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Summary

This Needs Assessment is the first step in the development of an Early Learning Plan (Plan) partially funded through a grant from First 5 Santa Barbara County and highlights the multiple components that impact the foundations for building brain architecture, language and skill acquisition, and relationships for children ages 0-8 years. This broad assessment addresses the primary areas: community, health, education, child and family welfare, as well as the impact of COVID-19 that are instrumental to maintaining continuity of supports for children to achieve lasting success in school and beyond. Addressing the needs identified within this assessment will allow for effective vertical articulation and alignment and well as effective parent/family/community engagement and support.

The success of Lompoc's most vulnerable children requires an essential early education model that LUSD can help create through this project: an effective and results-driven, system of providers who align services vertically as well as horizontally to ensure all children receive the skills and services necessary to succeed.

Target populations include

- Parents of and children prenatal to five who are, or ever have been, in the child welfare system.
- Parents of and children prenatal to five who have multiple risk factors such as racial/ethnic origin of high risk, poverty (family income at/below 50% federal poverty level), single parent household, non-English speaking parent, less than a high school education, incarcerated parent, or one or more parents unemployed.
- Parents of and infants/children with low birth-weight babies, children born to teens, infants born to mothers receiving late or no prenatal care, children with identified special needs and/or identified with learning differences, children with ACE scores higher than 3, Dual
- Language Learners and English Language Learners, children of first-generation immigrants.

To address the challenges and opportunities identified within this Needs Assessment, LUSD's Early Learning Plan (Plan) will focus on three system goals with strategic objectives to meet goals.

System Goal 1: Children Arrive Ready for Kindergarten

System Goal 2: Children are raised in healthy, stable and attached families.

System Goal 3: The early learning system is aligned, coordinated and family centered.

Preliminary broad strategies have been selected for each of the evidence-based ideas proposed by First 5. Additional data and input from the community over the next few months will test the selected strategies and further define the final list of actions.

1. Birth Through Grade 3
 - a. A Partnership of local and county-wide agencies and child care providers with LUSD
 - b. Alignment of data and services between entities
2. Schools as Hubs
 - a. Piloting of the Schools as Hubs model in one or more select schools, integrated with the other selected strategies

3. Vertical Articulation and Alignment
 - a. Child care and TK/K Kindergarten Readiness Network (KRN -actual name to be decided)
 - b. Data sharing and alignment between 0-5 providers and LUSD
4. Parent and Family Support
 - a. Parent Cafes
 - b. Integration with current partner and LUSD efforts
5. Professional Growth and Support
 - a. Training and coaching through the KRN and through the Dual Language Learner grant from First 5
6. Persistence
 - a. Solid data gathering, analysis and evaluation plan and implementation
 - b. Accountability through the Partnership

An Asset Map and SWOT analysis have been completed and are companions to this document as part of a comprehensive foundation of data and information from which the Plan will be created. Next steps will include community, parent-family and child care engagement (surveys, parent cafes and focus groups), community and child data gathering and assessment of student readiness, and further development of the Partnership.

Methodology

Data were gathered from national sources such as the US Census, American Institute for Research, and KidsData.org, etc. Local data sources were used when available. A reference to the information source is listed under each data point. When available and relevant, information is presented for Lompoc, Santa County, and California. The majority of the data reflect one point of time rather than trends over time thus there is minimal discussion about how trends changed over time.

Overview of Community

Summary: Overview of Community Section

Lompoc is a small community with 43,786 residents, 13,468 households and 5,737 families with 11,857 children ages 0-17 years old. The majority of children are Hispanic (72.6%) and 42.6% of the residents speak Spanish inside the home. The household median income in Lompoc (\$52,543) is significantly lower than Santa Barbara County as a whole (\$71,657) with 19.1% living in poverty in Lompoc compared to 12.6% in Santa Barbara County. It is noteworthy that Between 2007 and 2014, the percentage of Santa Barbara County children living below the federal poverty level (FPL) grew from under 15% to nearly 25%.

Through a lens of equity, LUSD recognizes that adversity in early childhood is rooted in chronic and persistent opportunity gaps. We know that income, race, and zip code act as pre-determinants of a community's ability to provide access to high quality childcare and preschool.

