More children and teenagers are struggling with emotional stressors

Adults should know serious signs and how to respond

New data from the Washington State Department of Health's (DOH) behavioral health group indicates that more young people are seeking medical help in instances of emotional distress. State health officials are asking families, educators, mentors, and youth advocates to know the warning signs that signal when a child or teen is in crisis, and to talk with a healthcare or primary care provider for behavioral health support resources. This guidance comes at the heels of a public advisory and <u>53-page report</u> from the U.S. surgeon general on the importance of protecting youth mental health, and the "devastating" mental health impacts as a result of the pandemic.

"Be aware of abrupt or significant changes in behavior that may signal that additional behavioral health support is needed," said Dr. Kira Mauseth, co-lead for the behavioral health strike team at DOH. "Acting out – or expressing distress externally, with aggression - and impulsive or dangerous behaviors can be a strong indicator of distress. On the other end of the behavioral spectrum, acting in - or isolation and withdrawal from typical activities - can also be a warning sign that youth are struggling."


Orca: Shared Waters, Shared Home



The Feiro Marine Life Center is hosting a temporary exhibit based on Lynda Mapes' book "Orca: Shared Waters, Shared Home" through Monday, Jan. 31. Mapes also wrote "Breaking Ground", which our District is reading on the unearthing of The Lower Elwha Klallam Tribe's Tse-whit-zen Village.

The exhibit, based on the book co-published by The Seattle Times and nonprofit publisher Braided River in June 2021, features captivating photography by Steve Ringman and others, and stories by author and Seattle Times journalist Lynda V. Mapes about the power, majesty, and plight of twin endangered iconic species of the Salish Sea – Southern Resident Killer Whales and Chinook salmon. The seven-panel exhibit of stories and photos is included in the regular admission price at the center, 315 N. Lincoln St.
