
If you had the option to work, what would it be outside of education?

Germany (Saint Nicholas' Day)

Nicholas travels by donkey in the middle of the night on December 6th and leaves little treats like coins, chocolate, oranges and toys in the shoes of good children all over Germany. He also visits children in schools in exchange for sweets and a small present, each child must recite a poem, sing a song, or draw a picture

Iceland (The Yule Lads)

In the 13 days leading up to Christmas, 13 tricksy troll-like characters come out to play in Iceland and visit the children all around the country. For each night of Yuletide, children place their best shoes by the window and a Yule Lad leaves gifts for nice kids and rotting potatoes for the naughty ones.

Japan (Kentucky Fried Chicken Dinner)

Christmas has never been a big deal in Japan. Aside from a few small traditions such as giftgiving and light displays, Christmas remains largely a novelty in the country. However, a new, quirky "tradition" has emerged in recent years, a Christmas feast of the Colonel's very own Kentucky Fried Chicken.

Toronto (Cavalcade of Lights)

In wintry, wonderful Toronto the annual Cavalcade of Lights marks the official start to the holiday season.
