As part of the Sayreville Public Schools New Jersey Quality Single Accountability Continuum (NJQSAC) monitoring, the NJ DOE is requiring documentation and procedures which evidence that a comprehensive record of immunizations, required physical examinations, and health screenings are maintained in order to identify the need for medical services for public and nonpublic school students, and to ensure that health records are kept separately from other student records. To date, there have been no findings of noncompliance since the last NJQSAC monitoring. (N.J.A.C. 6A:16-2.l(a)8, 2.2, and 2.5 and 6A:32-7.4(c)).

As such, the Sayreville Public School District is required to maintain an agreement with all nonpublic schools in Sayreville that are receiving nonpublic nursing service funds so that should the need arise, the district's physician or nursing staff will be provided with access to all nonpublic school student medical records, including the A45 form, to verify compliance with N.J.A.C.
