After that I did an outline, and then wrote my rough draft. Revising/editing was the hardest part.

How did publishing your first book change your writing process? While writing Drums, Girls, and Dangerous Pie I wrote step by step in a very organized way. While writing this book, I was afraid I wouldn't finish but I eventually did. When writing the 2nd book I got a bit cocky. I skipped around and wrote out of order

### What did you edit out of Drums, Girls, and Dangerous Pie?

When I first started writing this book the beginning and end was not on stage. There was not a happy ending. It all ended with Samantha dying. Once I started finishing the book I realized that I had to have some sort of happiness, so I added the graduation part at the beginning and at the end.

How long did it take you to write Drums Girls, and Dangerous Pie? I wrote the book for two hours a day. It took me a year to finish the entire

One of the biggest challenges I faced was trying to get all the medical things that are in the book correct. I used to call my friend that was a doctor, and ask things about cancer and its side effects.

Do you hide any secrets in your books that only few will find?
Well one thing people don't know is that the names in the book came from friends, family, and a store's name.

What was the hardest scene to write in 'After Ever After'? The hardest part to write was Tad dying.

Are you working on a book now? I just finished a book called, Secret Sheriff of 6th Grade. This book will be released this summer.

What was your favorite chapter to write in 'After Ever After'?

My favorite chapter to write was all about Jefferory and Lindsey, and about Tad walking down the stairs of school.

Did you learn anything from writing After Ever After?
I learned a lot about cancer, especially the side effects.

Why did you title the book After Ever After?

# Police Shootings on the Rise

There have been many shootings of police all over the United States. In most cases, police men and women are getting killed because the individuals have something against police. They also might have a mental issue and they kill police for whatever reason that is going through their mind.

One of the many shootings that has happened is the shooting in Palm Springs, on October 9<sup>th</sup>. "John Felix, 26, was arrested following the shootout, which started at 12:20 p.m. Saturday when three Palm Springs police officers responded to a domestic dispute." John Felix suddenly opened fire on the officers. Court records show that Felix is a gang member who had been put in jail for four years for a failed murder in 2009. Three police officers were shot and two of them passed away. Their names were Jose Gilbert Vega and Lesley Zerebny. Another shooting that occurred was in Dallas on the eighth of July. The gunman in this case was Micha Xavier Johnson, a military vet who had served in Afghanistan. The ambush started with gunshots that killed five officers and injured several others, and sent screaming crowds scrambling for cover. It ended when a Dallas police bomb squad robot killed Johnson, the gunman after negotiations failed." Police later searched his home and found bomb making materials and guns. They also found out that this attack had been planned for a while, and had been very well thought out.

There have also been lots of shootings of innocent people. There have been about 850 innocent people killed by police officers. One example of someone who has been killed is Donnell Thompson. There was a car that was stolen in LA. Someone saw a man who they thought matched the description of the carjacking suspect. That person called 911 and when the police arrived the man was lying motionless on the ground. He was not listening to the police's orders. The SWAT team came and repeated the orders but he stayed lying motionless on the ground. When he was hit with foam bullets he got up onto his feet and ran toward an armored vehicle. A member from the SWAT team then opened fire, hitting Thompson twice in the upper torso. Another shooting that happened was in Arizona. The victim in this case was Daniel Shaver. He was playfully firing a pellet gun up in the air out of a motel window. Unfortunately, and coincidently, a police officer saw him. Shaver did not respond to police orders and was shot by the police.

People around the country have responded to the shootings with protests, some peaceful, and others not so much. Hashtags and slogans such as "black lives matter" and "blue lives matter" have become popular as well. Both police and the communities they are supposed to protect and serve are in fear for their safety on a daily basis.

### **Make America Waffles**



On October 11, the 7th grade took a trip to Bear Mountain. Students and staff had a blast!






On November 10, teams 8A & 8B took a trip to Ellis Island. Students visited the Immmigration Museum and saw the Statue of Liberty.

Tell us about your education. Where did you go to college and/or high school?




