TREATY DAY - JANUARY 26


On Wednesday, January 26, 2022, the Port Angeles School District acknowledged and honored Treaty Day across our school community. In 1855, the United States of America entered a solemn agreement, known as the Point No Point Treaty, with the Klallam, Chimakum, and the Skokomish tribes. Isaac Stevens, Governor of Washington Territory, presented the tribal leaders from these independent sovereign nations with this treaty on the northern tip of the Kitsap Peninsula, now known as Skokomish. In agreeing to this treaty, these tribes ceded ownership of their land, more than 750,000 acres combined, in exchange for a small reservation in Skokomish and hunting and fishing rights. The Klallam people alone relinquished over 400,000 acres. Most, however, remained on the Olympic Peninsula or traveled via canoe, across the Strait of Juan de Fuca to Beacher Bay in Canada, refusing to relocate 100 miles away from their homes to the Skokomish reservation.

As Port Angeles educators, we are committed to providing students and our community with accurate history and information about the Elwha Klallam people. This is why we honor Treaty Day. This day is an integral part of history for all who live in this region. All of us, and those who came before, who live in this region, have benefited from the resources and land that native ancestors have held since time immemorial. As Washington residents, we are all treaty people. If it weren't for treaties between the United States and the 29 sovereign nations within the Washington territories, we would not have become the state we are today.

NOTICE OF HEARING ON PROPOSED SALE OF CENTRAL SERVICES BUILDING TO OLYMPIC MEDICAL CENTER



PASD's Board of Directors ("Board") proposes to sell the Central Services Building located at 216 East Fourth Street, Port Angeles, Washington, Tax Parcel No. 0630000169050000, which is no longer required for school district purposes. The property is a 2-story, 8383 square-foot commercial building across the street from the courthouse and previously housed the school district's central administrative offices. The proposed buyer is Clallam County PHD No. 2 ("Olympic Medical Center"), which intends to use the property for administrative offices. The Board will hold a public hearing on the proposed sale at 6:00 p.m. on February 10, 2022, at the Lincoln Center, 905 West 9th Street, Port Angeles, Washington. At that time, the Board will receive evidence and comments for and against the propriety and advisability of the proposed sale. Click here for more info.

The backbone in one's body holds all the pieces together and allows them to function. Jeff Carlson and Matt Rosey are the backbone of Franklin Elementary. They maintain the building and ensure that all of the staff have what is needed to support student learning and wellbeing.

When staff arrives in the mornings, lights are on and the building is ready to go. Classroom doors are open for teachers to walk right into their rooms and be ready for students. The building is warm, which isn't always an easy task with the age of our system, and welcoming because of the attention given by Jeff Carlson.

Throughout the day, Mr. Carlson delivers breakfast and lunch bags to classrooms, wipes down frequently touched items to ensure safety, handles any incidentals that may occur in a classroom or hallway, and even tackles the bigticket issues until maintenance can arrive.

The running joke is that if he were to wear a pedometer, he would wear it out in a day from putting on so many miles. I am hesitant to use the word custodian when describing Mr. Carlson. Because he works so well with children, he is an educator in every sense of the word.

Early afternoon, the reins are turned over to Matt Rosey. Mr. Rosey assists in making sure students are attended to at the day's end before he completes his route. He usually begins by supporting teachers with classroom needs that have developed, bringing in chairs to replace items needing repair or extra desks if students are added to a classroom. Once those tasks have been accomplished, the floors are swept, mopped, or vacuumed to make them look as good as they did on the first day of school.

The Franklin staff would like both Jeff and Matt to know how much we appreciate them and their notice their efforts. They truly are our backbone.


