<u>Please say hello and farewell to Jeff Clark!</u>

Jeff is the Principal at PAHS. He is retiring this year after 17 years with the district. From Richmond, Virginia, Jeff joined the army at 19 years old. After four years in the military, he started his ten-year career with the National Park Service as a mountain climbing ranger at the North Cascades National Park. He worked a season at Mr. Rainier, digging ditches, and was an interpretive ranger at Scotty's Castle located in Death Valley National Park.

While working in the North Cascades filled the summers, Jeff needed something to do during the winter. His wife, at the time, entered a program to become social studies teacher and he figured he could become a teacher, too! He earned his Bachelor of Arts degree from The Evergreen State College and his



administrative credentials and Masters in Education from Western Washington University. His teaching career was launched in Anacortes as an English teacher where he worked for two years. He taught English for more than 13 years in Bellingham and coached boys and girls soccer. Jeff started his administration journey with the Taholah School District on the Quinault Indian reservation as their principal for one year. Jeff became the assistant principal and athletic director for PAHS in 2005 and spent eight years in this position. He also spent two years as our district's Director of Technology and Athletics since computers and football go well together. ⁽²⁾

Jeff has two sons, and both navigated the PASD system successfully. His wife Helen teaches and is a full-time counselor out at the Crescent School District. In retirement, Jeff looks forward to spending more time outdoors. He will now be able to hike in the mountains during the spring and fall shoulder seasons. He shared that he is especially looking forward to fall hiking when there are still two months of great weather left. After the first freeze, bugs are gone, and it makes adventures more enjoyable. Jeff is a fly fisherman and likes taking camping trips on his all-terrain, dual-sport motorcycle. Helen and Jeff want to travel more. They have visited Japan, Thailand, all over Europe, and look forward to filling up their passport with even more stamps.

Working with people has been Jeff's favorite thing about teaching and being the principal at PAHS. He feels that the Olympic Peninsula is a special place, and living here has worked out well for his family. Being remote from the I-5 corridor can be inconvenient at times for Jeff, but he thinks the advantages outweigh the disadvantages. Jeff also shared that we live in a geographically gifted place, and he is proud that our community demonstrated resilience in living through this pandemic.

Please join us in thanking Jeff for his service and time with our school district. We will miss your witty comments and guidance, but we are excited for the adventures to come! We wish you all the best!

In closing, a note from fellow almost retiree, Lillian Cone, PAHS Assistant Principal: Working with Jeff Clark was one of the best parts of my tenure at PAHS. As more than one staff member has said, Jeff restored trust in the high school. He created a climate of respect and trust with his steadfast leadership and unwavering integrity. He made it our mission to protect the staff; "in education, everyone is always adding something to the plate, and no one is ever taking something off the plate". The results speak for themselves, a school building with a clear focus on student learning and a graduation rate increase of 12.5 %.

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The PAHS Garden Club met every week, sometimes twice a week since last October. The club consists of 10 dedicated students and 10 other students who have joined to dig, weed and plant after a long day in front of the computer. In the fall they cleaned the garden and prepared the soil for spring planting through intensive composting. Over the winter they started plants in the greenhouse and prepared the garden beds and, this Spring the students constructed an herb garden, planted a new flower bed, and are growing lettuce, potatoes, carrots, beets, celery, pumpkins, corn, cucumbers, quinoa, tomatoes, onions, and radishes. Students will continue this work throughout the summer by watering, weeding, and tending the gardens for a fall-time harvest and are currently building a chicken coop.