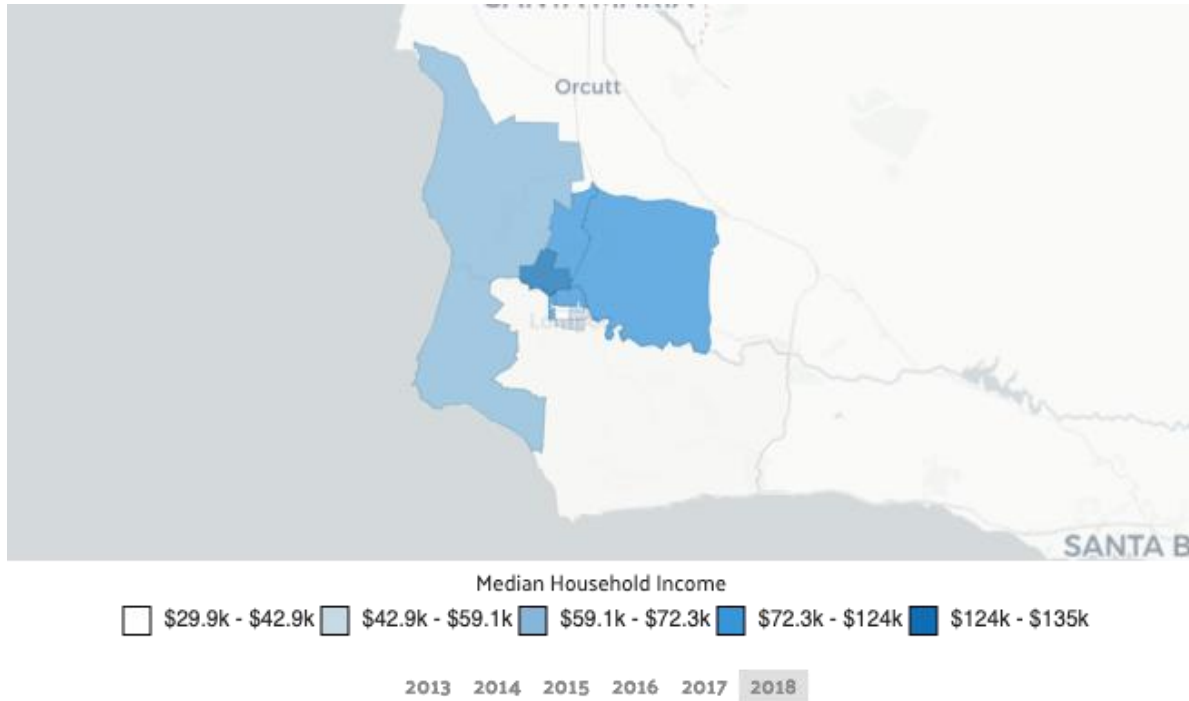

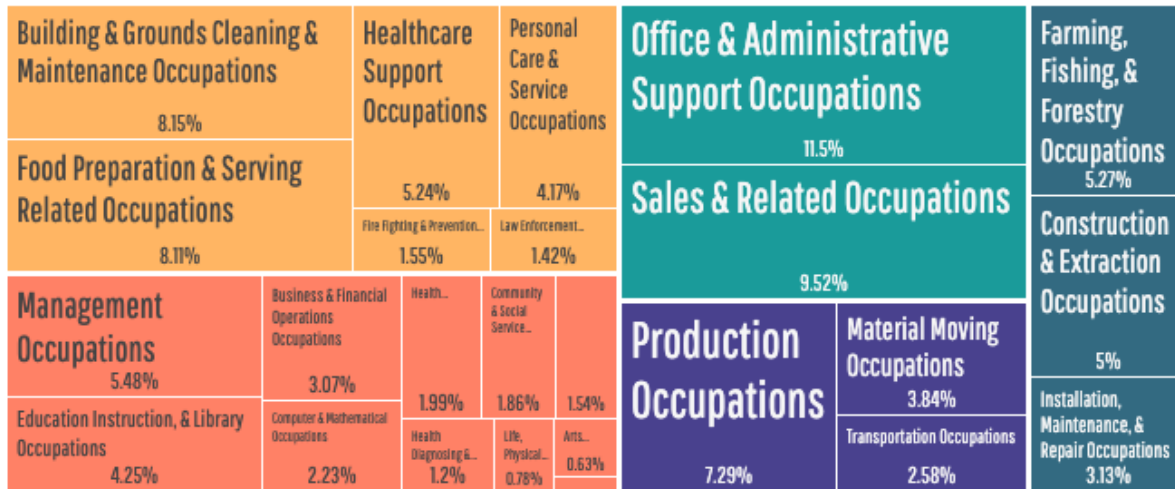
Income Distribution

Education

Summary of Education Section

There are 21 family child care providers, 26 child care centers, and 3 school age programs in Lompoc. The majority of the child care centers and public schools are located downtown and in close proximity thus creating the potential for easier collaboration and communication efforts.

