

Mr. Monast "Cruises" To Victory

This past summer, Westport Middle and High School's own library and media specialist, Richard Monast, was chosen to be a recipient of the Norwegian's Giving Joy Award. This competition was set up by Norwegian Cruise Line to award and recognize teachers for their outstanding ability to inspire their students each and every day.

Mr. Monast was within the top 100 highest voted candidates in the United States and Canada, the prize being an all-inclusive five-day sailing trip aboard the Norwegian Prima. This trip was the inaugural journey of the new cruiseliner; the ship departed from Galveston, Texas and had a myriad of once-in-a-lifetime experiences onboard.

This competition grants the top three prize winners with an addi-

tional monetary prize, receiving \$25,000, \$15,000, or \$10,000 to use within their school, based on their positions after the voting had concluded. Currently, this project has awarded 230 teachers with free cruises for their outstanding work and donated at least \$230,000 to schools and the teachers within, since 2019 (NCL Giving Joy).

When asked about how it felt to win such a prestigious award, Mr. Monast said that "it was honestly amazing" and it was "hard to put it into explicit words." He describes it all as a sort of "warm, fuzzy feeling" that was "just so gratifying." It was not only the award to him that felt as amazing as it did, but the supportive community behind him that came together to vote him into this prize. Mr. Monast was "unbelievably grateful," and it felt "unbelievable to

hear" about some of the people that voted for him, like "[his] kindergarten teacher" who "[talked] about
