

Several of her teammates also broke school records, qualified for Districts, and achieved a multitude of personal bests.

According to Junior Captain Gabe Farthing, the team has grown immensely since he first began swimming for the middle school. His first year on the team, there were six members of the swim team. Fastforward four years, the team is now 26 strong. The swimmers insist that the team could not be the success that it is today without the incredible support of the parents. The parents get them to evening practices at

Denison and run the home meets at New Albany High School.


Farthing explains, "we all work together to push each other to do our best." Senior Audrey Holt says, "it isn't always easy to juggle swimming, academics, and other activities," but she is motivated to get her work done, as she aspires to swim at the collegiate level next year.

Both Farthing and Co-captain Jason Roser had a fantastic showing this season. Roser was striving to break 30 seconds in the 50 freestyle. He obliterated that goal with a time of 27.5 seconds! Farthing's goal for the year was to stand on the podium at Districts. He did that with a time of 1:58.25 in the 200 freestyle, earning him 8th place and the honor of being the first male Northridge swimmer to reach the podium at Districts in an individual event. Farthing also broke the school record with that performance, marking his 6th school

record in the sport. Next year, his goal is to qualify for states. Both young men believe that the mental toughness they have developed in the sport will take them big places in this world. \*

**Board Votes to Place Issue on the May Ballot** 

he Northridge Local Schools Board of Education voted to place a combined issue on the May 7, 2019 ballot. The 4.3-mill bond issue and 0.5 percent earned income levy will allow the district to build a new elementary school and also provide ongoing maintenance and repair needs at the middle and high school. These critical updates are necessary to bring the district's facilities up to modern day standards and meet the increasing educational, structural and safety issues that currently exist in the schools.

"This issue is about addressing real needs at our schools," said Board of Education President Doug Hart. "We are asking for what is necessary to support the educational needs of students. This is about maintaining the good value the district provides, not about a bunch of fancy extras."

It is important to note that the plans for the construction of a new elementary school have not changed. The new building will offer a good, no-frills learning environment. However, due to the continued rise in construction costs, the cost of materials and increased construction labor wages, the same building now costs more to build. The district must account for these growing expenses that are happening across all building and renovation projects throughout the state.

In addition, the length of the bond issue has been reduced from 30 to 27 years. This feedback came from the community through an online survey that was reviewed by district leadership. "We are listening to the community," Hart said. "We have put together a reasonable request that meets the needs of our students that is also in line with what residents have told us they want in terms of a financial package."

"We plan to share more detailed information about this ballot issue in the coming weeks," Hart said. "We want to make sure that every voter has the information they need to make an informed decision about this important vote." \*
