Wayne County Board of Education appreciates elementary teachers delivering new reading initiatives

Reading initiatives were the main focus of Thursday night's Wayne County Board of Education meeting. Five Wayne County elementary teachers were recognized during the monthly meeting. They had been favorably featured in a recent front-page article in the Louisville Courier Journal, the state's largest newspaper, in regard to an investigative series of articles focused on how children learn to read.

Wayne County Schools Elementary Curriculum Coach Amanda Beck kicked off a presentation by the teachers to illustrate the importance of how reading is taught. She explained the district's push to provide research-based reading instruction using a mixture of programs specially selected by the administrators. The headline of the story about Wayne County was "Phonics alone can't solve reading crisis", and the teachers demonstrated how well more rigorous methods are providing students with more knowledge.

Teacher Angela Phillips (Monticello Elementary) illustrated how they are approaching the “Science of Reading” using knowledge rich curriculum. They all were appreciative that the board of education has invested in these programs to help implement this style of reading instruction.

The board also recognized the district technology department and the digital coaches at each school building. They each received the Stilwell Award/Meritorious Service medal, which was commissioned for presentation to critical Education Technology staff in all KY school districts. The coin signified the educational technical support throughout the 24-month core of the pandemic. Their service provided THE connection with students and families to their schools for the continuation of learning and student health supports.

Wayne County Schools Technology Director Valerie Hutchinson praised her team’s efforts and provided information about the amazing number of services they offer the district. In other business during the meeting:

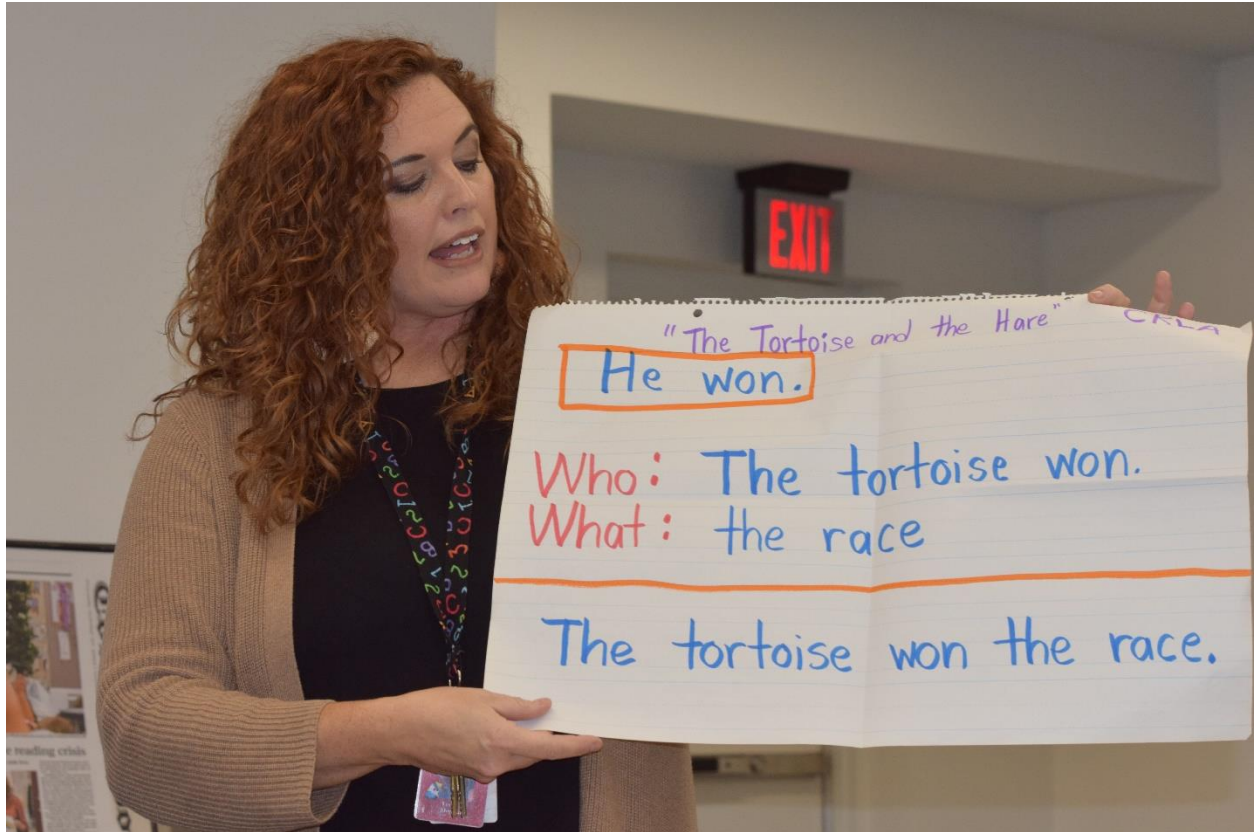
*Approved the 2021-22 financial audit report which showed a healthy ending balance of \$3,629,944 in the general fund at the end of June 2022. White & Associates, PSC determined the district’s financial standing had a rating of an “unmodified report” which is the highest available. There were no deficiencies and no noncompliance issues reported.

*Approved a bond sale and resolution of the board authorizing an agreement between the Kentucky Interlocal School Transportation Association and the board providing for the acquisition of four new International school buses at a total cost of \$460,378. One 52-passenger bus and three 72-passenger buses will be added to the fleet.

*Approved the Community Eligibility Provision (CEP) program, which provides free meals to students.
