helmets, pedal conversion kits, and one Strider Bike for teacher instruction. All five of our elementary schools will share the bikes in a rotation. This will be a fantastic opportunity for students to develop the balance and skills to ride a bike and the confidence that comes with that accomplishment.

PASD learned about the All Kids Bike program through Lara Hernandez, a Seaview Academy Teacher whose son is actively involved in BMX racing. Sean Coleman, Lincoln Park BMX Track President, suggested this program and offered to contribute up to half the \$5,000 cost to fund it. Coleman posted the fundraising opportunity in a local bike advocacy group online. Within a

day, Troy and Maura Treaccar, owners of Sound Bikes and Kayaks, stepped up and donated the remaining \$2,500 to complete the project. You can enjoy our beautiful Olympic Discovery Trail, Lincoln Park BMX Track, or downhill courses; the possibilities are endless."

PASD is the first kindergarten and first-grade AKB PE Program in the state of Washington. We will now offer everything teachers need to teach our youngest learners how to ride bikes. PE Teacher, Campbell Kirkman, is excited to get her kids rolling in the classroom in the fall. Campbell said,"The elementary physical education teachers are fully committed to providing our students with as many opportunities as possible to develop lifelong habits for a healthy, active lifestyle. With so many local options for riding, we want to make sure each of our students leaves our elementary schools with the skills and knowledge to ride a bike safely."
