In early September, you might have heard of a boy who got arrested for building a clock. His name is Ahmed Mohamed from Irving, Texas. On September 14th, 2015, Ahmed walked into one of his classes and showed his teacher the clock he had built. There were conflicting reports on what actually happened, but one of them states that the police were contacted when the clock started beeping during class. Another says that the police were contacted the second the teacher was shown the clock and she assumed it was a bomb. Ahmed ended up getting arrested and interrogated. He kept explaining that it was a clock, not a bomb. Eventually they dropped his charges.

It is believed that racism lead to the boy's arrest. He was born in Sudan and is Muslim. Apparently, other students called him a "terrorist" or "bomb maker". He was targeted for his darker skin and religion. A quote from his father is, "My son's last name is Mohamed -- people just think Muslims are terrorists but we are peaceful, we are not that way".

People like Mark Zuckerberg and the leaders at Reddit and Twitter offered internships, Google invited him to their science fair, and even president Barrack Obama invited him to the White House. For eight months, six scientists have chosen to simulate living on Mars on a Hawaiian volcano. The scientists had to stay in a white dome on the side of the Big Island Loa volcano. A few challenges were wearing a spacesuit whenever they went outside, delayed communication, lack of sunlight, teamwork, productivity, and more. The goal was to study how the participants would work well together in fake Mars conditions. They were monitored by cameras, body-mounted trackers and electronic surveys. They had to stay in a 1,000 square ft. dome. There were 2 washrooms, a dining area, a work area, a kitchen, and a bedroom for each individual. The six people chosen for the

Her friends, Kainat Riaz and Shazia Ramzam were both shot and injured in the shooting. The gunman was said to be a member of the Taliban that was sent to kill Malala. Luckily, Malala recovered and even spoke about the issue saying, "They thought that the bullet would silence us, but they failed."

After her recovery, the Pakistani teenager moved to the UK and started up a fundraiser called "The Malala Fund" which works toward helping girls all over the world to get an educa-

tion and change their communities for the better. So far, the fund is working to help four places around the world such as Nigeria, Syrian, Kenya, and Pakistan. Even with the help of thousands, schools are still being targeted and Religious Extremism continues to run rampant throughout the streets of Swat Valley. One group in particular called the Tehreek-i-Nifaz-i-Shariat-i-Mohammadi (TNSM) stands out. The TNSM is led by Sufi Mohammed. The group resides in Swat Valley, Pakistan and is said to try and enforce Sharia Law. Sharia Law's roots comes from the Qur'an, Hadith, and the collection of sayings of the Prophet Mohammed.

Sharia Law dictates many aspects of both public and private behavior; clothing, worship, and even sexual behavior. The TNSM has also been known to engage in beheadings, floggings, kidnappings, destruction of schools and buildings, and starting public bonfires so that they can burn computers, DVD's, and any other modern device they can find. This does not stop Malala, who tells the press that she is afraid of no one, and will not let the TNSM stop her. Towards the end of the movie, Malala is asked about her name and whether she believes that her father gave her that name in honor of Malalai. She is also asked if being called by this name means that he wanted her to do what she is doing. The young teen then responds "No, I believe that he has given me this name, and it is my job, on my own, to carry out what I am doing." After the movie, White Plains students got to talk to Heather Barr, a Senior Researcher at Human Rights Watch in London. Mrs. Barr allowed the children to ask questions about the movie, Malala, or just about the government in Pakistan itself. All and all, the movie, "He Named Me Malala" shows both the inspirational aspect of Malala's journey, and her untold struggles that are often left out by the media. Graphic, raw, and powerful, this documentary gives both sides of the young Pakistani teen's fight for education.

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


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## PAGE 8 Girls Volleyball Fall 2015