As of 2019, 93.7% of high school seniors graduated from LUSD. On average from 2014-2018 a smaller percentage of residents 25 and older graduated from high school in Lompoc (78.3%) compared to Santa Barbara County (81.0%) and California (82.9%) and even less obtained a bachelor’s degree or higher in Lompoc (12.7%) compared to Santa Barbara County (33.8%) and California (33.3%).

In order to optimize parent engagement efforts it is recommended that communications are tailored to meet the needs/abilities of the 42% of 11th graders’ mothers who reported that their highest level of education was a high school degree or less.

Early Care and Education - Access and Quality

- There are 26 child care centers.
- There are 3 school age programs (2 YMCA locations and 1 Boys and Girls Club).

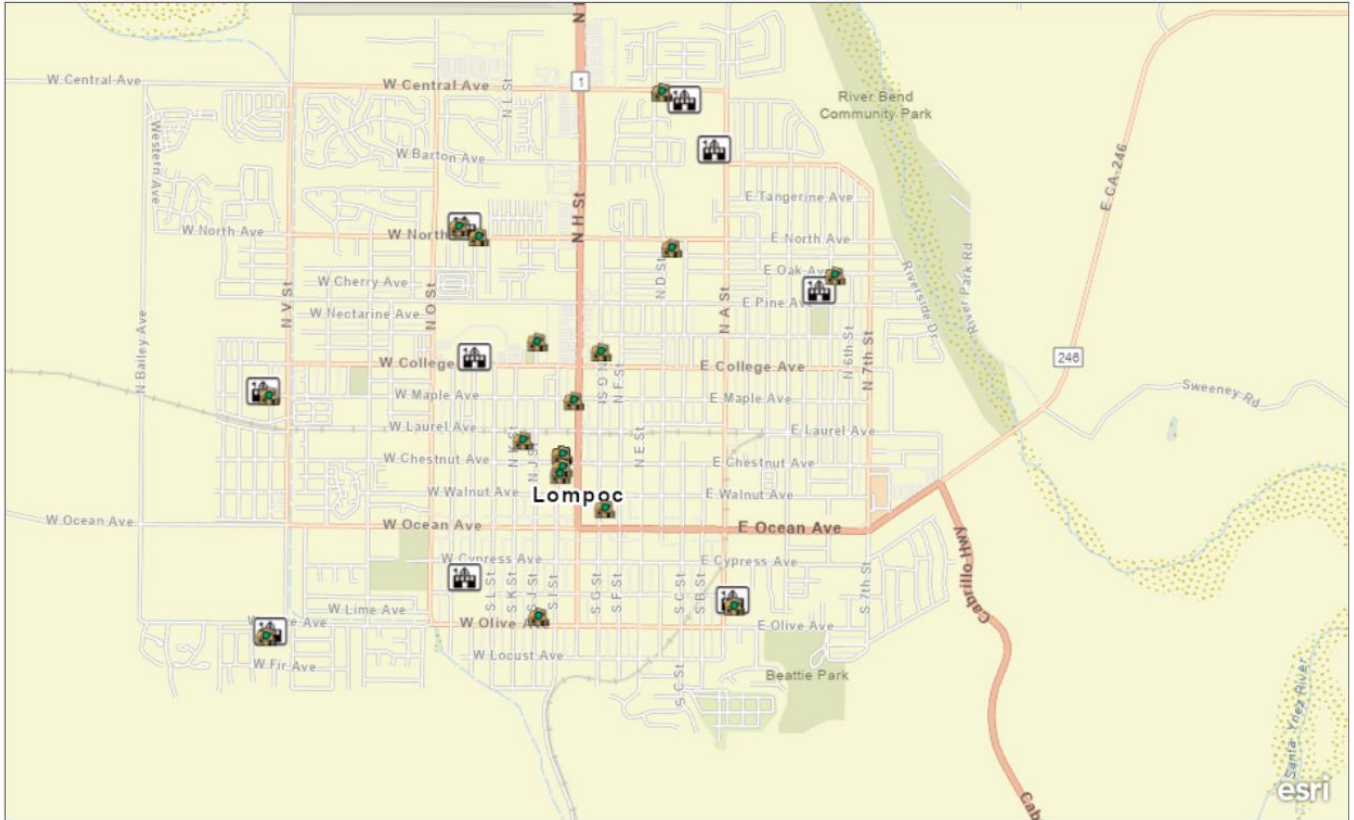

Health

Summary of Health Section

The majority of the health related information examined within this section was only available for Santa Barbara County as a whole, not Lompoc Valley or Lompoc City.

