

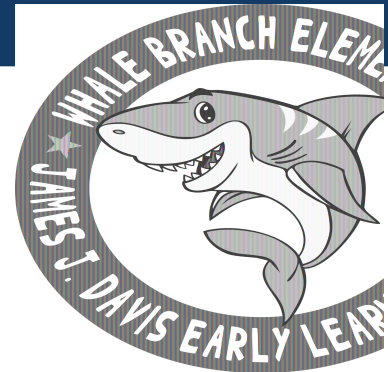

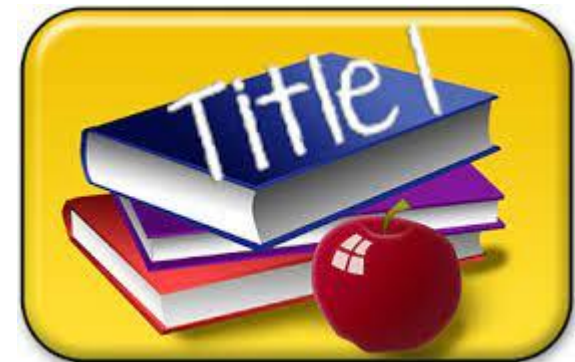

What is Title I?

- Title I is the largest federal assistance program for our nation's schools.
- The goal of Title I is a higher quality of education for every child.
- The program serves millions of children in elementary and secondary schools each year.
- There are currently **18 Title I Schools** in the Beaufort County School District.

How does Title I Work?

- The federal government provides funding to states based on census and poverty data each year for Title I.
- The South Carolina Department of Education sends the money to the local school districts.
- The school district identifies eligible schools their percentage of Pupils in Poverty and provides Title I funds.
- All Title I schools in the BCSD implement a schoolwide program.



Determining How Title I Funds Are Used

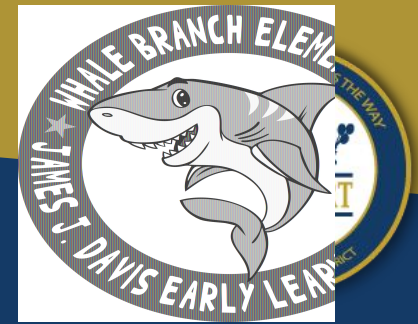


- Each school has a school advisory committee composed of parents, teachers, other staff that work at the school, community representatives and the principal.
- The School Improvement Council (SIC) serves as the school advisory committee
- A needs assessment is completed
- Goals are developed for the school year and a School Renewal Plan is written
- The SIC approves the Title I budget for the school which is a funding source to support the School Renewal Plan.





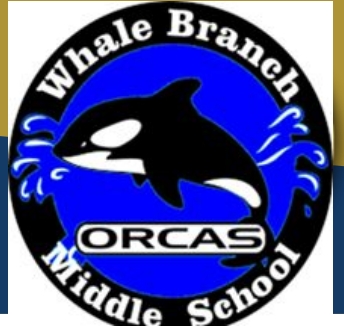
2021-22 School Goals



WBES & JJDES

- By the end of the Spring 2023, to increase the number of students in grades 1-4 MAP Reading Scores by 10%.
- By the end of the Spring of 2022, to increase the number of students in grades 1-4 MAP Math Scores by 10%.
- By the end of Spring, 10 percent of 3 & 4th grade students will increase by 10% in approaches.
- To increase teacher retention by 25%
- To decrease the number of student referrals by 10%

2022-23 School Goals



Whale Branch Middle School

- The percentage of fifth through eighth grade students scoring Meets and Exceeds on the ELA portion of SC Ready will increase to 47% by May 2024 as measured by SC Ready.
- The percentage of 5th through 8th grade students scoring meets or exceeds on the Mathematics portion of the SC Ready will increase from 26.10 % in May of 2018 to 55% by May 2024 as measured by the SC READY.
- By 2024, 90% of all certified teachers will be proficient (or above) on Student Learning Objective EOY Results.
- By 2024, to foster collaboration with community stakeholders and use their knowledge, skills and resources to support student learning, Whale Branch Middle School will increase the number of (active and approved) volunteers to 30.
- By 2024, Whale Branch Middle School will decrease the number of office referrals to 350.

