





## SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT - Submitted by Tim Dettwiller, Superintendent

Hi folks,

We are pleased to have this opportunity to share with you the many wonderful stories of success we are seeing here at Fairfield. Please enjoy this edition of the Lions Roar and especially note the addition of the "Student Spotlight" articles written by our students.

A few months ago we were uncertain if we would be back on campus as the COVID-19 crisis challenged us to think seriously about the impact of students learning from home versus in our schools. I am happy to report as of the writing of this article we have had no positive COVID-19 test results amongst our students or staff since the school year began. I credit this healthy start to the students and staff adhering to the safety protocols we established and for the parents in monitoring their children to insure they do not send them to school sick.



Another focus for this school year is to provide clarity to all stakeholders as to what the goals are for our district and buildings. We have named the combination of all our goals the "Path to Excellence". We are in the final stages of our District Strategic Plan (Board and Community level) which will be rolled out online in the next few weeks. We pray, as we know our community does, for the continued health and well being of our students and staff. I want to thank members of the community for their continued support of our students and staff as they work through these new challenges.




- Goal #1 Research, evaluate and provide a recommendation for the creation of a pre-school for Fairfield local Schools.

The Treasurer's Office recently received the Ohio Auditor of State's Award for Excellence in Financial Reporting. The award is evidence that the district's financial practices are effective and accountable. I want to thank all staff members involved in the district finances for their diligence and hard work.

I also wanted to take this opportunity to remind everyone to complete the 2020 Census and respond to Census questions if you are asked in any year. A piece of our funding is tied to your responses, and we recently lost \$180,000 in state funding due to the Census data.

2020 has been a challenging year in the school finance world due to the uncertainties surrounding COVID-19, but we have continued to operate efficiently while seeking out additional revenue sources.

#### **OG TRAINING:**

Fairfield Elementary Intervention Specialists were trained in OG (Orton- Gillingham) this past summer. Our goal is to train all Intervention Specialists across the District with this specialized reading approach. This approach is very beneficial to our students and will certainly show academic growth in all areas. This is a specialized reading approach to help students who are struggling readers. This program is research based and proven to be successful.

The Orton-Gillingham Approach is a direct, explicit, multisensory, structured, sequential, diagnostic, and prescriptive way to teach literacy when reading, writing, and spelling does not come easily to individuals, such as those with dyslexia. It is most properly understood and practiced as an approach, not a method, program, or system. In the hands of a well-trained and experienced instructor, it is a powerful tool of exceptional breadth, depth, and flexibility.

#### **ELEMENTARY** - Submitted by Katie Streber, Principal

We are very grateful to be in the building with the majority of our students in attendance. While this year has brought new guidelines and uncertainty, Fairfield Elementary continues to rise above and make learning a priority. Regardless of the many challenges, students and staff have continued to make our building a positive environment while moving forward and aiming towards continuous improvement.



This year is our 4<sup>th</sup> and final year in the Ohio Literacy Pilot. K-3 teachers have spent the last 3 years strengthening their craft of teaching through the Language Essentials for Teachers of Reading and Spelling professional development. The focus of this school year is to improve the school-home relationship by building family engagement. A team was formed with staff members and families where the Partnerships for Literacy Inventory was completed. The team used the results to form 3 major goals for the school year which include the following:

- 1. Enhance annual fall Curriculum Night
- 2. Greater support for families to increase young children's literacy development
- 3. Improve communications between school and home, especially for students receiving anything other than core instruction

With new guidelines in place, our team has had to think outside the box and get creative. Look for information on links to The "Mane" Connection. Rather than hosting one curriculum night, The "Mane" Connection is the website where teachers will post videos with curriculum information and strategies throughout the school year. You will be able to locate The "Mane" Connection through the district website at fairfieldlocal.org.

Our reading specialists are working to develop stronger relationships with area preschools in order to bridge the gap between preschool and kindergarten. As a building, we would like to provide not only local preschools but also our preschool families with resources to better prepare their child for the transition into elementary school.

While English Language Arts continues to be an area of focus for the elementary, we are very excited to start placing a greater emphasis on improvement in math through our new curriculum, enVision Math. The Math Curriculum Team, consisting of K-12 staff members, reviewed numerous curriculum options last school year. The enVision Math curriculum stood out from others as it uses problem-based learning, small group instruction, visual learning and technology integration to help students develop a deeper understanding of math concepts. The elementary teachers have partici-



pated in one enVision professional development session and will have additional sessions this school year. We are anxious to see the impact the new curriculum and further professional development will have on the growth of our students in the area of math.

Fairfield Elementary staff and students have come back from the closure and summer break ready to work hard and make up for any lost time! If there is one takeaway from the start of the school year, it is that everyone is excited and feeling blessed to be back together again!




for our students.



## **CURRICULUM** - Submitted by Kesia McCoy, Director of Curriculum and Gifted Services



The Fairfield Local School District is pleased to announce the implementation of a new comprehensive K-12 math program. The new enVision2020 K-5, enVision2021 6-8 and enVisionAGA 9-12 focuses on mathematical practices, in-depth understanding of mathematical concepts and individualized instruction through both a print and digital format. The goal is to not only



prepare our students for the Ohio State Tests, but also prepare them to master the skills outlined in the Framework for 21st Century Learning. enVision2020, enVision2021 and enVisionAGA is rooted in prob-

lem based learning and engages students through interactive aids and video tutorials as well as personalized practice and immediate feedback.

Students will be actively involved in using printed materials and digital tools to develop deep mathematics understanding and will apply this understanding through practice and problem-solving in every math lesson. In addition, students will learn and practice new math ideas and concepts in a variety of ways, such as:

- Solving problems and explaining their thinking in a write-in text and online.
- Using online animations to help build understanding in a visual way.
- Work individually, in pairs and in small groups to solve problems and share their thinking.
- Complete assignments that promotes computational thinking, fluency and application through rich problem solving.
- Engaging in online practice that provides help as needed through worked-out examples and self-help videos.
- Experiencing a variety of math activities that include Math Games, STEM Activities, and enrichment opportunities.
- Embedded 3-Act tasks for thinking mathematically and access to on-demand Desmos calculators.

We look forward to the experiences this program will provide for the students in our school district.

The Fairfield Middle School staff was excited to welcome students back to the building and to our virtual classrooms after the prolonged school closure! It's great to see many returning and new students! The challenges of returning were great, but our staff and students rose above the hurdles to place learning and academic excellence as our number one priority!

The Middle School is implementing a new mathematics curriculum and entering year two of implementing the My Perspectives English Language Arts curriculum. We are grateful to the Curriculum teams for their time researching, discussing, and selecting these curriculums. Teachers will continue to receive professional development in the ELA and Math curriculums throughout the school year.

The Middle/High School Positive Behavior Intervention Support Team met prior to the start of school to address concerns that may arise from the extended leave and COVID19. In August, the PBIS team focused upon recognizing students for taking responsibility to meet the Reset/Restart expectations for all 6-12 students, revamping the PBIS incentives, and discussed the effectiveness of the PBIS program.

## VIRTUAL SCHOOL OPTION

Due to the uncertainties and health risks of Covid-19 this school year, Fairfield Local School District offered a virtual school option to all of our K-12 students. In a partnership with the Southern Ohio ESC and Fairfield County ESC, Fairfield was able to offer the Florida Virtual School curriculum to our students. Students may choose to return to in-person learning after the first semester or remain in the online school for the remainder of the year. Currently, the elementary school (K-5) has 32 students enrolled, the middle school (6-8) has 27 students enrolled and the high school (9-12) has 22 students enrolled.