The number of births per year in Santa Barbara County has steadily decreased from 2015-2018. The highest percentage of Medi-Cal births occurred in North County (67%) compared to 16% in Central County and 16% in South County. Between 2017 and 2018, the percent of uninsured citizens in Lompoc, CA declined by 16.8% from 13.4% to 11.2%.

82.5% of pregnant women in Lompoc obtained prenatal care during the first trimester, which is less than the percentage who did so in South County (92.9% in Carpinteria and 91.6% in Santa Barbara City). White mothers (88.28%) were most likely to access prenatal care in the first trimester whereas Hispanic mothers were least likely (72.81%). Teen birth rates decreased in all regions of Santa Barbara County over time.

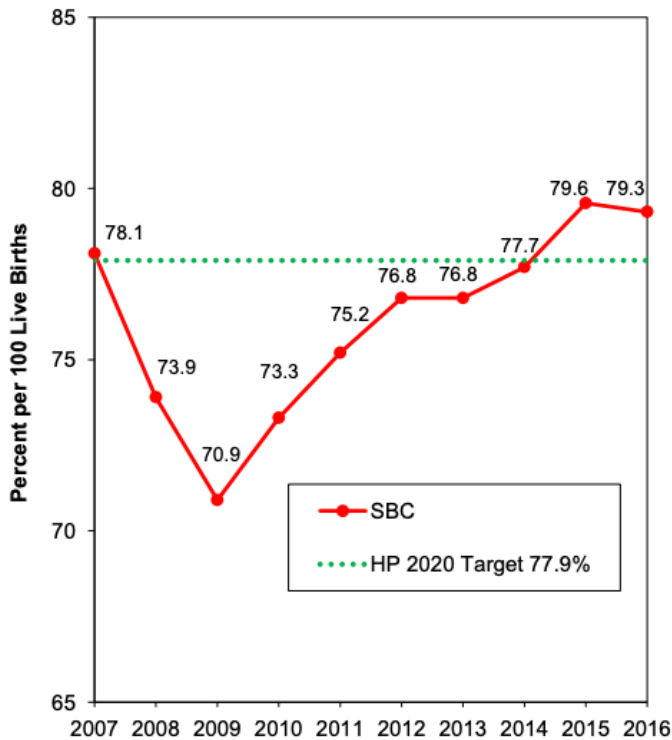

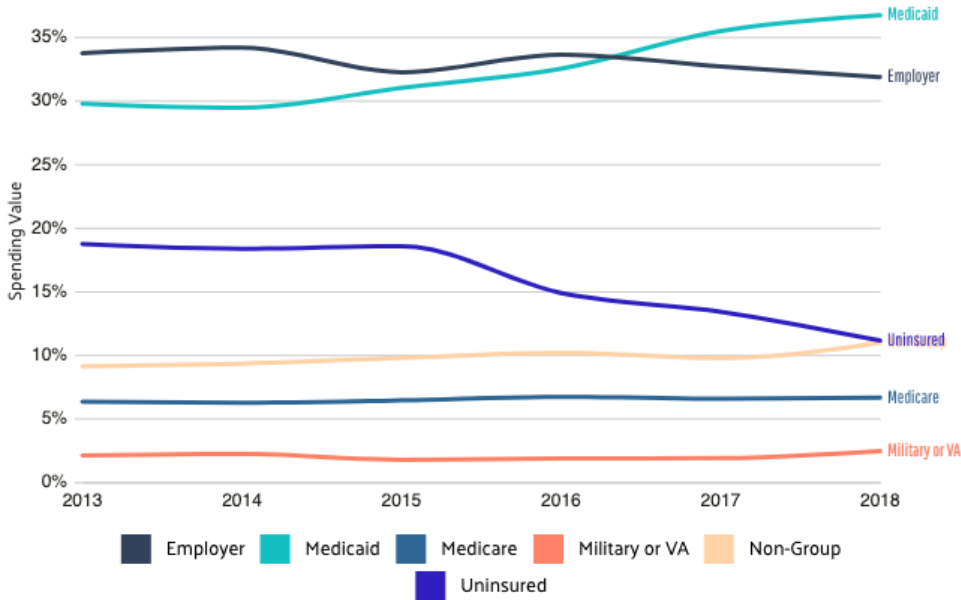

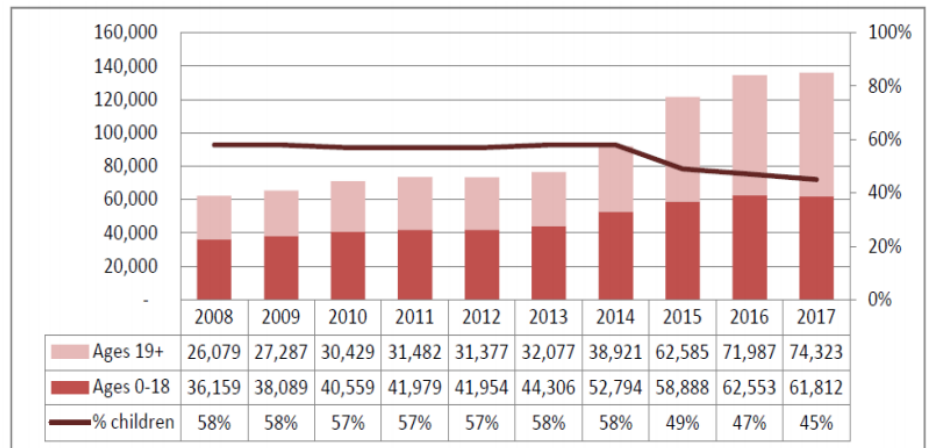

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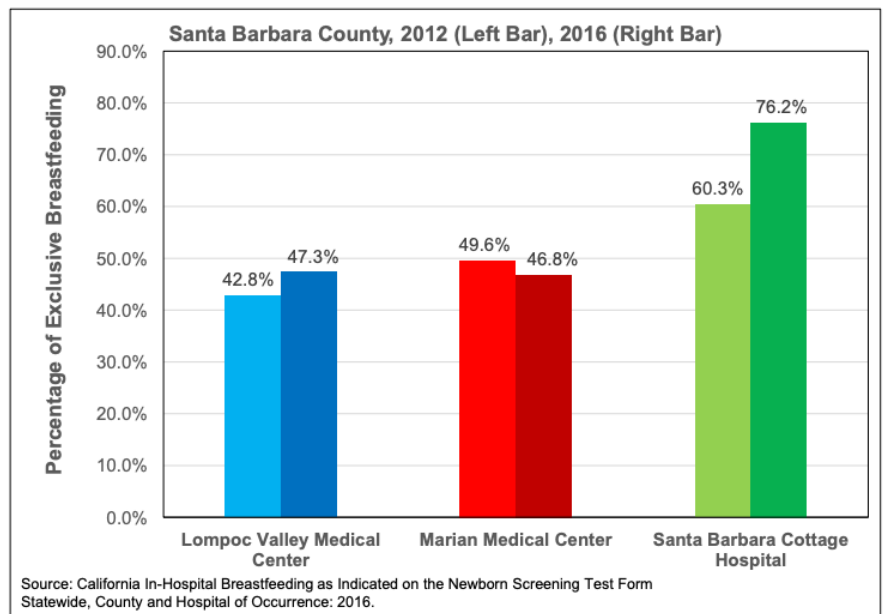

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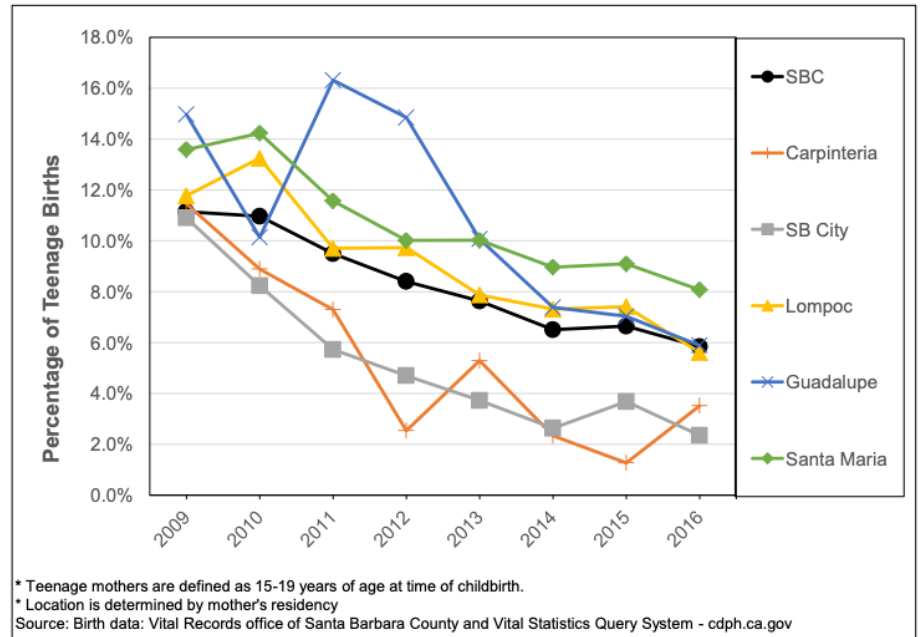
Teen Birth Rates