2021-22 School Goals



Whale Branch Early College High School

- By 2021-2022, we will increase our students scoring a C or higher for the Algebra I end of course assessment from 31.0% to meet or exceed the state average of 46.3 %.
- By 2021-2022, we will increase our students scoring a C or higher for the English end of course assessment from 41.7% to meet or exceed the state average of 63.0%
- By 2021-2022, we will increase our teacher retention rate from 71.0% to 75.0%
- We have met our graduation goal and are at 90.0% of students graduating on time.

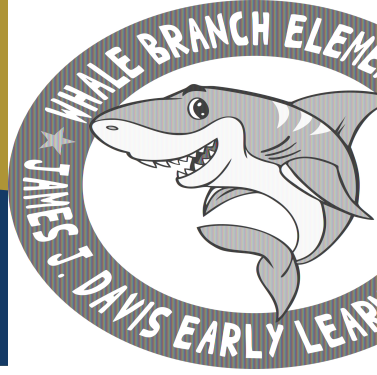

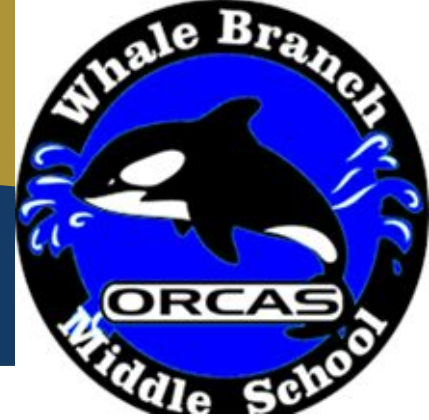

Parent and Family Engagement: School Compact



- Outlines the shared responsibilities of the school, parent, and students or order support high student achievement
- Distributed and signed by parents each year
- Is reviewed yearly during the Spring planning process with input from parents.



Parent and Family Engagement Policy

- Includes activities intended to engage parents, in a meaningful way in the development, implementation, and review of the parental involvement program.
- Development allows for parents to give input on important issues pertaining to school and community.
- Parents work with school staff to write the Parent and Family Engagement Policy
- Distributed and posted to school's website each year
- Evaluated in the spring and any revisions are made with SIC

Each year Title I schools are required to provide certain notifications to parents. Parents:

- May request regular meetings to express opinions and concerns;
- Must be provided information on your child's level of achievement on local assessments like MAP & State Tests such as SCPASS (Science & Social Studies), SC Ready (ELA & Math), KRA (Kindergarten), CogAT & ITBS (Grade 2), & ACCESS (ESOL);
- Must be provided information on your child's level of achievement in Reading/Language Arts, Mathematics, Social Studies, and Science;
- May request and receive information on the qualifications of your child's teacher; and
- Must be informed if your child is taught by a non-certified teacher for four or more consecutive weeks.



Parent and Family Engagement

Your engagement is KEY to your child's success

- You are your child's first teacher.
- You have the ability to influence your child's education more than any teacher or school.
- Choose to volunteer in your child's classroom or participate in other ways such as committee members. (See your school's principal)
- You know your child best:
 - Share information about your child's interests and abilities with teachers; and
 - Ask to see progress reports on your child and the school.



Simple Ways to Support Your Child's Education



- Share
 - Share a love of learning;
- Read
 - Read to your child;
- Ask
 - Ask your child to read to you;
- Limit
 - Limit TV and computer time;
- Take
 - Take advantage of the public library and the school media center;

- Ask
 - Ask questions and show interest in your child's school day;
- Review
 - Review homework;
- Praise
 - Praise their efforts; and
- Encourage
 - Encourage good study habits.

Simple Ways to Know Your School and Communicate With Teachers



- Attend
 - Attend parent teacher conferences school events, special parent trainings
- Visit
 - Visit the classroom
- Volunteer
 - Volunteer at the school
- Join
 - Join parents' organizations

- Keep
 - Keep teachers informed
- Engage
 - Engage in discussion about your child's school work and behavior
- Reflect
 - Reflect on the responsibilities as stated in the parent-school compact
