

FROM THE SUPERINTENDENT

This is an exciting time in the Mason City School District. We are now implementing our Master Facilities Plan that's been in the works since 2000! The Master Facilities Plan includes a modest addition to the Mason Early Childhood Center, some renovations inside Mason Intermediate School, and a total renovation of Mason Middle School. Under the plan that community members liked best, in 2019-2020 the district's preschool through second graders will attend the Mason Early Childhood Center; third through sixth graders will attend Mason Intermediate School; seventh and eighth graders will attend Mason Middle School; ninth through twelfth graders will attend Mason High School; and Western Row Elementary will close. Nearly \$34 million of the \$43 million plan is being paid for with tobacco settlement funds from the Ohio School Facilities Construction Commission, and the remaining costs have been planned for by the district and will not require voters to approve a bond-levy.

Our schools reflect what the community values. These community values set a standard far higher than any single test score. We measure academic success in many ways and carefully monitor our students level of preparation for further learning, meaningful work, and engaged citizenship. We are on a journey as a district to understand what it means to personalize learning. Part of that journey is becoming clearer on the ultimate goals we want for our learners. We share a commitment to develop the whole child--and that means going beyond our foundation of rigorous academics and rich opportunities for exploring the arts, careers, and other interests. We need to prepare students with the skills, resources, and mindsets necessary to face the challenges of a modern world--to be able to think, innovate, and relate to others. In short, we want them to be "Difference Makers." Over the past year, we engaged students, staff, parents, and community advisory groups in identifying a list of attributes that reflect the enduring qualities students need to adapt and learn; use knowledge in new ways; communicate ideas and plans; and inspire themselves and others. These crucial skills and mindsets include being an effective communicator, a collaborator, a creative innovator, a critical thinker, and a problem solver who is empathetic, flexible, optimistic, persistent, and resilient.

Mason has never settled for "good enough." Our schools are committed to "Growing Greatness Together," and that "together" includes you – our community. 


FINANCES




