New Plague Strikes

Ebola, a deadly and contagious disease has now spread from West Africa to the United States, Germany, France, England, Norway, and northern parts of Africa. For those who are wondering, Ebola is a deadly filovirus, which means that it inserts its genes into a human's genes to cause physical problems. It is marked by fever and severe internal bleeding and spread through contact with infected bodily fluids. If you have Ebola you may have not realized it at first. The first signs of Ebola are a fever involving a headache, joint and muscle pain, a sore throat and severe muscle weakness.

The history of Ebola is that on October 13, 1976, 38 years ago, Frederick A. Murphy, a CDC virologist (a person who studies viruses) and expert in photographing viruses peered into a microscope and saw an Ebola virus for the first time.

Some ways Ebola can be transmitted are by physical contact with bodily fluids, such as blood, saliva, stool,

urine, or sweat of an infected person and soiled linen used by a patient. If you have a cut or touch your face while your hand is contaminated, this can also lead to infection. The virus can also pass through mucus membranes such as the mouth and nose. It can also be transmitted by objects like needles and syringes that have been contaminated by a victim of Ebola, or even contaminated animals. Ebola cannot be transmitted through air, food, or water.

There are chances that there may be some people that have Ebola and carry it unknowingly. The scanners at an airport only check body temperature so they cannot check if a person has Ebola or not. Although, if someone's body temperature is high, they must take a test to see if they have

There are ways people can avoid Ebola. There is no vaccine, but you can avoid places where Ebola is found. The most important thing is to go to your doctor if you think you have symptoms of Ebola.

Smart Schools Bond Brings Tech Money to District

New York State will be writing a check to the White Plains City School District for \$1.7 million to upgrade technology, thanks to the Smart Schools Bond Act that was passed by voters in the November elections. A total of 2 billion dollars will be divided up among 700 school districts in the state. The Smart Schools Bond Act "will provide funds to do several things to upgrade our use of technology across the school district. The governor indicated they will try to get the money to schools this year," said Tim Connors, White Plains City School District superintendent. So what will White Plains do with our share of the money? Mr. Connors says the top of the list will include Wi-Fi in all the

schools and preparing for online testing.

A report by the state commission says the bond project is supposed to pay for four main categories: equipment such as whiteboards and computers, internet connectivity, high-tech security, or facility renovations for prekindergarten programs. Schools can also use the money for professional development or Internet connectivity for community projects that affect public libraries and students' homes. Each school district will have to draft their tech wish lists and they will have to get community input. New NY Bridge: Futuristic Meets Function

On October 10th, Brian Conybeare came to Highlands and presented information to students and staff about the new Tappan Zee Bridge, which will be renamed the New NY Bridge. It's one of the most expensive projects in the nation's history.

The new bridge, which crosses the Hudson River between Westchester and Rockland Counties, will be ready in 2018. It will have 8 lanes, a shoulder, four emergency/breakdown lanes, a state of the art traffic monitoring system, and a commuter bus lane. Unlike the current bridge, the new bridge will have two separate spans. A nice feature on the westbound Westchester span will be a pedestrian walking and biking path with scenic overlooks. The bridge will cost \$3.9 billion to build and it will be 3 miles long.

Planning for repairing the Tappan Zee Bridge started in 1999, but it was not until 2011 that plans were established. Starting in October 2011, there was a design-build legislation enactment, and a simultaneous environmental review. A project labor agreement was entered into with construction groups, and pre-construction activities started – all with community involvement. The bridge was designed and will be built by Tappan Zee Construc-

tors (TZC), but many other companies are involved in the project. All of the materials for the bridge are sourced and produced in the United States. In order to keep trucks off of local roads during construction, two floating concrete plants have been built right in the middle of the Hudson River.

The construction company is paying attention to the sturgeon and peregrine falcons that could become extinct if the construction company wasn't being careful. Bubble curtains are being used to protect the endangered sturgeon from the noise of the machines. Nest boxes are in action to save the endangered peregrine falcons and give them a place to raise their offspring.

The I Lift NY Supercrane will help in construction of the new Tappan Zee Bridge. The crane traveled a 6,000 mile journey from San Francisco to New York, through the Panama Canal. Its boom arm is as tall as the Statue of Liberty, which is 328 feet high.

The New NY Bridge will hopefully help some of the traffic and safety issues we see with the current bridge. It will also provide pedestrians and bikers with a unique way to experience the Hudson River. I'm looking forward to driving across it!

M a l a l a Yousafzai is now the youngest Nobel Peace Prize winner in history. She is only seventeen years old and is considered a hero for many kids and adults all around the world. It is her unstoppable strength which many ad-

She was nominated for the Nobel Peace Prize in 2013, but didn't win that year. She was again nominated in 2014, and shared the Peace Prize with Indian activist Kailash Satyarthi, who fights for children's rights. But unfortunately, she is still considered a target for the Taliban. Malala is an inspiring role-model for young women around the world.