Child and Family Welfare

Summary: Child and Family Welfare Section

The information presented in this section relates to Santa Barbara County as a whole and was not available for Lompoc City or Lompoc Valley.

Since 2008, the number of referrals to Santa Barbara County Child Welfare Services (CWS) has increased, but there has been a decrease in the percentage of allegations that are substantiated. This follows a statewide trend. Children from zero to five years old continue to be most vulnerable, with children under one year old having the highest rates of abuse and neglect. General Neglect is consistently the number one cause of substantiated cases. Although the number of investigations is highest in North County, the rate of investigated referrals (based on the number of families) is similar in all regions of the county.

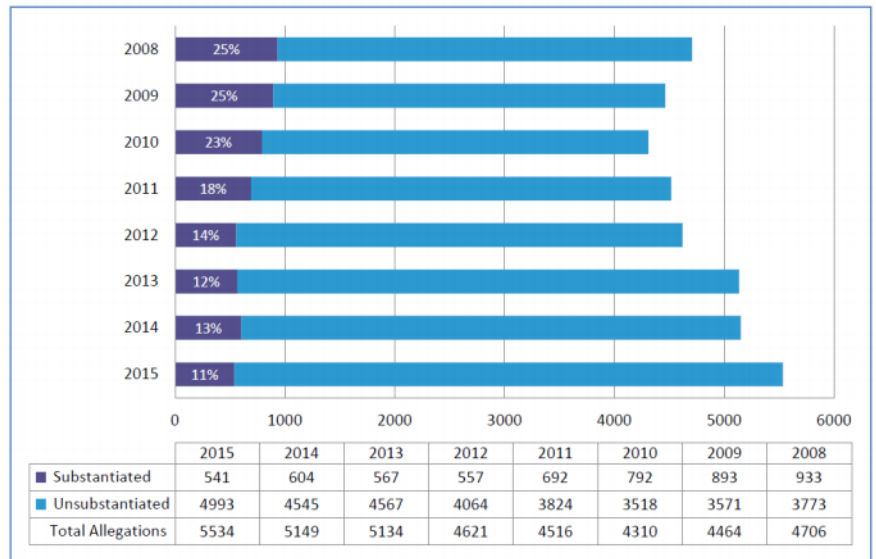

COVID-19 Related Data

Emergency Child Care Response for Essential Employees

The Lompoc Unified School District (LUSD) immediately partnered with the YMCA, United Boys & Girls Club, and the Lompoc Valley Medical Center to provide child care for first responders, hospital workers, and critical staff in response to the COVID-19 pandemic. A child care facility was open 13 hours a day to accommodate 12 hour shifts of first responders. Breakfast and lunch were provided by the school district, while dinner was served by Toms, Home of the Educated Hamburger.

COVID-19 in Lompoc Federal Prison

As of 12/6/20 there have been 1,027 positive COVID-19 cases at Lompoc Federal Prison and 3 deaths. Additionally, Lompoc City has had 1,202 positive COVID cases and 9 deaths to date. See the SBC Dashboard for more information:

Lompoc inmates and their families — as well as Representative Salud Carbajal and other members of Congress — have raised serious concerns about conditions at the prison and the steps federal authorities have or have not taken to slow the spread of the virus. The American Civil Liberties Union [filed a lawsuit against](#) the complex for subjecting inmates to cruel and unusual punishment. All groups have pressed the Bureau of Prisons (BOP) to carry out an April order from Attorney General William Barr to release certain inmates to home confinement so that BOP facilities with coronavirus outbreaks can better enact social distancing and quarantine measures.