How to Save a Nation

In the past few years, gun violence has been a big problem in America. People, even mentally unstable individuals, have easy access to automatic and semi-automatic machine guns. Originally, people wished to own guns to protect themselves. Okay, fair enough. However, they are to be owned responsibly and kept away from children. This is not always the case, and examples are all around. Children are killed or injured in accidents constantly, and sometimes adults are too. This is a growing issue, and when there is a request to at least regulate these dangerous weapons, many conservative Americans take it as a push to ban guns. In my opinion, guns should be banned completely. However, the reality is that guns will never go away. It will not happen, at least in our lifetimes. In addition, many individuals state that it is their "God-given right" to own guns. No matter what your beliefs are, they are irrelevant in our society, which has a separation of church and state. This means, quite simply, that religion has absolutely nothing to do with democracy, and in acts or discussions of politics, it is an invalid argument. Therefore, people who claim that God gives them the right to own guns are simply using religion as an excuse. Guns are also available to mentally unstable individuals, or those categorized as insane. People who have a violent past or who have committed an act of violence simply should not be allowed to have guns. They could easily commit crimes or kill others with little to no regard for themselves or said others. The actual second amendment, quoted, is, "A well regulated militia, being necessary to the security of a free state, the right of the people to keep and bear arms shall not be infringed." This means, in layman's terms, that the civilians of the United States may at times have had to defend themselves against Britain if they had tried to take back the colonies, and therefore, in case a military force needed to be organized quickly, people who would have helped fight the British off would have been allowed to keep guns in their homes. It has nothing to do with personal self-defense as opposed to defending the nation, or "God-given rights". It just means that civilians may be called upon to fight in the military. The founding fathers did not foresee weapons capable of firing once per second or that people would make things up about the issue.

Here are some facts. Since 1982, 61 shooting sprees have occurred in the United States in 30 different states. 49 of those 61 shootings involved weapons obtained illegally. Of the 11 worst shootings in American history, 5 of them occurred after 2007. Shootings in America peaked in the late 1970's to early 1980's, but have since gone

down. However, America is a clear outlier in gun violence compared to other countries. It has far more gun deaths and shootings than other countries. The Southeast is also an outlier from the rest of the United States. Most gun deaths occur in states with little to no regulations. For example, California has more people than any other state (38,340,000 people), but has usually less than 5 gun deaths per 100,000 people. However, Alaska, with only 735,000 people, has 15-20 gun deaths per 100,000 people. (Gun death info from Washington Post and Wikipedia for populations of states.) Approximately 289 people are shot every day in the U.S. on average. 86 of them die, including 30 murders, 53 suicides, 2 accidents, and 1 police intervention. (From the Brady Campaign to End Gun Violence, forwarded by NBC

In conclusion, guns are a national problem and something needs to be done. The facts are there. They aren't made up, and are very real for families and friends of those who lost their lives due to the stunning amount of guns in this country and the miniscule amount of regulation. 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
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
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

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The Year of the Bee

Chances are if you have not been stung by a bee in the last few months then you probably have an anecdotal story about an unusual encounter with a bee. This was a banner year for yellow jackets and many schools in the region had to deal with multiple nests according to Dr. Jody Gagloff-Kaufmann, coordinator of the New York State IPM program at Cornell University. "Schools have very difficult challenges when dealing with late-season yellow jackets. The yellow jackets come from nests located on neighboring private property and because there hasn't been a hard freeze yet, we are seeing the leftovers from deteriorating nests that haven't died yet," Dr. Gagloff-Kaufmann said. She described the bees as "hungry and hostile."

Highlands Middle School had its own encounter with these hungry and hostile bees. A total of twenty-one students were stung, some multiple times when they went outside for gym on a beautiful fall day. The students were returning from gym class when the bees surrounded the students, according to Ernest Spatafore, Principal of Highlands Middle School. He said the students did not provoke the attack. All the students went to the nurse and none had allergic reactions to the sting. Mr. Spatafore was also the victim of a

bee sting while running in a marathon with his daughter a few weeks later.

Many local schools had multiple nests with hundreds of foragers of five different species and this seemed to be universal among schools and local communities, according to Dr. Gagloff-Kaufmann. She went on to clarify that the offending insects were yellow jackets and not bees. "In our educators' experiences, there seem to have been a lot of yellow jacket issues this year, both at schools and everywhere else. There is no particular reason or good explanation for this, except that all populations of living organisms have up and down numbers. "This is probably an up year for yellow jackets," Dr. Gagloff-Kaufmann said.

So what can schools do to not attract bees? Dr. Gagloff-Kauffmann suggests that the best a school can do is clean up food trash immediately, like drink containers. Parents and teams also play a role here, too. Everyone needs to be conscious of the food and drinks that attract yellow jackets, and keep them away from them.

While just about everyone I know (even my dog) was stung by a bee this fall, the good news is that the colonies will dissipate as the cold weather sets in. While the experts call this year a banner year for bees, they agree it was unusual and chances are next year won't be as bad.

The Incredible Roaring Tigers

The nest is vacant right now because the birds fly to warmer places. When they return in the spring, you will be able to watch their every move.

Falcon facts:

The falcons like high places, such as bridges and skyscrapers, because it gives them a good vantage point to spot their next meal.

When they are in a controlled dive, peregrine falcons can reach speeds of up to 200 miles an hour as they hunt for prey, generally birds.
